## S. Cameron hospital adds new equipment

South Cameron Memorial Hospital just added a new Radiology Room to the hospital. This room might look like a normal x-ray room to most observers, but the high-tech upgrades make this a dramatic improvement for the residents of Cameron Parish.

The hospital is now equipped with a Radiology Room with a GE X-Ray and Fluoroscopy machine, a Kodak CR 500 System, and a Catella Web Distribution and CD Image Copy System.

This means patients at the hospital now receive x-rays using a completely digital format. No more x-ray films. It all is produced digitally and can be sent directly to the referring physician via the internet.

The Kodak CR500 and Catella Web Distribution system produces the x-ray into a digital form and allows the referring physicians to see their patient x-rays as they are being performed in real time.

The x-rays can now also be copied directly to Compact Disc that the patient can take with them to their next doctor's visit.

Leslie Trahan, Assistant Administrator at South Cameron Memorial Hospital, said, "This is a huge step for our hospital and the community because it completes one of the promises made by Pacer Health Corporation when they came to this area wanting to manage the hospital."

Lauren Comeaux, a Radiology Tech at South Cameron Memorial Hospital, said, "This new equipment allows us to do everything in the way of general x-rays and fluoroscopes."

Fluoroscopy is a technique for obtaining "live" X-ray images of a living patient. The Radiologist uses a switch to control an X-Ray beam that is transmitted through the

patient. The X-rays then strike a fluorescent plate that is coupled to an "image intensifier" that is coupled to a television camera. The Radiologist can then watch the images "live" on a TV monitor. Fluoroscopy is often used to observe the digestive tract (Upper GI series - Barium Swallow, Lower GI series - Barium Enema or "BE").

Comeaux added, "We really needed this upgrade. We can now get our radiology reports back within a day now, where as in the past it was taking as long as three days with the older system." Pacer Health Corporation chose to make the commitment to improve the imaging capabilities of South Cameron Memorial Hospital with the knowledge that it will take an extremely long time to recoup their investment in a small community. Trahan added, "The general x-ray room will recoup its costs rather quickly, but the fluoroscopy equipment is there simply because Pacer Health recognizes the health-care equipment needed for the area."

## Sheriff opens new Hackberry sub-station

Sheriff Theos Duhon has fulfilled a campaign promise by opening a substation in Hackberry.

The substation is located in the parish multipurpose building on Hwy. 27, just inside and to the right of the main entrance.

It is manned daily by investigator Randy Hunt and can be used any time by deputies to meet people for statements or complaints or to work on reports.

The phone number for substation is 762-3962. There is no radio dispatcher at the site, but the Cameron dis-

patcher is in contact with deputies through car and portable radios.

Anyone who wants to speak to a deputy, but may not want the patrol car at their house, can call the dispatcher and arrange a time to meet at the substation, according to Chief Deputy Ron Johnson.

The current location of the substation may be temporary if a grant application by Ambulance Service District #2 is awarded. The grant request is for the construction of a new building which would house both an ambulance station and a Sheriff's Office substation.

## Subdivision planned for Hackberry

Samuel R. Breaux II of Sulphur has applied for a Coastal Use Permit to develop a residential subdivision on Joe's Cove off the Calcasieu Ship Channel at Hackberry.

Initial plans called for 20 lots with 25 by 25 foot boat slips for homesite preparation. A revised application added 32 lots to the original 20 lots.

The subdivision will have a 1,019 foot road, an 800 by 50 by 8 foot canal.

In another application for a Coastal Use Permit, Don E. Page is applying for construction of a bulkhead, concrete decking and fill for along along the ship channel also at Hackberry.

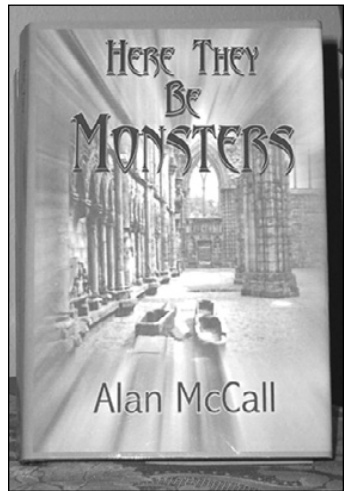
Children entering kindergarten for the 2005-06 session must have been born on or before Sept. 30, 2000.

