Snipe hunt to begin on refuge

According to Refuge Manager, Glenn Harris, snipe hunting will open on the Cameron Prairie National Wildlife Refuge on Jan. 25. Hunting will be allowed Tuesdays, Thursdays, Saturdays, and Sundays through Feb. 20.

Snipe hunting will follow the Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries regulations with the exceptions that only approved non-toxic shot may be used and shotguns must be encased or dismantled while transporting them on the refuge. All hunters are required to carry a signed copy of the refuge regulations on them personally while

Access to the refuge is limited to designated roads and parking areas only. West Cameron Prairie Road is the only road open to access snipe hunting areas. No vehicles are allowed on any other levees or roads.

The areas around the visitor center and maintenance buildings are closed to all hunting activities. All terrain vehicles (airboats, three and four wheelers, and marsh buggies) will not be permitted anywhere on the refuge.

Hunters may enter the hunting areas no earlier than Noon and may remain no later than one half hour after sunset. Hunting dogs are permitted for use during hunting activities, but must remain under the immediate control of the hunter.

A post hunt "Harvest Form" must be filled out at the self clearing check station, located near the entrance to the Refuge Visitor Center, immediately following each hunt even if no birds were harvested.

The Cameron Parish Chamber of Commerce recognized citizens who have served the parish well in the past and looked forward to new relationships with great promise for the future at their 17th Annual Banquet held Monday evening Hackberry.

Each year the Chamber also honors a Citizen of the Year, nominated by an organization in his or her community. The Citizen of the Year award for 2005 was given to Jennifer Jones of Cameron. Jones was cited for her advocacy of Rural Health Care, her work with Help Hope of Cameron, and her legal assistance to the elderly. Also nominated were Ricky Faulk, of Grand Lake, for his years of work with the Fire Department and commu-

The purpose of the Partnership is to market the SWLA area, attract companies, and help existing businesses expand, he said. He hopes to help the area compete in the international trade

Swift reported on the results of the focus group that met to determine the priority areas in Cameron Parish. They are: Develop support companies for the two new LNG facilities; develop additional seafood processing and sales businesses; promote the Creole Nature Trail and wildlife habitat through "ecocultural economy;" improve infrastructure with widening of LA27, an alternative to the Cameron Ferry, and development of a state park.

She provides free legal assistance for the elderly, regardless of income.


She is a member of the Cameron Lions Club and the Our Lady Star of the Sea Catholic Daughters, where she has served as Grand Regent.

Missing Methodist minister story recalled by T. J. Ratliff By T. J. Ratliff woman was a "Yankee" who

By T. J. Ratliff Cameron Pilot, January 20, 1972

A recent TV program featured a man who, as a result of a bullet wound in his head, became a victim of amnesia. Such stories, valid or not, are common in all folklores. Here is one the late Mrs. A. T. Carmouche told me years ago.

The setting is in the southeast Calcasieu, Cameron Parish and the Lake Arthur area. The central figure I knew personally during the latter part of 1927 and first part of 1928.

The Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, at its meeting in November of 1927 assigned a minister by the name of Johnson or Johnston to a circuit which included the churches at Bell City, Hayes, Grand Chenier and perhaps other churches.

He was a middle aged man, somewhat eccentric in his manner and dress who explained his oddities by saying he had served as a newspaper correspondent on the front lines in France during World War I and that any man who had the experiences he had and saw the things that he saw could never be completely normal again. He denies having any relatives at

From the conversations I had with him I would say now that if there is any such ailment as "shell shock" he may have been a victim of it. Otherwise he was an agreeable sort of person and preached some good, thought provoking sermons. Part of his traveling on the circuit was done by boat, especially from Grand Chenier to Lake Arthur.

Arthur.

One of his churches, Grand Chenier as I recall, raised some money to buy a piano. he made the trip from Grand Chenier to Lake Arthur by boat with two members of his church and thence to Jennings where he was to take the train for New Orleans. He was never seen by anyone who knew him after he reached Lake Arthur.

The first obvious assumption was that he had embezzled the money and disappeared. The objection to this assumption is that the amount was not great enough to make a crime worthwhile and that he forfeited his salary from his churches which would have been a greater amount.

