## Parish's population is anyone's guess

What is the current population of Cameron Parish?

No one knows for sure since a large number of residents lost their homes and left the parish after Hurricane Rita in September, 2005.

A story this week in the American Press suggested that the parish's pre-Rita population was "less than 20,000."

The fact is that the population has always been a lot less than 20,000 but usually has been in the 9,000 to 10,000 range.

According to the Louisiana Almanac, the parish's 1994 population was estimated at 9,681 at that time. The 2000 figure was 9,991.

However, the population figure was as low as 6,909 in 1960.

(For year's the parish had the smallest population of any parish in the state. However in recent years Tensas parish in northern Louisiana has assumed this "honor" with only 6,618 residents listed in 2004.)

However since Rita, Cameron again probably will have the smallest population. The American Press arti-

cle estimated the current parish population as "less than 500" which is obviously incorrect since Hackberry's and Grand Lake/Sweetlake's populations were not seriously affected by the storm and have in fact grown due to many lower Cameron residents seeking new homes there.

Lower Cameron parish still has only a small fraction of its original residents since most of the homes were destroyed and have not been rebuilt.

But this has been offset somewhat by residents moving back to live in FEMA trailers until they can rebuild.

The number of people actually living in all of Cameron parish now is anybody's guess but probably exceeds 5,000 and will continue to grow.

Tina Horn, Cameron Parish Administrator, says no one has an accurate estimate on the parish's population. She said she plans to ask the jury's road crew to make a count of occupied houses and trailers on rainy days when they cannot do road work. This will give a better idea of the population, she said.

## Delinquent tax list is published

Elsewhere in this issue of the Pilot is a listing of property in Cameron Parish on which the 2006 taxes have not been paid.

If the taxes are not paid by Wednesday, May 9, 2007, the Cameron Sheriff Dept., which is the tax collector, will put the property up for sale at the front door of the courthouse in Cameron.

Interest and advertising cost will be added to the taxes.

The list of property in the current advertisement is for owners which the tax collector does not have a current address. Another listing property for which there are addresses will be run at a later date.



## Insurance settlement told

Louisiana's state-run insurer has agreed to a mass settlement with more than 100 policyholders, a deal believed to be the first of its kind in the state since Hurricanes Katrina and Rita spawned thousands of lawsuits, an attorney for the homeowners said Thursday.

Citizens Property Insurance Corp., Louisiana's insurer of last resort, has agreed to pay about \$6.6 million to 167 policyholders in Cameron Parish who sued Citizens for refusing to cover damage from Rita in

September 2005, according to attorney Jennifer Jones.

Jones said 102 of her clients signed off on their share of the settlement on Wednesday. She expects at least 20 more policyholders to accept their portion of the deal on Thursday. Payments will be made within 30 days, she added.

"I know it doesn't seem like a lot of money . . . but I consider it to be a very fair offer in most cases," Jones said, noting that some of the homeowners had policy limits as small as \$10,000.

Citizens CEO Terry Lisotta confirmed that the

company has made settlement offers to Jones' clients but said he hasn't received a final report on the terms.

Lisotta said a possible snag in the deal remains to be resolved. Citizens has balked at Jones' push for the insurer to refund premiums that her clients have paid since Rita.

"The law says if you have coverage, you have to collect the premiums," he said.

Jones said the negotiations over premium refunds are not a "deal-breaker" and are separate from the mass settlement of property claims.

appointment is for the remainder of Howerton's term. Nunez is Assistant Principal at Bell City High School, and his wife teaches at Grand Lake School. He is originally from Creole.

Howerton recommended Nunez, as did Rachel Abadie, the remaining Grand Lake board member. When asked, Nunez said he does plan to run for election in the fall. In the past, the Board has asked appointees to pledge not to run, but such a pledge was never binding, according to Dr. Doug Chance, School Superintendent.

The Board also appointed a new principal for Johnson Bayou School, and he is former principal Gene Reynolds, who was the only applicant. Current Principal Hayes "Pete" Picou is retiring at the end of this term.

### INSURANCE

The Board heard somewhat good news from insurance consultant M. B. Slocum. Six months ago, the Board was only able to buy a six month building policy, and it cost \$419,000, plus a 15%

assessment for Louisiana Citizens. This month, the Board is able to buy 12 months of insurance for \$678,804, and most of the assessment has been cancelled. There is a 5% wind damage deductible, however, up from 2% last fall.

