

Currently more than 70% complete, the Cameron LNG receipt terminal will be capable of processing up to 1.5 billion cubic feet of natural gas per day. Construction on the terminal is expected to be complete in late 2008.

Liquefied natural gas, or LNG, is natural gas that has been supercooled to minus 260 degrees Fahrenheit. At that temperature, natural Cameron announces a Palm gas condenses into a liquid.

When in liquid form, natural gas takes up to 600 times less space than in its gaseous state, which makes it feasible to transport over long distances. In the form of LNG, natural gas can be shipped from the parts of the world where it is abundant to where it is in demand.

Parish deputy badly hurt in accident

An off duty Cameron Parish deputy was seriously injured in a one vehicle accident early Saturday morning. The Sheriff's Office responded to a call at 12:29 a.m. that a vehicle had overturned on Hwy 27 in Cameron, just west of Ready Rental.

Investigator Jake McCain said Steve Sturlese, 37, was westbound and left the roadway near mile marker 35.9. Failing to make the curve, the 2006 GMC pickup went into the ditch and struck a driveway and culvert, causing it to roll over several times, ejecting the driver. There were no passengers.

Sturlese was transported to South Cameron Memorial Hospital and then air lifted Lafayette Hospital, where he remains in critical condition.



Property insurance for Parish School Board buildings will cost \$153,000 less than last year. M. B. Slocum, the Board's insurance consultant, presented a package totaling \$627,146, using four different carriers, at Monday afternoon's regular board

Slocum said the reduction is due to a softening of the market, more competition, and two years without a major hurricane in the U.S. One feature of the package is a separate \$5000 deductible for computer equipment. The deductible for buildings is \$100,000.

Slocum said that last year Cameron Parish was the only coastal school board to have full coverage on all its properties, and this year it will have full coverage also. The package does not include flood insurance, which is purchased separately.

The board learned that the school lunch program will have a \$197,000 shortfall this year, due to fewer students eligible for free and reduced lunches, less revenue at 4-day schools, and staff salary equalization for the 5-day schools.

Stephanie Rodrigue said it is very important that parents apply for free and reduced lunches, even if they don't think they qualify, because eligibility for the Title I federal grant program depends on the percent of eligible students. "Title I brings dollars for computers and other programs if enough students qualify," she said. "Right now more." After the storm, nearly all Cameron Parish students qualified, due to displacement, but more families are getting back into homes, reducing the numbers.

The 2008-09 school calendars were accepted, with all schools opening on the same date, Aug. 11. Four day schools will start at 7:50 a.m. and end at 3:47 p.m., with 25 minute lunch periods, to provide the required number of classroom minutes.

An earlier start date, Aug. 4, had been considered to allow shorter school days, but parent concerns prevailed. Shorter, 20 minute, lunch periods were also considered, but board members home area to prevent any objected.

The Corps' first offer had been \$5,600 for the easement, which it needs for a levee which was built in the wrong place, on School Board land adjacent to the Sabine Refuge.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

Also after the executive session, the board extended advanced costs\$100,000 to \$200,000 to vendors and consultants contracted through the Board's lawyers in their litigation against RSUI, wind insurance providers at the time of Hurricane Rita, and upheld the school district's decision on a student management

ADMINISTRATIVE CHANGES

Rodrigue presented a Superintendent draft of new cash management procedures and revised financial report forms. She hopes to purchase a new accounting program which will allow for more detail to be shown to board members. As an example of the need, the payroll system is still on a DOS based program, ancient by current computer standards. A new maintenance employee plan was also adopted, allowing the hiring for two maintenance employees instead of the current one. Under the new plan, each new employee will be responsible for two schools. Tommy Theriot was hired to take care of South Cameron and Johnson Bayou Schools, and James Doxey will cover Grand Lake and Hackberry Schools.

Each new maintenance employee will have a large and a smaller school, and each will work outside their appearance of taking time off for personal business.



Beef Cattle disease meeting set

The LSU AgCenter will sponsor a meeting on Monday, March 17, at 7 p.m. The meeting will be to discuss Anaplasmosis in Beef Cattle. The meeting will be held at the Calcasieu Extension Office, 7101 Gulf Highway located by the

Burton Coliseum. Anaplasmosis is an infectious disease of cattle, causing destruction of the red blood cells. The disease is caused by a minute parasite, Anaplasma marginale, found highway department had in the red blood cells of infected cattle.