Parents who do not yet have their children's birth certificates or social security card (number) should begin proceedings to secure them. Application forms for birth certificates may be obtained at the Parish Health Unit. Applications for social security cards (numbers) may be obtained from any U. S. Post Office.

McCall said he hopes to set up a book signing in the near future.

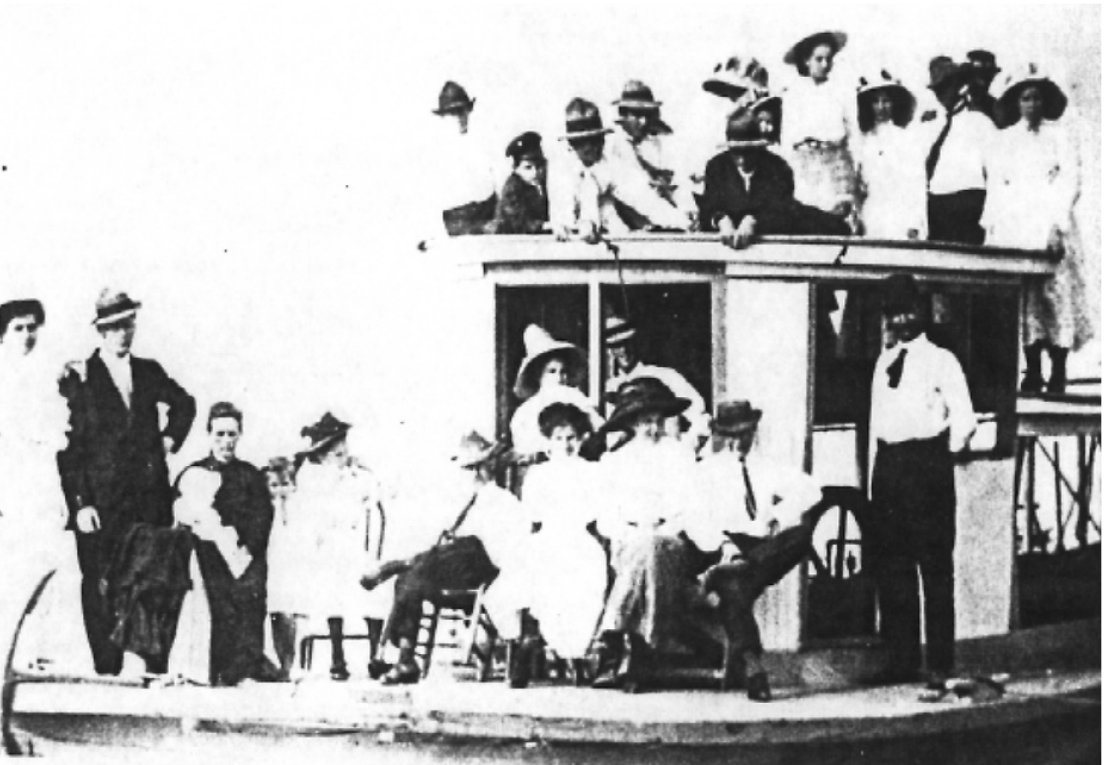

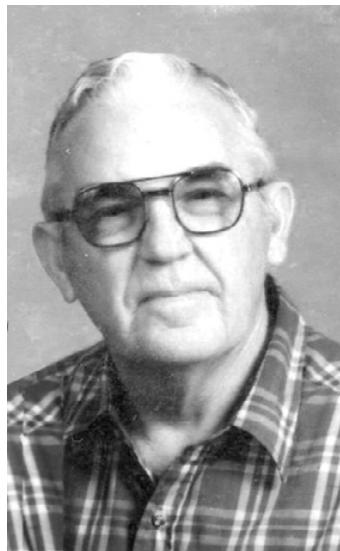

## Mosquito control to begin spraying in parish soon

With colder weather almost at an end, Mosquito Control is ready for the coming spray season. Heavy rains throughout the winter have filled all permanent water breeding grounds and will be a big boost to our night active species this spring. Mosquitoes are already beginning to show up in most areas, but up until now, fog, wind and cold nighttime temperatures have prevented all spraying. The areas needing spraying the most are located

near the coast where the fog and wind are worst. It is extremely dangerous for our trucks to be out on the road driving at 10 miles an hour spraying when there is fog in the area and we will not risk the lives of our drivers. The airplanes are also grounded because the pilots cannot see either the areas they need to spray nor towers because of the fog.