Several years after the disappearance of Johnston, a woman with whom I talked at the Lake Arthur Youth Camp told me she suspected that the two men in the boat with whom he made the trip from Grand Chenier murdered him and stole the money. This

woman was a "Yankee" who obviously distrusted and feared Louisiana Cajuns. Mrs. Virgie McCall

Mrs. Virgie McCall LeBleu, a native of Grand Chenier who knew the two men in the boat, firmly denied any such possibility. She said the men were fine outstanding citizens of Cameron Parish who had no need to murder a man for two or three hundred dollars. She had no explanation for the disappearance of the preacher, whom she also knew.

Mrs. A. T. Carmouche,
whose husband was the
Southern Pacific agent at
Hayes, was an outstanding
member of the Hayes
Methodist Church and a personal friend of Johnston who
was her pastor. She checked
with the crew of the Southern
Pacific train on which
Johnston would have ridden
into New Orleans.

The conductor recalled that on about the date mentioned that a middle aged man fitting the pastor's general description became ill just as the train reached New Orleans and that an ambulance from Charity Hospital was called and the man was taken away to the hospital.

Mrs. Carmouche, good and loyal Methodist that she was, thought that the minister had a stroke of amnesia, wandered off and was lost or perhaps died in the hospital and since his body was unclaimed he was either buried in an unmarked grave or his body was sent to the laboratory at Tulane University Medical School for dissection.

Tulane medical graduates will know if such a theory is plausible. To me there are only two possible answers: embezzlement or amnesia; charity suggests the latter.





Five deceased parish residents are honored

Five deceased residents of Cameron Parish were nominated for the Cameron Chamber of Commerce Memorial Awards and relatives were presented with plaques in their honor at the chamber's annual banquet Monday night in Hackberry. Following is a list of some of the accomplishments of each

J. P. CONSTANCE
He was born in Holly Beach and graduated from McNeese State University where he was a member of the MSU Rodeo Team. He was enlisted in the National Guard Reserves. He was employed with Hercules Powder Company for 19 years as a process foreman. He was a cattleman and enjoyed rodeos and riding horses. He was a member of the Holly Volunteer Department where he served as fire chief for 30 years. He was an original member of the West Cameron Port Commission, a member of the Parish Civil Cameron Defense, the Johnson Bayou Water Board, and the Knights of Columbus.

E. J. DRONET

He was born in Iberia Parish. He joined the Navy during World War II and was a survivor when the U.S.S. Indianapolis went down in the Pacific. This was the greatest loss of life ever experienced by the U. S. Navy. He moved to Cameron Parish in retirement he worked for 1946. Banking was his career. He started out as a Vice-President for Calcasieu Marine National Bank and went on to become the President and CEO of Cameron State Bank. He retired in 1985 and remained an active civic leader in the community of Cameron. He served in the Fire Department, the VFW, the served Lions Club, the Knights of Columbus and the Cameron Parish Chamber Commerce. He received the Silver Beaver Award from the Boy Scouts of America. He received a Purple Heart and several other medals and ribbons for his service in the Navy. He was a member of Monsignor Kramer 4th Degree and Equestrian Order of the Holy Sepulcher of Jerusalem and received the Benemerenti Pontifical Medal.

JOHN FAULK

He was born in Creole and lived most of his life in Grand Lake. He was honorably discharged from the Navy in 1944 and was a member of the Disabled American Veterans and VFW Post No. 9933. He retired from the maintenance department of W. O. Moss Regional Hospital. He was a member of St. Mary of the Lake Catholic Church and a 4th Degree Member of Knights of Columbus Council No. 11407 and was a 4th degree member of Monsignor Kramers Assembly No. 0320 Assembly of the Knights of Columbus. He played bass for the Hackberry Ramblers since the early 1970's. The Hackberry Ramblers traveled across the Untied State performing for three U. S. Presidents. The Hackberry Ramblers have traveled to Europe and were nominated for a Grammy Award.

JENNINGS B. JONES, JR.

He was born in Grand Chenier. He enlisted in the Navy during World War II. He graduated from the LSU Law School in 1949, where he was the first Cameron resident to ever get a law degree. He was the founding partner of Jones Law Firm, where he practiced law for 55 years. He had the pleasure of practicing law with his two daughters, Sallie and Jennifer, his son, Bryan and his grandson, Patrick. He took pride in the fact that with Patrick joining the firm, he had the only law firm in Louisiana with three generations practicing together at the same time. He was a member of the American Bar Association, the Louisiana Bar Association, Southwest Louisiana Bar Association, the Louisiana Trial Lawyers Association, where he served as a past president, the Trial Lawyers of America, the Maritime Law Association of the United States. Locally he was a founder and past president of the LA Fur and Wildlife Festival and a past president of the Lion's Club. His awards include Cameron Parish Citizen of the Year, the Judge Albert Tate Professionalism Award for Inns of the Court and the War Horse Award from the Louisiana Trial Lawyers Association.

