

Jurors table Johnson Bayou permit after concerns told

Environmental concerns caused the Police Jury to table a permit Monday night for the reconstruction of a containment berm in Johnson Bayou. The permit application by The Prospective Investment and Trading Company was opposed by Tommy Wright, general manager of Dore Energy Corp. on the grounds that the soil in the area is contaminated by hydrocarbons, benzene, and barium, and further dredging and soil movement would spread the contaminants, cause marsh loss, and possibly result in loss of wildlife.

Wright said the Department of Natural Resources and the Louisiana Department

Environmental Quality have the property under investigation for litigation on these issues and asked the Jury to deny the permit. Jurors agreed to table the permit until further information is received or the state approves the project.

Juror Sonny McGee, commenting on a recent news article about the West Cameron Port's contract with a law firm, emphasized that there is no audit of the Port currently on-going. He said he hopes that sensitive negotiations will not be affected by the article.

In a related matter, he asked the Jury to institute a policy that any correspondence with regulatory agen-cies on Police Jury letterhead be approved by the president or the Jury. The panel agreed, with certain exceptions for regular permit applications and financial matters, to be determined.

In response to another recent article, concerning the Jury's questions about the Cameron Parish Library's internet contract, representa-Sky Rider tions, Library of Communications, Director Charlotte Trosclair and Program Director DeDe Nunez, and E-Rate consultant Terri Lawrence of the Louisiana Resource Center for Educators (under the office of the Lt. Governor) were present to answer any concerns. However, the matter was not on the agenda and no questions were asked.

The Baton Rouge Audubon Society recently purchased a house and lots adjoining its Peveto Woods Sanctuary near Johnson Bayou.

The Sanctuary has been in existence for a number of years. It is covered by oaks and brush that has been maintained by the society as a sanctuary for birds flying across the Gulf of Mexico.

The house and lots owned by the Suire family, which was surrounded by the Sanctuary property, recently came on the market and the Baton Rouge organization agreed to buy the property.

According to Chris Carlton, the Society's vice-

president, the house will be developed as a multi-user facility for birders and ornithology researchers visiting or working at Peveto Woods or the vicinity.



The Baton Rouge society has also gone into a partner-ship with the Nature Conservancy to acquire other chenier properties including Hollister Woods at Grand Chenier.

Peveto Woods Sanctuary currently encompasses about 40 acres and will be enlarged by the new purchase. This site was the first chenier sanctuary for migratory birds established in Louisiana.

The sanctuary is located west of Holly Beach 8.5 miles off Hwy. 82 on the Gulf.



Bridge/tunnel study is requested by Jury

The Cameron Parish Police Jury has requested its Congressional delegation to seek funds for a study on a bridge or tunnel crossing for the Calcasieu Ship Channel at Cameron.

The request cites the increased shipping expected when there are three LNG terminals in operation north of the Cameron Ferry Landing in the near future. Trunkline LNG in Lake Charles is in the process of doubling its capacity, Sempra's Cameron LNG Terminal in Hackberry is under construction, and Cheniere LNG's Creole Trail terminal is just beginning the permit process

Parish Administrator Tina Horn wrote, "Just the other day, while waiting to cross the ferry for about 45 minutes, thinking the ferry was broke, I finally saw a LNG tanker in the horizon, The ferry shuts down completely while the tanker is in the Channel and does not resume crossings for a good while after the tanker is out of site."

Horn noted that liquefied natural gas benefits the entire country and that Cameron Parish has no problem with the terminals being

Pending regulatory and shareholder approval, the merger could be completed in the third quarter, Woods said.


Hibernia president J. Herbert Boydstun said Sunday that customers should see few changes.

(EDITOR'S Cameron Parish is 135 years old this year. The following article concerning the origin of the parish's name was run in the Pilot in 1970 when the parish's centennial was observed. The author, the late Archie Hollister, was recognized as the parish's unofficial historian at the

The origin of the name of Cameron Parish is the subject of some speculation and more

One writer links it with the Cameroons in Africa, holding that both are derived from a French word meaning a marshy place. Certainly there is enough marsh in Cameron to satisfy any reasonable man who loves such terrain, but no French dictionary in my possession seems to be acquainted with this

Neither do the local inhabitants, largely of French extraction, use this or a similar word. In the vernacular it is "meshe" or at least that is the way it sounds to me. I think that we may safely dismiss the opinion as simply an interesting sidelight on the workings of the human brain

I have also seen publications to the effect that the parish was named in honor of Simon Cameron of Abraham Lincoln's war cabinet, and although Louisiana was under carpet bag rule at the



Louisiana sport fishermen are trying to organize a boycott of Shell Oil Co. to protest a proposed terminal in the Gulf of Mexico for liquefied natural gas which they say would devastate fisheries.