The Board was only able to acquire \$17.5 million in "named storm" wind damage coverage, but Slocum said that is more than some other districts and more than they could get six months ago. School Board buildings worth \$35,404,989 are insured for full coverage (fire, tornado, liability, etc.) other than named storms and terrorism.

Slocum explained that if more temporary buildings or new structures are acquired in the next year they will be added to the schedule. He also said he is sure that, if we have another year free of hurricanes in the Gulf or on the Louisiana coast, more insurance companies will offer coverage next year. He expects to be able to get lower premiums and better coverage if that happens.

## Permit sought for new Sabine Lake bridge

The Louisiana and Texas Transportation Depts. have applied for a Coast Guard permit for the construction of a replacement bridge for the Sabine Causeway Bridge between Cameron Parish and Jefferson County at the lower end of Sabine Lake near Port Arthur west of Johnson Bayou.

The proposed project involves replacing the existing State Highway 82 swing span bridge with a fixed span bridge on essentially the same alignment. The replacement bridge will be located immediately south of the existing structure, which will be demolished and removed upon completion of the new bridge. The existing bridge will remain open to vehicular traffic and will operate nor-

mally to pass navigation during construction of the new bridge.

Minimum navigational clearances are as follows:

Existing: Horizontal: 80 feet between fenders, normal to the channel axis.

Vertical: Closed position: 9.5 feet. Open position: Unlimited.

Proposed: Horizontal: 114 feet between fenders, normal to the channel axis.

Vertical: 65.5 above Mean High Water elevation 1.17 feet.

A proposal has been made to leave the Causeway Bridge span on the Louisiana side intact to be used as a fishing pier. The Cameron Police Jury has endorsed this proposal.

#### PILOT WRITERS RECEIVE AWARDS

Two Pilot correspondents were among top winners in the Louisiana Press Women's 1973 writing contest.

Mrs. Geneva Griffith of Oak Grove and Mrs. Bernice Stewart of Lake Arthur received their awards at the annual awards banquet held Friday in Alexandria.

Mrs. Griffith received two first and two third place awards for American Press articles and one first place award for a Pilot feature. The Pilot feature was on publicity and promotion and covered a series of articles and pictures from February to October on the Creole Levee Road when its badly eroded condition was creating a danger to motorists.

A news picture showing the collapse of the dock during the Southwest Louisiana Fishing Rodeo in Cameron on July 4 and a feature picture on the alligator that attacked a La. Wildlife and Fisheries truck on the Creole Road and backed up traffic for miles; each placed first in the photography division of the contest.

A third place in photography was in the portrait picture category and was of Mrs. Jerry Nunez, "Lady Alligator Hunter."

An interview with Mrs. Edna Theriot Miller entitled "Only Woman Pilot, Cameron Native, 83, Recalls River Days" placed third in that division.

## Debris team members are honored for saving a life

Four Cameron Parish debris team members received the Department of Army Civilian Award for Humanitarian Service recently at the Louisiana Recovery Field Office (LA-RFO) in New Orleans.

The award is equivalent of the Department of Defense's Humanitarian Service Medal used to recognize military members for life and property saving actions. The presentation was made by Michael Park, the LA-RFO's director.

The award recipients were recognized for their attention to detail and quick reaction on May 4, 2006, in saving the life of a truck driver delivering debris to the Wilkerson landfill in Cameron Parish in southwest Louisiana.

Award recipients were:  
 \* Justin Bult, a Lake Charles Corps contract recovery employee  
 \* Debra Christie, a Tulsa natural resources specialist and mission volunteer  
 \* Robert McKechnie, a Detroit lock and dam mechanic and mission volunteer

\* Yvett Young, a Sweetlake Corps contract recovery employee

According to on-scene medical personnel, had the team not taken immediate action to treat the victim for heat stroke on site, the driver would certainly have perished.

The driver had stopped at the site's control tower after changing a flat tire in the dump when the tower monitor team noticed he was exhibiting the signs of heat stroke.

The quality assurance team swung into action, wetting down paper towels with ice and ice water from one of their coolers to help cool the driver. They provided available fluids and asked about medications and medical conditions.

After being treated by on-scene and hospital medical teams, the driver was released to go back to work two days later. The driver made a complete recovery.