HAYES PICOU, SR.

He was born in Chavin. He moved to Cameron in 1939 where he worked on a dredge, building the Ship Channel. He became owner and operator of Coastal Shell Company and later Coastal Foods and Savers Grocery. Before his Pat's Restaurant and Kajon Foods. Mr. Picou was one of the most dedicated workers for Our Lady Star of the Sea Catholic Church. He was instrumental in forming the Knights of Columbus Council No. 5461 and was a 4th Degree Member of Monsignor Cramers Assembly No. 0320. He was a member of then Companions of Honor of the Diocese of Lake Charles and was presented with the Papal Medal by Bishop Speyrer in 1997. He was a Veteran of World War II and a member of the VFW Post 176 in Creole. He was a member of the LA Council on Aging Association and served as Lt. Governor of the Optimitt

Some notes about early Grand Chenier

Grand Chenier is located in extreme eastern Cameron Parish on the Mermentau River, and it was at first home to the Attakapas Indians. Probably the first Western Europeans to visit there were French fur traders, but unfortunately history leaves little or no record of them. The first known Western European to live there for two years was Charles Cronea of Marseilles, France, who jumped ship there from the Hotspur in Nov., 1820. The Hotspur was one of Lafitte's prize one of Lafitte's prize schooners, captained by James Campbell; the ship was loaded with doubloons and booty when it took refuge at Grand Chenier to replenish water tanks and repair sails. Cronea is credited with being the "last of Lafitte's pirates to be keelhauled into eternity," when he died at High Island, Tex. in March, 1893.

The next known white settler there was Placide LaBove, who arrived there in 1831, but later moved away. LaBove served with the 16th Louisiana Regiment at the Battle of New Orleans, and he died at Johnson's Bayou in 1892 at age 102. The next settlers were the John M. Smith family. An Attakapas Indian tried to explain to Smith how to survive in a storm by attaching family members to big branches high in a live oak tree, and wrapping them with grape vines. Smith, however, refused to believe him, and all of Smith's family drowned in the hurricane of

The first permanent settler was Milledge McCall (1803-1880), who came from Mississippi in 1839, followed by John Armstrong and John W. Sweeney in 1840. William Doxey (1816-1912) and Pierre Valcour Miller both arrived about 1848, the latter residing in the last house on the Grand Chenier ridge, 20 miles from Mermentau River. others, Two Laurents (Lorenzo) Sturlese and Paul Jones also arrived during the late 1840s. Sturlese was an Italian ship captain, whereas Jones was the first merchant in Grand Chenier. He also was captain of the Jubilee, the first ship known by name to trade in Southwest Louisiana. Jones bought the cotton, furs, hides and other commodities of the setters and traded them in New Orleans for the staples needed to sustain the frontier economy.

In addition to Sturlese and Jones, the following early Grand Chenier residents were enumerated in the 1850 Vermilion Parish census. namely: Isaac Bonsall, John W. Sweeney, Milledge McCall, Sr.; Albert Stafford, Edmond Vaughan, Alladin Vincent, Vincent, Valsin John Weatherill, and Lucien Bertrand.

All of the residences between 377 and 410 of the 1860 Vermilion Parish census resided on the Chenier. They included Paul Jones, merchant; Abel Alexander, John Armstrong, James James Hickok, Geo. Root, William Doxey, Benj. Root, Albert Stafford, John Weatherill; John Dick, whose real and personal estate \$25,000; Alex. equalled Moyne, McDonald, Geo. Moyne, Archie Gordy, M. McCall, Charles Hulten, M. D.; John W. Sweeney, James Vaughan, M. Hill, Henry Sweeney, John Miller, Michel Miller, Sr.; Michel Miller, Jr.; Valsin Montie, Lucien Bertrand, John Miller, Jr.; Edmond Vaughan, Belisare LaSye, J. Sturlese, Pierre Valcour Miller, and Isaac Bonsall. It appears likely that the Grand Chenier population numbered about 200 by 1860.