The Louisiana Charter Boat Association plans to protest Shell's plans at the Louisiana Sportsman Show that kicks off Wednesday at the Louisiana Superdome.

Last month, federal regulators approved a permit for Shell to build a terminal 36 offshore miles from Southwest Louisiana. The terminal would use more than 100 million gallons of Gulf of Mexico water a day to warm the super-cold LNG back to gas. To transport natural gas across the ocean, it is turned into a liquid by cooling, and it is warmed back into gas upon reaching a point of delivery.

The worry is that the Gulf water chilled by the process will kill zooplankton and fish larvae and eggs.

What angers sport fishermen is that Shell wants to use an "open-loop" system rather than a "closed-loop" one. A closed-loop system uses natural gas instead of water to LNG. warm Environmentalists and marine biologists say closed-

fish stocks. Dennis Winkler, spokesman for the terminal, said Shell has worked hard in recent years to cultivate an image as an environmentally

friendly company.

"Both systems were evaluated," he said. "This was recommended as the best option for this deep-water port.

Anglers are encouraged to donate bass

With the spring spawn in progress, the Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries wants to remind bass anglers of the benefits of the Louisiana Lunker Bass Program (LLBP).

Through this program, anglers can donate a 12pound or greater largemouth bass to LDWF for spawning, exhibiting, or research purposes. Any angler who legally catches a largemouth bass weighing at least 12 pounds between Dec. 1 and April 30 in Louisiana waters, and is willing to donate his or her fish to the program, will receive a free replica of the fish and a certificate of appreciation from the LLBP, following acceptance by LDWF person-

All donated lunker bass are held at the Booker Fowler Fish Hatchery (BFFH) in Forest Hill. After the spawning period, hatchery personnel move the bass to an exhibaquarium located at BFFH's Visitors Center.

LDWF will stock any fingerlings produced by the lunker fish into the lake from which the parent came. For a largemouth bass to be accepted into the program, an angler must sign a statement stating that the fish was legally caught in Louisiana and that all rights of use and ownership to the fish will be transferred to LDWF.

The LLBP began in 1997 as a cooperative effort between LDWF, Southern Pride Bass Club (SPBC) and the Association of Louisiana Bass Clubs (ALBC) to promote and enhance the largemouth bass fisheries in the state of Louisiana.

The funding for this program came from the proceeds of a benefit bass tournament sponsored by SPBC and the ALBC in memory of Nookie Diaz. These proceeds were donated to the Louisiana Wildlife and Fisheries Foundation and dedicated for enhancement of the Florida largemouth bass in our state fish hatchery sys-

Anyone who catches a largemouth bass that might qualify should keep the fish in fresh, aerated water, avoid holding the fish only by its jaw or with dry hands, use a net to move the fish from one container to another, if necessary, and contact LDWF within 12 hours of capture to arrange to have the fish picked up.



GLOBAL WARMING Scientists have been

telling us for years that global climates are changing. Glaciers disappearing, seas swallowing our marshes and early spring weather weeks too early. It could be both good and bad.

The drier the prairies are, the fewer potholes, the more nesting area farmers will cut up and plant, but better winter wheat and fall rye grass would be a bonus for the

Scientists believe that rising water temperatures could expand the range of warm water fish like bass, 300 miles more to the north by the middle of the 21st century. This however decreases the range of coldwater fish like trout and walleyes. It is said that a one degree rise in celsius temperature, could make the water too warm for coldwater fish to reproduce.

I think here in southwest Louisiana mosquitoes would be worse than they are now, plus they would move further north. Mosquito spray with DEET in it is the best to fight off mosquitoes from your skin, however we now have manufacturers with bugproof garments, everything from gloves, pants, hoods, and jackets. They say too much deet used to often is a health hazard, so don't use deet at full strength.