The team had just completed safety training that week in which heat-related conditions, symptoms, and actions to be taken were covered by the local Safety Office. A heat stress fact sheet and OSHA quick card had been stapled to the wall of the tower.

## Deadline near on program

Sign-up for supplemental disaster programs to assist eligible farmers and ranchers in Louisiana who suffered losses due to Hurricane Katrina or Rita in 2005 will end March 30, 2007. According to Kirk L. Smith, County Executive Director in the Calcasieu-Cameron Parish Farm Service Agency office (FSA), all interested producers must apply by this deadline date, and are reminded that there are no late-filed provisions for any of these programs. (Two weeks will be allowed after March 30, 2007 to provide supporting documentation, such as farm plan documentation and highly erodible wetland compliance determinations.)

These disaster programs are administered by the Farm Service Agency on behalf of the Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC). Additional information related to the programs may be found online at <http://www.fsa.usda.gov>, by "clicking on" Disaster Assistance Programs.

On the other hand, he said it will be hard to get builder's risk insurance for the rebuilding of the Central Office and South Cameron School in the near future.

### REBUILDING PLANS

Committee reports were given on meetings between architects, staff and faculty for both new buildings. At South Cameron, teachers gave input into the size of elementary classrooms and the location of the vocational agricultural unit, as well as the bus canopy. Board members Dot Theriot and Marvin Trahan said the meeting was productive and teachers and staff liked the overall design.

Central Office staff gave input regarding changes in interior layout, but these changes would not affect the size of the building. The Cameron Elementary kindergarten slab and the former Cameron Parish Library slab will be removed to make way for the new office, which will face Marshall Street. Soil borings are being done at the site to determine the type of support needed for the structure.

Architects will need up to six months to complete working drawings and prepare bid packages, and receive public bids. After a contract is signed, it could take three years or more to finish South Cameron School. Theriot and other board members wanted the public to know that everything is being done to get these buildings built.

Work is proceeding on the South Cameron gym renovation, according to facilities supervisor Doug Welch. Lockers have been removed from the locker rooms, metal framing had been installed in the lobby/concession stand area, the outside hallway has been removed and lowered, and testing on the water lines has commenced.

Welch said the contractor has offered to pay extra to suppliers for faster delivery in order to meet the competition deadlines. Welch expects the gym to be ready for graduation in May, even though the bleachers and gym floor will not have been installed.

Playgrounds for South Cameron and Johnson Bayou are being designed, and will have to go out for public bid. The new equipment must meet current standards, including cushioned landing materials for safety.

### BUS POLICY

In consideration of the difficulty lower Cameron Parish residents are having in rebuilding, the board voted to continue to bus South Cameron and Johnson Bayou students for one more year, but only from the parish line. Supt. Chance said, "I never expected in November of 2005 how FEMA, building codes and insurance issues would make rebuilding so difficult."

He expects to use only two buses on the east side of the parish, possibly meeting at Hackett's Corner and transferring riders to one bus if the need is reduced as the year progresses. The cost will be minimal, he said.

### SPECIAL PROJECTS TABLED

Requests from Grand Lake board member Rachel Abadie and board president Loston McEvers for special projects funds were tabled until after the Mar. 31 tax renewal election.

Abadie recounted the history of special physical education projects begun in 2004, noting that the Grand Lake track scheduled for 2007 was the only planned project not yet completed. She requested the board complete the project with special projects funds, and also address the need for a softball field for the school.

An overlay for the Grand Lake Track would cost approximately \$100,000. A competitive softball field, with bleachers, press box and restrooms, is estimated to cost \$250,000 to \$275,000. A basic playing field would cost about \$60,000, according to Chance.

At this time, the special projects fund has about \$444,000 in it. Such funds have been used in the past for other physical education type projects including the track repairs at South Cameron prior to the storm and the work at the Hackberry track.

McEvers said that South Cameron needs a tractor and other maintenance equipment costing \$26,000 as well as weight room equipment costing \$22,000. He proposed allocating \$50,000 each to South Cameron, Grand Lake (for a ball field), and Johnson Bayou (for stage curtains, driveway and bleachers). He said the rest should wait until after the tax election, in case the remainder was needed to cover a shortfall.

Theriot, seconded by Nunez, moved to table the entire question until after the election.