It may be transmitted from infected animals to healthy animals by insects or surgical instruments. After the organism gains entry into a susceptible animal, the anaplasma parasite slowly reproduces in the animal's blood.

During an incubation period of 4 to 6 weeks, the animal remains healthy and shows no signs of being infected. Finally, after the parasite has reproduced many times and established itself in the red blood cells of the animal, the body attempts to destroy the para-

In doing so, the animal's defense system also destroys the infected red blood cells. The loss of a substantial number of red blood cells results in clinical anemia being observed in the infected animal. Anaplasmosis outbreaks are related to lack of a control program.



It Seems Just Like Yesterday

Where are Big Lake, Grand Lake and Sweetlake? Louisiana The Department of Highways

and the Cameron Police Jury are both confused about the matter.

The police jury was read a letter Monday from R. M. Flanagan, district traffic engineer, stating that the received some complaints about inconsistencies in highway signs related to the three areas.

"Upon investigation it is evident that there is controversial opinion of the geographical identification of these communities," Mr. Flanagan wrote.

The highway department asked the jury to furnish it with a map locating the three communities so the highway signs could be redone.

However, in discussing the matter the jurors weren't too sure as to the exact location either. Big Lake apparently refers to the old settlement on Calcasieu Lake, but in recent years the area has been shown on the map as Grand Lake is also the name of the school.

Sweetlake is located to the east of the Grand Lake area but doesn't seem to have any definite boundaries.

To further confuse the matter, Grand Lake is the name of the large lake in the eastern part of the parish near the Vermilion line and Calcasieu Lake, the large lake in the center of the parish, is often called Big Lake by residents.

Evidence that the community on Calcasieu Lake has been known as both Big Lake nd Grand Lake for many years is the following item from the "50 Years Ago" column of the American Press quoting a story in the Feb. 28, 1925, issue:

Grand Lake is a delightful summer resort on the north banks of the Calcasieu Lake in the upper portion of Cameron Parish.

It is situated on the east side of the Calcasieu River and is reached from Lake Charles by means of a modern highway that forms a section of State Route No. 42 from Shreveport south to the

Such a splendid location is Grand Lake for summer homes and bathing trips that the police jury a number of years ago built the Grand Lake Road to the Cameron Parish line and there private individuals took up the work and finished it on into the lit-

tle summer village. A toll gate was placed at its north end and when the receipts had paid the cost of construction the road was given to the parish of Cameron.



To finance these costs, the Co-Applicants propose to implement Financed Storm Cost Riders (Rider "FSC") Rates for each of the FSC storm cost recovery groups, effective by billing on the first day of the first billing cycle of the next revenue month following the issuance date of the system restoration bonds. Based upon a system restoration bond issuance date of June 2, 2008, Rider FSC will be implemented with the first billing cycle of July 2008. The FSC Rates, as periodically adjusted, will continue in effect until all system restoration bonds shall have been paid in full and all financing costs of the system restoration bonds shall have been recovered in full. Consistent with the LPSC 's determination in Order No. U-29203-B, the calculation of the FSC Rates will apply to all rate classes, including the Special Contracted Rate customers and will be nonbypassable, which means that, with limited exception, all existing and future LPSC-jurisdictional EGSL customers will be responsible for these charges. The FSC revenue to be recovered from EGSL's LPSC-jurisdictional customers on behalf of the LURC is estimated to be approximately \$37.0 million annually over an expected term