When temperatures drop below 60 degrees, mosquitoes become less active and insecticides do not kill them, so it's useless to spray on cold nights.

## Fishing groups concerned about offshore LNG plant

Gov. Kathleen Blanco should try to persuade the company planning a liquefied natural gas terminal south of Cameron Parish to use technology that is less likely to endanger the state's Gulf of Mexico fishery, several interested groups said Tuesday.

The organizations of environmentalists, commercial shrimpers and charter boat captains may ask the 5th U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals to overturn the Coast Guard's approval of a permit it granted for the plant to Shell US Gas & Power LLC, said Leslie A. March, vice chair of the Sierra Club's Delta Chapter.

"We know LNG is coming. But we have to learn from the mistakes of the past and make sure the mistakes of the past are not repeated," said Aaron Viles, fisheries campaign manager for the Gulf Restoration Network.

The planned terminal apparently would be the first "open loop" LNG terminal in the U. S. It would use more than 100 million gallons of Gulf of Mexico water a day to warm the super-cold LNG back to a gas.

The worry is that Gulf water, suddenly chilled by the process, will kill eggs, larvae, and one-celled animals sucked in with the water.

Six other such plants are planned for the Gulf, the group spokesmen said. Another 14 are planned but would use a "closed loop" system, which they said would not damage fisheries. The closed loop technology uses about 2 percent of the natural gas to warm the rest.

"It's been our history that we will destroy our marsh, that we will destroy our coast-

line for a few quick dollars," Viles said. If it happens again, "Shame on us."

Blanco has been a strong leader, and Shell Oil Co. has done a great deal for coastal restoration, Viles said. "If she asked Shell to come back to the table and discuss this, we think she would get a good response," he said.

Shell US Gas & Power LLC isn't likely to change current plans for the Gulf Landing terminal south of Cameron Parish, Shell Oil spokesman Johan Zaayman said. In a prepared statement, Shell said the groups are overstating the plant's likely effects and apparently don't recognize the many strict safeguards written into its permit.

"The final environmental impact statement that the Coast Guard issued does say that the open loop system is the best application for this project. And that the projected environmental impact will be insignificant," Zaayman said in an interview.

Shell cited that statement as saying the plant's "average impact will be less than 1 percent of the impact recreational fishermen have on redfish."

The Coast Guard approved the permit after scientists it hired found that the plant probably would kill the equivalent of one-tenth of a percent to 1.5 percent of the landings allowed for recreational offshore fishing (commercial netting of red fish is forbidden.)

## It Seems Just Like Yesterday

(EDITOR'S NOTE-Keith Hambrick, who has researched the "Do You Remember" column for the Cameron Pilot for the past 20 years, recently suffered a broken hip and will be unable to write this column for a while. Here is one of his earlier columns published in the Pilot.)

(From the Lake Charles American, July 1, 1904.)  
**Cameron, July 27...**J. P. Jones returned Friday from Baton Rouge where he went as a delegate to the convention.

Dr. Carter was called today to see W. F. Harper and Wm. Stine, who are sick with fever. Mrs. E. Chadwell and her granddaughters, Sadie Chadwell and Josephine Smith, are visiting the family of Mr. Ben. Avant, near Duso, La.

The artesian well in the courthouse square was completed Friday. It is a three inch well, 330 feet deep and furnishes an abundance of good water. The contractors are now sinking a well on St. John's Island for Emil Jessen.

At the Catholic Church, near Creole, on Sunday, Father Cambriere administered the first communion to a class of 26 boys and girls. Misses Alice and Mary Hebert and Rosa Holland, of Grand Lake, after spending some time with friends returned to their homes on the Juliette this morning.

A marriage license was issued to Adron Pevott and Miss Celestine Miller, both of Johnson Bayou.

(From the Lake Charles American, June 21, 1902)  
**Hackberry...**Mr. H. H. Jones has gone to Dallas, Tex. to visit his family.

Uncle Lastie Vincent is visiting the family of Hon. Amar Vincent. The sloop Pearl is up at Lake Charles for coal.

It is rumored the oil company contemplates putting in a tug to ply between Hackberry and Lake Charles. This is good news as there is plenty of business going on.

Under the present system, the Hackberry people have to ride or walk twelve miles to Calcasieu post office. Sometimes mud is neck deep, the horse bogs down and one is obliged to walk two or three miles to get a yoke of oxen to pull the horse out. Then he has the pleasure of going back home to give his wife, mother or sister a week's job of cleaning up-and still the proprietors of the mail steamer Romeo will not hear our plea for them to make a landing.