### OTHER BUSINESS

The Board voted to buy two new school buses with Restart grant funds. The cost will be \$140,014. Other Restart funds have been used to purchase special education buses, textbooks, and technology, and to pay some salaries and benefits. A total of \$2.7 million has been granted to Cameron Parish schools by the program, with \$2.5 having been received to date. An additional \$9 million has been requested for the next round of grants, according to Willyne Kestel.

In personnel matters, the board granted leaves to Maranda Busby, JBS teacher; Cherie Myers, GLS teacher; and Mona Batts, SCHS teacher. Resignations were accepted for Paul Poole, GLS custodian, and Jessica Badon, JBS child specific aide.

All but a handful of the 167 policyholders included in the settlement are property owners whose homes were reduced to slabs by Rita. Jones said Citizens was intent on settling slab cases because they are among the most contentious of disputed claims.

"When there's nothing left there, it's difficult to prove whether the damage was from wind or water," said Jones, who also is an assistant district attorney in Cameron, near the Texas border.

Citizens and other insurers say their homeowner policies cover damage from wind but not from rising water, including wind-driven storm surge. Rita's storm surge extended for miles inland, damaging or destroying thousands of homes in southwestern Louisiana.

Friday, Louisiana Attorney General Charles Foti visited Cameron for the first of several meetings with homeowners on the insurance industry's handling of claims after Katrina and Rita. Foti said in a written statement that he is interested in looking at "possible discrepancies between engineering reports produced by insurers and those provided by homeowners."

Insurance companies already have reached individual settlements with hundreds of homeowners in Louisiana who sued in the wake of Katrina and Rita, but Citizens' agreement this week is believed to be the state's first mass settlement of lawsuits.

In Mississippi, State Farm Insurance Cos. reached a mass settlement of lawsuits in January. The Bloomington, Ill.-based insurer agreed to pay about \$80 million to settle out of court with up to 640 policyholders who sued the company over its refusal to cover damage from Katrina's storm surge.

Jones said she is trying to negotiate a mass settlement with State Farm on behalf of about 150 policyholders in Cameron, but the talks have "bogged down" in recent weeks.

Citizens, a quasi-state agency, writes policies for home and business owners who are unable to purchase coverage from private companies. About 2,000 policyholders have sued Citizens over damage from Katrina and Rita.

Founded in 1994, Angel Food Ministries started out

by helping to feed 34 families in Monroe, Ga., and has since expanded to serve families throughout 33 states. The groceries are sold in a quantity that can fit into a medium-sized box at \$25 each, and consist of both fresh and frozen items.

Each month's menu is different than the previous month and all food is the same high quality that you would purchase from a grocery store.

There are no second-hand items, damaged or outdated goods. Each box contains enough food to assist feeding a family of four for about one week, or a single senior citizen for almost a month.

There are no qualifications for the program or applications to fill out, nor is there a limit to the amount of boxes an individual can purchase. Also offered are specialty boxes that contain items such as steaks and gourmet coffee.

Food sales and distribution are handled by church host sites, that are manned by volunteers.

Items on the Angel Food menu for March include 26 ounces chicken and stuffing baked dinner, four eight ounce hamburger steaks, two pounds lasagna dinner, five pounds breaded frying chicken, 12 ounces Philly steak portions, three pounds popcorn chicken, one pound hot dogs, 16 ounces gourmet bean soup, seven and one-half pounds macaroni and cheese, seven and one-half ounces southern style biscuit mix, 24 ounces steak cut fries, 16 ounces peas and carrots, 16 ounces turnip greens, 15 ounces sliced pears, eight ounces pineapple chunks, 10 ounces peanut butter, 13.75 ounce/10 count waffles and a dessert item all for \$25.

## Ethics code still applies to parish

Even though much of Cameron Parish remains in ruins and its population is greatly reduced, officials must still comply with the state's ethics code.

Hans E. Petersen, superintendent of Cameron Parish Water and Wastewater District 1, had asked the ethics board to allow the district to buy from Wendall Murphy's hardware and electrical supply store.

Wendall Murphy is district president J. C. Murphy's brother.

The ethics code prohibits Wendall Murphy and Wendall's Electric from entering into transaction with the district as long as his brother is district president, wrote state ethics staff attorney Michael Dupree.