The month of April, 1861 altered all affairs with the outbreak of the Civil War. In 1863 the Confederate Army sent "conscripting vessels" to Leesburg and Grand Chenier, which one writer likened to the "British press gangs" of 1812, whereby one "volun-teered at gun point." Very quickly most younger Chenier men volunteered or were conscripted into the Calcasieu Regiment and sent to Camp Pratt. John Dick became hated because of efforts to enforce the conscription laws, and eventually he moved away. Of the writers great who became uncles Confederate soldiers, they included Hugh W. Hickok, John W. Sweeney, Jr.; William H. McCall, and Isaac Bonsall, the latter two having been slain at the Battle of

Mansfield. While the Chenier men were away in service, the 200-men band of Mermentau Jayhawkers rode up and down the Grand Chenier ridge, often at night, plunder-ing corn and hogs at will. My grandmother Sweeney told me that her family barred all window shutters at night to keep out both the panthers, which frequented the front marsh, and also Javhawkers. Milledge Byrd McCall, Jr. was killed during a fight with the bushwhack-

In Oct. 1863, Capt. Matt Nolan wrote that: "...There are two blockade-runners docked at Grand Chenier, each loaded with gunpowder. It is feared that the Mermentau Jayhawkers might seize them, for they can muster 200 men..." In March, 1864, Capt. Howerton wrote that: "...Dr. McCall is down from the Chenier. He reports that Col. Vincent's 2nd Louisiana Cavalry are attack- $_{
m the}$ Mermentau Jayhawkers. So far, nine have been killed, many more captured, and they are still fighting in Tousand's Cove...

Near the end of the war, an African slave ship, unaware that all slaves had been freed, abandoned its cargo of 200 slaves, and left them shackled to starve and await death on Negro Island in Mermentau River.

After the war, bands of armed men called Regulators ran rampant over the Chenier ridge, also killing and pillaging. They executed Ralph Stewart for some unknown reason. They captured Zach Yokum and hanged him to a hackberry tree. When they came after "Doc" Addison, he was waiting for them with 2 double-barreled shotgun muskets, and he had some one to reload them for him. When the smoke lifted, four Regulators lay dead in his yard and three were mortallywounded.

After the Regulators were destroyed, life returned somewhat to normal at Grand Chenier. One mystery still survives to this writer concerning the seven native-born Italians. Capt Lorenzo Sturlese arrived first about 1850. The others included Joe Sturlese, J. Cimio, Raphael Barbi, Frank DeMarco; Emmanuel Sturlese, who was captain of the schooner Two Brothers; and Capt. Charlie Sturlese, whose schooner Two Sisters sank near Galveston

Charter Boat Assoc. tells

announced "total opposition" to a Shell Oil plan to use super-heated gulf water to enhance the production of Liquefied Natural Gas off the Cameron Parish coast Marine biologists estimate the technique could destroy over ten percent of the Redfish population annually.

In a statement recently released, LCBA President Mary Poe of Big Lake Guide Services said, "We're for economic development but not at the expense of our fishery. Not only would the redfish suffer, but any other species that breeds offshore would have heavy losses: crabs, plankton, king mackerel, snapper, all offshore breeders would be impacted, as well as all the micro-organisms that start the food chain in all our waters.'

The group asked that, "All citizens of Louisiana band together to stop this danger-ous practice immediately. We are for economic development and would not oppose a system which would not do such irreparable damage to our natural resources. Shell should consider it's options and follow the system which does not damage our fragile

ecosystem."
The National Marine Fisheries Council has asked that Shell be required to pay over 30 million in mitigation charges if they are allowed to utilize the controversial methodology. "That's all fine and good for a quasi-govern mental agency to get damages," said Poe. "But exactly what help will that be to the 100 Charter Boat families who derive their entire livelihood from the guide business in Cameron. This plan could also impact the five hundred guides in other Louisiana waters as other companies might pursue this same destructive option. Besides, the last time I looked, there were no water barriers in the Gulf: what impacts us in the West will also impact the Central and Eastern fishery."

"If you take the charter boat industry as a whole, our five hundred captains have a very beneficial impact on the tourism industry and, if considered as one company, we would be one of our state's major employers. To chance ruining the fishery for ourselves and the over 300,000 salt water fishermen of Louisiana is a very foolish proposition.

Commenting on the proposal, Kirk Stansel of Hackberry Rod and Gun Club, said, "Look, they say they will kill about ten percent of the total redfish population but this is not a one time thing. Ten percent this year, ten percent of what remains next year, ten percent the following. In less than a decade, we could be out of fish. We have twenty to twenty-five guides working for us year round. What do we do when there's nothing to catch? We already have a dead zone, we don't need to

have another one.3 Erik Rue of Calcasieu

with a load of cotton in Oct. 1881. My Uncle Andrew Sweeney drowned on that trip. According to a descendent, Bartolomeo Baccigalopi jumped ship in Lake Arthur and later made his way to Grand Chenier. The writer has often pondered if an Italian ship wrecked on the front beach, leaving its castaways to seek refuge in the nearest settlement; I suppose I will never know for certain.