Louisiana shrimpers eligible for assistance

The U.S. Department of Foreign Agriculture's Agricultural Service (FAS) has certified a petition from Shrimp Louisiana Association under which commercial Louisiana shrimpers will be eligible in 2005 for Trade Adjustment

Assistance (TAA). Shrimpers became eligible when an FAS investigation determined that fresh and frozen shrimp imports contributed to a decline in the price of shrimp landed in Louisiana in 2003, when compared to the 1998-2002 base period. Technical assistance training classes from the LSU Extension Service have been scheduled in locations across South Louisiana.

Shrimpers must apply for TAA benefits between Jan. 10 and April 11, 2005 at a local Farm Service Agency (FSA) office. In this area, offices are located in Lake Charles,436-5020, New Iberia, 369-3234,

and Abbeville, 893-5781. To be eligible, shrimpers must prove with IRS records or records from a certified public accountant that they received less income from

shrimping in 2003 than in

2002. Landing records for 2003 are also required. FSA will accept sales receipts, invoices and scale or delivery

Eligible shrimpers must also attend a technical assistance class taught by the LSU AgCenter's Extension Service before they can get paid. This must be done by July 11, 2005. Classes for this region are scheduled for April 7: At 9 a.m. in New Iberia at the LSU AgCenter Extension office, Courthouse Building, Suite B-110 300 Iberia Street, (telephone 369-4441) and At 3:00 p.m. in Abbeville at the LSU AgCenter Extension office, 1105 West Port Street (telephone 898-4335) and April 8, 2005, 9 a.m. at the Cameron Parish Police Jury Annex, 115 Smith Circle (491-2065)

A total of \$90 million has been appropriated, but that amount must cover all eligible agricultural and fisheries production in the United States.

According to Gerard Labbe of the state FSA office, the maximum payout that shrimpers can receive is 5.6 cents per pound of head-on shrimp landed. Depending on how many other crops qualify, the payout could be

Refuges to open Mar. 15

The Southwest Louisiana National Wildlife Refuge Complex, comprised of Cameron Prairie, Sabine, and Lacassine National Wildlife Refuges will open for public sport fishing on Tuesday, March 15, according to Refuge Complex Manager Don Voros. The refuges will remain open for fishing until Oct. 15.

Legal hours for public access are sunrise to sunset at Cameron Prairie and Sabine and one hour before sunrise to one hour after sunset at Lacassine.

Anglers may harvest all fish species in accordance with Louisiana Recreational Fishing Regulations, including largemouth bass, with no additional restrictions at each of the refuges. Possession of all applicable

Louisiana fishing licenses is required to fish on National Wildlife Refuges. Boats with outboard motors of 25 horsepower or less may be used in Lacassine Pool. Boats with outboard motors of 40 horsepower or less may be used in the Sabine Management Unit 3. Please practice good boating and safety habits, observe and obey "No Wake Zones", and respect the rights of fellow fishermen and refuge vis-

Anglers interested in fishing at Cameron Prairie will be able to access the Gibbstown Unit along the Bank Fishing Road and the Outfall Canal and the East Cove Unit when the Grand Bayou Boat Bay is open. Anglers can check on the status of the boat bay openings by calling 598-4235.

Sabine Management Unit 3 anglers are asked to complete a creel survey card to assist refuge biologists in determining angling pressure and success rates. Creel cards will be available at the Unit 3 Northwest Boat Lift. The Unit 3 East Boat Lift is operational; however, dense vegetation may impede boat trav-

Sabine's Management Units 1A and 1B are restricted to pirogue, kayak and canoe use only. The severe drought of 2000 decimated the catfish population and fingerlings have not been available for re-stocking.

Paddling enthusiasts are welcome to explore these freshwater impoundments and view wildlife and their habitat.

Boat launches are available on the south side (two boat launch) and north side (provides access to the interior of the refuge) of the West Recreation Area. Cove Additionally, there is a twoslot saltwater launch on the north side which provides access to West Cove of Calcasieu Lake.

Sabine's Hog Island Gully Recreation Area has a boat launch available for anglers to access interior portions of the refuge and a two-slot saltwater launch which provides access to Calcasieu Lake.

Cast netting on Cameron Prairie (East Cove Unit only) and Sabine will be permitted only during the Louisiana Inland Shrimp season. All cast netters are reminded that the maximum refuge legal cast net is five feet (5 ft.) in length. Cast netting hours at Sabine are set from noon to sunset. Possession of all applicable Louisiana fishing licenses is required to cast net on the refuges. Cast netting is not permitted on Lacassine.