Petersen acknowledged the law prohibits the district from doing business with Wendall Murphy, but because Hurricane Rita devastated the parish in September 2005 and reduced the parish's population, the district could be exempted from the law.

Petersen said due to the limited number of businesses in the parish, the district is being forced to go to out-of-parish businesses for "many items."

"At present no facilities are available for storing inventory supplies, and going out of parish requires unnecessary expenses which include operators time and truck expenses," he wrote the ethics board.

"Are there any exceptions that can be made to allow us to do business with this hardware and electrical store at this time until things improve in Cameron?"

The code prohibits a public servant, their immediate family or a legal entity in which he owns 25 percent from bidding or entering into any contract that is under the supervision of the public servant's agency.



## Attorney General gives support to the parish

"It's past time to talk and time to put up some money," said Louisiana Attorney General Charles Foti speaking at a meeting in the Cameron Court House last Friday. The occasion was an all-day meeting set by the Attorney General between his Consumer Protection staff and homeowners who are still having problems dealing with property damage claims and their insurance companies.

Foti said it has been a year and a half and people still can't get any closure. He would like to get his office involved, but by state law his office cannot prosecute any insurance company. Unlike the recent case in Mississippi, the Louisiana consumer protection law specifically exempts insurance cases from being filed by the Attorney General's Office. That oversight is given to the Insurance Commissioner.

While some companies were good about paying wind claims, Foti would like to talk to the remaining insurance companies to try to get them to settle claims. If that fails he would like the legislature to give him permission to sue. He said Louisiana Citizens

has recently agreed to settle a number of claims and State Farm has said it will take another look. The greatest area of concern is where there are differing engineering reports.

Consumer protection attorney Isabelle Wingter said she had heard a number of interesting stories from residents, such as a neighborhood of 11 houses where all but one of the homeowners were paid for wind damage. She said the meetings provided a great opportunity. "Unless we really talk to residents, we don't know the full story. Each one has a little bit of information, which gives us more evidence to present and say 'You're not being fair.'"

Foti said he is looking at four parishes that have a very similar situation to the one in Mississippi, Cameron, Vermilion, St. Bernard, and Plaquemines. Meetings began in Cameron, where a steady stream of unhappy insurance customers met with staff attorneys placed around the court room. Foti assured them, "We have top people here today to see what we can do to get something done. Make sure you know you have a lifeline, that state government is in there helping."

## Mosquito control folks on the job in the parish

Mosquito Control operations are up in full swing with the arrival of warmer weather. We are checking the whole parish for increased day time and night time mosquito activity. We will be spraying the areas of the parish with the highest mosquito populations as needed until they are reduced down to tolerable levels.

We are also beginning to send samples of mosquitoes from every community throughout the parish on a weekly basis to be tested for the presence of mosquito-borne diseases. We will also be accepting dead blue jays cardinals, and crows found in our citizens' yards.

If you find one of these species dead in your yard call 905-5941 to have one of our inspectors pick it up for testing for West Nile Virus. The state lab will not accept any birds that are decaying, full of ants, or have a bad smell.

This time of year another flying insect appears throughout the parish usually covering the exterior walls of houses in the afternoons and early evening. These insects or called "midges" and do not pose any public health threat, and we are not licensed to

spray them. They look almost identical to a mosquito, but if you look closely they have no proboscis, which is the long tubular part of a mosquito's mouth which is used to suck blood and nectar.

You can buy Permethrin at local feed stores and hardware stores to spray your walls, which is very effective at reducing the numbers of midges around your house.

There are many nights in the spring in which our control efforts get cancelled or do not get completed. We have to follow the labels of our chemicals. Violation of these labels is a federal offense. They all state that we can not spray when the winds exceed 10 miles an hour. They also state that we should apply our chemicals when the mosquitoes are most active between the hours of dusk and dawn.

Over the years we have noticed that the mosquitoes are not very active, nor do we get good results in reducing the mosquito populations when the temperature drops below 55 degrees, so we don't spray once the temperature drops below that level. We also do not allow the trucks or plane to spray in fog or rain for the safety of our workers and our citizens.

## Rental property sought for hurricane victims

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) is reaching out to victims of Hurricanes Katrina and Rita by aiding them in their search to find rental properties.