The oil company sees our predicament and if they will assist us out of the wilderness, we will remember them in the future.

Mosquito insecticides only kill the flying adults, not the larvae, nor the pupae in the water, nor the eggs. It is not residual, meaning it breaks down within a few hours, making them extremely safe for the environment. It is against federal laws to spray areas during the daytime because of the possibility of killing bees, which are only active during the day, so all our parish wide spraying must be done after sundown when bees are inside the hives.

All of the parish is currently scheduled to be sprayed, so as temperatures warm and the weather settles down, we will again spray as we have the past few years, putting all areas on a rotating basis with extra spraying in those areas needing it.

Since our spray has a hard time reaching mosquitoes hiding in barns, garages and animal pens, people can help reduce these by using residual insecticides such as permethrin which can be purchased at feed and seed stores locally. Permethrin is very safe, long lasting and is labeled to be sprayed directly on livestock.

The Health Department is still testing some species of birds which may be reservoir hosts for encephalitis and WNV, so the public should contact them if any dead birds are found. They are mainly testing cardinals, blue jays, sea gulls, grackles, house sparrows and birds of prey, such as hawks and owls. The phone number for the Health Unit in Cameron to report dead birds is 775-5368.

# Cameron Outdoors

### 4-CYCLE ENGINES

Anglers buying new outboard motors, are finding more and more four-cycle engines on the market. We're used to our two-cycle engines, which are lighter than a four-cycle, especially on the 25 hp we use in our local marshes and refuges.

There are some definite benefits to the four-cycle engines, so we're told. One is that they are much quieter. Lots of companies are moving away from the two-cycle engine that have been the main sellers, plus have been with us for many years. Now, companies are converting to four-cycle engines, such as the one you have in your automobile.

Mercury, Yamaha and Honda are still making two-cycle outboard motors, but they too are adding four-cycle outboard motors with the same horse power range as a two-cycle engine. One thing, we're going to see the two-cycle engine disappear from the showroom floor and replaced with a four-cycle engine for the future outboarder.

Anglers still wanting to purchase two-cycle outboards, have found out the prices have gone up quite a few hundred dollars, however the price of the four-cycle motors are also higher than the two-cycle engines. It pays to take good care of the two-cycle outboard motor we now own and repair.

### BIG BURNS

The Miami Corporation permit fishing, including the Big Burn, will open on Saturday, Mar. 12 at sunrise and close on Sunday, Aug. 28 at sunset. A 25 hp (no more than 33.3 cubic inch displacement as per manufacturer's specs) will be allowed. This is for sports fishing only, with rod and reel and cane pole use. All Louisiana's laws and limits are to be abided by.

A permit holder (cost \$20) can have only one guest per permit. Always have proof of identification and permit with you to show upon request. Motor decals must be on motors to the correct horsepower.

There will be no night time activity allowed. The permit is good for lands covering Miami Corporation in Cameron and Vermilion Parish, "except" west of Hwy. 27 (Cameron & Creole Watershed), Willow Lake, south of Hwy. 82 in Grand Chenier and around all water control structures. The permit does not grant access to Rockefeller Refuge through the Superior Canal at any time, for any purpose.

There will be no trout lines, frogging, webbing, nets, seines, traps, cages, limb lines, cast netting or any commercial type activity.

Firearms and overnight camping is not allowed, no littering or dumping of trash.

### FISHING NEWS

Anglers are hitting the saltwater inlets and lakes, chasing the red fish and speckle trout. Two weeks ago heavy rains had slowed the Big Lake area and the Cameron Jetties, because of the freshwater. We have gone a few days without rain and that has helped out, however some days, the water was choppy, but not bad.

Anglers are still catching nice limits of bass on the

### COMMERCIAL NEWS

It seems that our commercial shrimpers had bad news about closing shrimp trawlers to thousands of shrimp boats in federal waters. Plans are to limit the number of shrimp fishing boats in the Gulf of Mexico.

Federal waters begin off the Louisiana coast three miles out as well as Mississippi and Alabama. Our neighbors to the west, have their federal waters nine miles out as well as the state of Florida.

There will be a limited number of permits available. This could really hurt our Louisiana shrimpers, as this has been passed on from generation to generation, just like our farmers. Let's hope this doesn't take place.