Prepare your lawn mower for spring

As Old Man Winter departs, many start to put shovels and snowthrowers into hibernation, only to trade them in for the lawnmower and a bag of fertilizer. It is estimated that more than two-thirds of all lawnmowers do not receive the annual tune-up necessary to run in tip-top shape.

Regular tune-ups reduce fuel consumption and emission levels and help to increase mower life and reliability. With springtime quickly approaching, now is the time to get your mower ready for the season with a few simple tune-up tasks.

Hopefully you remembered to run the gas tank empty before the mower was stored away last fall. If not, drain the old fuel. After completing the following maintenance items, replace with fresh gas. Gasoline older than 90 days can gel and clog the carburetor, hindering engine start up. Once the fuel tank is empty and the spark plug wire is disconnected, you're ready to get started.

Sharpen or replace the blade.

It is a good idea to get the blade sharpened once a year. A dull blade can harm the grass and make it more susceptible to disease. Have the blade professionally sharpened or replaced if there are large knicks or dings. Please refer to your owner's manual for additional information.

Change the oil.

Fresh oil keeps the engine lubricated and ensures that clean oil is continuously distributed to critical engine components, reducing friction. Manufacturers may recommend specific oil removal techniques so refer to your owner's manual before starting this process. Clean the oil fill area, remove the dipstick and place a catch can under the mower. Allow the oil to drain completely and if necessary, replace the drain plug. Refill the engine with

Change the spark plug.

Replacing the spark plug every spring ensures a consistent spark, reliable starting and improved fuel economy. Remove the old spark plug. Before installing the new plug, be sure to check its gap (refer to your owners manual for specifications). Once you have checked for proper gap, screw it in tight with your fingers. Then give it a 1/4 turn more with a socket.

Replace the air filter. A clogged air filter reduces the air/fuel ratio, resulting in higher fuel consumption and a rough running engine. The air filter should be cleaned or replaced each spring and checked periodically throughout the season. Check your owner's manual to see which type of filter your mower requires. There are generally two types: paper or foam. If your mower requires a foam filter, be sure to saturate the filter with fresh engine oil, wrap it in a clean rag and then squeeze out the excess oil before installing.

Lubricate moving parts.

Spray all linkages, cables and wheel areas with WD-40. Do not use oil to do this because oil will retain dirt and eventually clog the area.

Visit your local outdoor equipment dealer or hardware store for the necessary parts. When the tune-up is completed, replace the spark plug wire and fill the gas tank with fresh fuel. Your mower is now ready for the mowing

Shelf life of everyday vardcare products

Gasoline – Gasoline has a shelf life of around 90 days. Like milk, gasoline can go bad and may significantly harm a lawnmower's life span.

- Oil – Oil can have a shelf life of up to three years, but it is important to change mower engine oil at least once a year. *Remember: when discarding old fuel or oil, make sure to dispose of it properly in places such as a service station or waste disposal station.

- Grass Seed - Depending upon the storage, grass seeds can last two to three years. In order to test its vitality; plant a few seeds in a small flowerpot, keep them moist and cover them with a plastic bag. Good seeds will germinate within a week or two.

- Fertilizer – Fertilizer never goes bad. Even when it becomes compacted and hard, all you need to do is take a hammer and break it apart. However, spread the compacted pieces sparingly to not destroy the roots.

*Store all products in your garage. Do not keep in a shed or other type of outdoor storage, due to weather extremities (i.e. too hot in summer, too cold in winter), for this may alter product shelf life.

Abbeville Meridional, April 10, 1915. COLD KILLS CATTLE

It is impossible at present to estimate the exact loss from the unusually severe weather this year, but it has cost the cattlemen in the neighborhood of 10 percent of their herds pastured in Cameron Parish.

There are abut 25,000 head in the marshes this year and hides handled through the local dealers show large loss. There were about 3,000 head in the marshes that had been dipped last summer and they stood the winter much better than those not dipped.

STOCK LAW REQUESTED Rutherford

Warren Miller appeared before the police jury with a petition from a good many Oak Grove residents asking for a stock law in that area to prevent cattle from roaming at large.

Rutherford said the cattle were coming out of the sea marsh in herds of 50 to 100 head and down the Front Ridge road, and when they "Got hungry for clover, they jumped fences and got into yards."