The FEMA Rental Resources Department has been contacting property managers, housing associations, owners and real estate companies to gather and maintain rental property information. To date, the department has identified approximately 2,000 apartments in both Jefferson and Orleans Parishes, 1,000 in Baton Rouge and nearly 400 in both St. Tammany Parish and the Lake Charles area. Additional units are available in almost every parish in the state.

FEMA encourages anyone displaced by the hurricanes, whether they are living in a

FEMA trailer or elsewhere in the country, to call the FEMA Rental Resources Department at 1-888-294-2822, from Monday to Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. A FEMA representative will assist callers in finding the rental that meets their location and price range needs.

Applicants can also search for rental property at <https://rims.fema.gov/hportal/home.htm>, the FEMA housing portal containing a consolidated database of all rentals located by FEMA, or at [lahousingsearch.org](http://lahousingsearch.org), a housing site maintained by the state of Louisiana. Web sites are updated continuously, so applicants should check back often.



Dear Editor:

We are writing in response to Teddy Broussard's recent letter to the editor of the Lake Charles American Press. We did not see Mr. Broussard's letter run in the Cameron Pilot, but we prefer to respond to this publication, since we consider it to be far more concerned with the interests of this parish.

As attorneys, we are committed to the right of every citizen to express his opinion. We are equally committed to the truth, and to our obligation to speak up when facts are misrepresented.

Mr. Broussard's allegation that the District Attorney's Office does not care about the citizens of Cameron Parish is not true. We have all worked non-stop since Hurricane Rita to promote recovery of Cameron Parish.

The fallacy of Mr. Broussard's argument is based on his misconception of the respective roles of the Police Jury, the District Attorney's Office, and FEMA. The Police Jury is the governing body of our Parish. In Cameron Parish, the District Attorney's Office serves as legal advisor to the Police Jury. In other parishes, the governing body of the parish has outside counsel, who are compensated for their time. Our District Attorney's Office is not paid any additional amounts for time spent providing legal services to either the Police Jury or any other parish board. For Mr. Broussard to insinuate that the members of the District Attorney's Office are motivated by personal gain in their representation of the Police Jury is blatantly false.

FEMA is a federal agency. The rules and regulations of FEMA are made by Congress - not the Police Jury, not the District Attorney, not the Governor. The local governing authorities are "free" to accept or reject these regulations. This freedom is qualified by that fact that if FEMA (not the Police Jury or the District Attorney) determines that the parish is not in compliance with FEMA regulations, the Parish will lose its eligibility for both disaster assistance and flood insurance.

Without federal disaster assistance, Cameron Parish would have had no electricity following Hurricane Rita. We can get by without a lot of things, but electricity is not one of them. We would have received no federal funding for the rebuilding of publicly owned buildings. Our new hospital is under construction and will cost, all told, over \$25 million. This is just one building. The cost of restoring our schools and other public buildings is so prohibitive that we are confident in saying that none of these structures will ever have been built without federal assistance. We cannot envision a viable community with no schools and no medical care. The other benefits, including clean-up, are simply too numerous to mention.

Mr. Broussard has stated many times that he does not want or need flood insurance. Good for him. Since Hurricane Rita, we have spoken with hundreds and hundreds of Cameron Parish residents and have not encountered one single person whose National Flood Insurance Policy was not paid. Collecting flood insurance has not been the problem - the problem has been with collecting from private, homeowner's insurers. This is an on-going battle.

The problem with Mr. Broussard's reasoning is that it ignores the basic principle of democracy - that we all must sacrifice for the will of the public good. If the Police Jury were to reject the flood management plan, NO ONE COULD HAVE FLOOD INSURANCE. While this is of no concern to Mr. Broussard, it is of great concern to us, not only on our own behalf, but on the behalf of every other person in this parish, who wants to rebuild more than "a little something." IF WE CANNOT GET FLOOD INSURANCE, WE CANNOT BORROW MONEY. IF WE CANNOT BORROW MONEY, WE CANNOT REBUILD. IF WE CANNOT REBUILD, WE CANNOT COME HOME.

NONE OF US LIKES THE FEMA REGULATIONS. Mr. Broussard is apparently upset that the members of the Police Jury were not rude enough to FEMA representatives. Those of us who work in the parish government disagree with FEMA every single day, but we have nothing to gain by earning the animosity of those with such power over us. Our goal must be to work within the framework of the federal regulations to maximize freedom of property owners, while preserving the benefits of federal assistance.