of approximately ten years. These amounts assume a June 2, 2008 issuance of system restoration bonds. If issuance of system restoration bonds occurs before June 2, 2008, carrying costs will be reduced resulting in a lower amount to be financed. Likewise if financing occurs after June 2, 2008, carrying costs will be increased resulting in a higher amount to be financed. Any insurance proceeds or governmental grants or aid reflecting permanent recovery of system restoration costs received before the issuance of the Financing Order would result in a reduction of the amount financed. Any such funds received after issuance of the Financing Order would not affect the amount financed. Rather, such funds, together with any interest earnings associated with those insurance proceeds or governmental grants or aid reflecting permanent recovery of system restoration costs received after the issuance of the Financing Order will be returned to customers of EGSL through the Storm Cost Offset Rider (Rider "SCO"). Rider SCO is addressed in the Ancillary Application to which EGSL and ELL are Co-Applicants. Under EGSL's proother adjustments required to compensate for certain costs or benefits relating to elements other than those relating to the financing transaction, including accumulated deferred income taxes, will be reflected in the Rider "SCO." The first-year annual SCO effect for EGSL is estimated to be a reduction to EGSL's LPSC-jurisdictional customers' bills of approximately \$1.5 million.

Using the method of allocation and rate design approved by the LPSC in Order No. U-29203-B and based upon the collective charges submitted by EGSL and the LURC in their Financing Application, currently EGSL estimates that the system restoration charge, billed on behalf of the LURC, on the monthly electric bill of one of EGSL's LPSC-jurisdictional residential customers through proposed Rider FSC using 1,000 kWh will be \$3.46 per month. EGSL estimates that the system restoration charge, billed on behalf of the LURC, on the monthly electric bill through proposed Rider FSC for one of EGSL's LPSC-jurisdictional Small General Service customers using 5,000 kWh will be \$22.30 per month and for one of EGSL's LPSC-jurisdictional General Service customers using 500 kW and 182,500 kWh will be \$455.42 per month. Athens Select plants told here

Over the last 10 years, a new revolution in herbaceous annual and perennial plants for landscape use has been developed, released and extensively marketed, according to LSU AgCenter horticulturist Dr. Allen Owings.

At the same time, many organizations, growers and universities have found older garden plants for improvement and/or re-introduction to the marketplace. These have included an increased number of All-America Selection winners, a new program for daylilies (All-American Daylilies), staterecommended winning plants (Louisiana Select, Mississippi Medallion) and

One program gaining recognition among landscape professionals, greenhouse growers, garden center managers and home gardeners in Louisiana is the Athens Select program.

Athens Select was founded in 1999 and is the result of years of plant evaluation efforts at the University of Georgia by horticulture professor Dr. Allan Armitage. Athens Select plants have been evaluated long term at the University of Georgia trial gardens and at other sites in the Southeast, including the LSU AgCenter's Ione Burden Center in Baton Rouge. These plants are promoted as "heat and humidity" tested. Although Louisiana has much more heat and humidity than Georgia, the vast majority of the Athens Select plants do well in AgCenter landscape plant evaluations.

Athens Select plants named include: Bourbon Street copper plant; Gail's Choice alternanthera; Linde Armstrong cleome; Red Ruffles Improved and Velvet Lime coleus; Susan's Little Gem; Firefly and Plum Mist cuphea; Cuban Gold duranta; Black Beauty, Chocolate and Tricolor graptophyllum; Panama Red hibiscus; New Gold and Athens Rose lantana; Ron Deal and Homestead Purple verbena; Stars and Stripes pentas; Tricolor hypericum; Azure Skies heliotropium; Prince and Princess pennisetum; Persian Shield stobilanthes; Rajin Cajun ruellia; Cajun Blue scaevola; Blue Sky setcreasea; and El Dorado turn-

Some of these plants may be recognizable, Owings says, pointing out that New lantana Homestead Purple verbena were previously named Louisiana Select plants. Red Ruffles Improved coleus is also sold in Louisiana as New Orleans Red. Athens Rose lantana is a new lantana that was has been a top performer in LSU AgCenter

landscape evaluations. Of the other varieties, the graptopyllums have been excellent performers also. These plants last from planting time in the spring through first killing frost. Plants can be grown in full sun and reach heights of 2-3 feet. These are foliage-type plants for the landscape and would be a good substitute

for sun coleus, Owings notes. The purple foliage strobilanthes called Persian Shield would be similar in performance to the graptophyllums. Owings says this is an old garden plant that never really fell out of favor in Louisiana as it did in some other states. This plant, along with named varieties of copper plants (like Bourbon Street), have the potential to make greats obtaining strides in increased use in the land-

Other plants that impress Owings are Ron Deal verbena, Stars and Stripes pentas and Linde Armstrong

The cucumber family, properly known as the cucurbitaceae (cu-cur-bit-A-ceeee), provides a wide variety of vegetables popular for the spring, summer and fall

home vegetable garden. Members of the cucumber family (cucurbits) that can be planted now and into April include summer squash, zucchini, winter squash, mirliton (South Louisiana), pumpkin, gourd, cucuzzi, watermelon, cantaloupe, cushaw, luffa and, of course, cucumber.