Charter Service is also concerned. "I am interested in learning more about the science behind these findings of the potential impact on our fisheries. Obviously, if the studies can be verified, this would have a huge negative impact on our area and other gulf coastal communities that depend on our fisheries for their livelihood. While I am certain that the offshore plan is a better alternative than having more dredging and erosion of our inshore channels to accommodate the huge tankers carrying the LNG, these new studies suggesting such an impact on our fisheries should be addressed before any approval of this proposal.'

Poe asked that all wildlife groups take a position. "We'd like the CCA, the Wildlife Federation. the Audubon Society, everyone to take a look at this and help us defeat this plan. This is one area where crabbers. commercial fishermen, guides and recreationals can make common cause. It will kill us all."

The LCBA is asking all elected officials and con-cerned citizens to take a stand against the Shell Oil plan. The U.S. Coast Guard is scheduled to make a decision on allowing the practice in the next few weeks.

An "outsider" can sometimes be more excited by our area than a native, Swift said, noting that with its pipelines, petroleum industry, and marine support industry Cameron Parish is vital to Southwest Louisiana.

The brand President/CEO of the Chamber SWLA, Donna Addkison, was a guest at the banquet. She is looking forward to working with the Cameron Chamber in the coming year.

She commented on the energy and excitement of the new officers and hopes to accomplish a lot in the future through cooperation. She replaced Joe Cironi and has been on the job for two weeks.

DUCK SEASON TO END

We've had another cold front that put a halt to our evening fishing, but still good for duck hunters. In the marsh I hunt, I don't like a northerly wind, as it slows the birds flight down. Our best hunting is a good southeast wind and yes, 60 degree weather is fine. We have way more ducks in flight and really better ducks to choose

There's not much more worry about duck season now, as of today there's only three more days left, so the race is almost over for this duck season. Although our state of Louisiana was number one last year's season with 1.3 million ducks bagged, I wonder how the 2004-05 season will put us in rankings. Arkansas (1.1 million) and California (1 million) have been with the bad season we've had in most areas, they could surely climb higher, being in a different flyway. Last year California did take number one in harvest ducks per hunter with 23, compared with 20 for Louisiana and the state of Utah had 20 harvest ducks per hunter.

REFUGE HUNTING

The Fund for Animals has been trying to ban hunting and fishing on 39 refuges, including six in Louisiana. Our newly elected U. S. Senator David Vitter has opposed this even as a U.S. Congressman He has sponsored legislation to protect rights of hunters and sportsmen on National Wildlife Refuges.

This resolution would reaffirm that the intent of Congress in passing the National Wildlife Refuge System Improvement Act of 1997, was to allow appropriate hunting and fishing on public lands on the refuge system and would also declare that the purpose of reserving public lands, is to make them available to the people for reasonable use.

NEW TECHNOLOGY

Everyday, we see more and more new technology in every field of work or pleasure.

This winter coming back from hunting, I noticed a pickup truck coming my way and it seems he had four to six rod and reels in a rack, looking up, as we put our rod and reels in the center console of our saltwater rigs. Well as we met, I could see it was some type of antennas, so I kind of figured it could be game agents with something new. Later I heard the story

of "Duck Tracking."
This was a satellite tracking technology to track the flights of ducks, working way better than the old radio type transmitters.

We had a couple of these

tracking ducks which had PTT's on and a new type of research is there, sending a great signal tot he ground crew. One of these crews had a drake pintail on Little Chenier that stayed in one area for three days and didn't move, so the crew took to the marsh only to find that the pintail had probably been crippled by a hunter and died in an open pond.

Biologists used these PTT's to track ducks that were, released in the spring, summer and fall migration.

FISHING TALK

Louisiana anglers their 10th wrapped up anniversary of CCA/Mercury Statewide Outboard Tournament & Angler's Rodeo (S.T.A.R.) with 15 boats given tot he top winners, plus other prizes. The top speckle trout for the western division was a 9.5 pounder, while the eastern division had a 9 pounder for the winner.

This 2004 season was the first time since 1998 that no one claimed a boat for the tagged redfish category, with no members catching one.