All of these vegetables produce vines that run along the ground or climb. Summer squash and zucchini vines actually are rather short and thick and so are more bushlike than other commonly grown members of the family. Some dwarf or "bush" types of cucumbers and other cucurbits also may be avail-

Members of the cucumber family produce separate male and female flowers, but they both occur on the same plant. Pollen must be transferred from the male flowers to the female flowers to obtain fruit set. The transfer of pollen is done by bees and other insects, so it is extremely important not to spray insecticides in the morning when bees are most active. Wait until late afternoon or early evening if insecticides must be used.

Male flowers produce the pollen that fertilizes the eggs in the ovary of the female flowers, which leads to fruit formation (it is the fruit of these vegetables that we harvest to eat). It is important to understand that only the female flowers actually develop into fruit. Cucumbers, for instance.

produce enormous numbers of male flowers compared to female flowers. I have talked to many gardeners who thought they were about to see a bumper crop of cucumbers - only to watch in stunned disappointment as all of the flowers fell off without producing cucumbers.

To distinguish the male flowers from the female flowers in cucurbits, it is necessary to look at the flowers closely. The showy part of the flower is often very similar. It is behind the flower where the differences between male and female flowers can be observed. The female flower possesses an ovary that looks like a miniature version of the fruit that will eventually

The female flower of a cucumber, for instance, is connected to the vine by what looks like a tiny cucumber, and the ovary of a female squash flower looks like a tiny squash. Male flowers, however, don't have these characteristics.

Cucurbits to grow

Squash is among the most popular and productive of the warm-season vegetables. Most families need to plant only a few plants to supply them with an abundance of squash, and now is an excellent time to plants seeds or transplants into the garden.

The short-vine, bushy summer squash plants are rather large (24 to 36 inches across), so make sure you space them properly in the garden. The fruit is harvested immature while it is young and tender (your thumbnail should easily penetrate the rind). Commonly grown summer squashes are yellow crookneck, yellow straightneck, zucchini, scallop and cocozelle.

Winter squash usually have a more vining growth habit and need more room to grow than summer squash. Their fruit is allowed to remain on the vine until fully matured - when the rind is hard (you cannot penetrate the rind with your thumbnail). The name winter squash does not refer to when they are grown, but rather to the fact that the fruits keep well and may be stored and consumed during the winter. Examples of winter squash grown locally are pumpkin, butternut, acorn, Turk's turban and Hubbard.

Cucumbers generally are easy vegetables to grow. Transplants generally are available, but as with most cucurbits, they are easily grown by planting seeds directly into the garden.

Most gardeners allow cucumber vines to grow along the ground, but it is highly recommended that you trellis them. Provide a sturdy trellis 3 feet to 4 feet tall and space plants along the base about 6 inches apart. Tests conducted at LSU AgCenter research stations show substantial yield increases for trellised cucumbers, as well as fewer disease problems and better quality cucumbers.

One of my favorite members of this family is the luffa gourd. Very easy to grow, luffa seeds may be planted directly into the garden now at the base of a 6-foot trellis. Then you'll need to thin the plants to 1 foot to 2 feet apart when they come up.

This luffa vine does triple duty in the garden. With attractive green leaves that stay healthy all summer and large, bright-yellow male flowers, it is good-looking enough to be used as an ornamental annual vine.


In addition, the fruit is edible when 6 inches to 8 inches long and can be sliced, breaded and fried like okra. Indeed, two old common names for this gourd – climbing okra and Chinese okra refer to its similarity to okra in flavor when fried.

When the gourd is mature and the skin turns brown, it can be peeled to reveal the most remarkable aspect of this plant – a tough network of fibers that make an excellent sponge.

When a plant will provide beautiful flowers, edible fruit and a sponge to clean up with, well, you can't ask for much more than that.