We are working hard to achieve this goal. We are neither lazy nor greedy. Moreover, Mr. Broussard does not have the monopoly on his professed love for Cameron Parish. We all love Cameron Parish. The way to prove it is to work hard for the good of everyone, every day, not to make unwarranted and undeserved personal attacks based on misinformation.

The permit will cover lands owned by Miami Corporation in Cameron and Vermilion Parishes, except west of Hwy. 27 (Cameron-Creole Watershed), Willow Lake, south of Hwy. 82 in Grand Chenier and around all water control structures.

In the Securitization Application, EGS has requested that the LPSC issue a Financing Order authorizing the securitization of those storm recovery costs and those storm reserves found by the Commission to be appropriately financed by debt secured by storm recovery charges within the meaning of La. R.S. 45:1227 (15). The Securitization Application establishes the amount of storm recovery costs to be securitized of approximately \$219 million for the Louisiana operations of EGS, which amount includes carrying costs. EGS also is seeking, in said Financing Order, consent from the Commission regarding the use of proceeds of such funds. In addition, EGS is seeking to securitize approximately \$87 million to devote to storm reserves and approximately \$5.8 million for certain upfront financing and debt retirement costs.

To securitize these costs, EGS proposes to implement Securitized Storm Cost Recovery Rider (Rider "SSCR") Rates for each of the SSCR rate classes, effective with the first billing cycle of the month following the issuance date of the storm recovery bonds. Based upon a storm recovery bond issuance date of September 27, 2007, Rider SSCR will become effective with the first billing cycle of October 2007. The SSCR Rates, as periodically adjusted, will continue in effect until all storm recovery bonds shall have been paid in full and all financing costs of the storm recovery bonds shall have been recovered in full. Consistent with the LPSC Staff's recommendation, the calculation of the SSCR Rates will apply to all rate classes, including the Special Contracted Rate customers and will be nonypassable, which means that all existing and future LPSC-jurisdictional EGS customers will be responsible for these charges. The annual SSCR revenue to be recovered for EGS's LPSC-jurisdictional operations is estimated to be approximately \$26.3 million.

These amounts assume a September 27, 2007 issuance of storm recovery bonds occurs before September 27, 2007, carrying costs will be reduced resulting in a lower amount to be securitized. Likewise if securitization occurs after September 27, 2007, carrying costs will be increased resulting in a higher amount to be securitized. Any insurance proceeds or governmental grants or aid reflecting permanent recovery of storm costs received before the issuance of the Financing Order would result in a reduction of the amount securitized. Any such

funds received after issuance of the Financing Order would not affect the amount securitized. Rather, such funds, together with any interest earnings and any adjustments to the carrying charges associated with those insurance proceeds or governmental grants or aid reflecting permanent recovery of storm costs received after the issuance of the Financing Order will be returned to the customers of EGS through the Securitization Storm Cost Offset Rider (Rider "SSCO"). Under EGS's proposal, other adjustments required to compensate for certain costs or benefits related to the storms, including accumulated deferred income taxes, and certain effects of the securitization of storm recovery costs, including local franchise taxes, will be reflected in the Rider "SSCO". The annual SSCO effect for EGS is estimated to be a reduction to EGS's LPSC-jurisdictional customers' bills of approximately \$1 million.

Using the method of allocation and rate design recommended by the LPSC Staff and based upon the collective charges submitted by EGS in its Securitization Application, currently EGS estimates that the storm recovery charge on the monthly electric bill of one of its LPSC-jurisdictional residential customers through proposed Rider SSCR using 1,000 kWh will be \$4.08 per month. EGS estimates that the storm recovery charge on the monthly bill through proposed Rider SSCR for one of its LPSC-jurisdictional Small General Service customers using 5,000 kWh will be \$27.00 per month and for one of its LPSC-jurisdictional General Service customers using 500 kW and 182,500 kWh will be \$520.13 per month. EGS proposes that the amount of the storm recovery charge applied to each customer class be calculated based upon the allocation methodology and billing determinants specified in the Commission's Financing Order as to EGS. Currently EGS estimates that the first year's Rider SSCO imposed on the monthly electric bill of one of its LPSC-jurisdictional residential customers through proposed Rider SSCO using 1,000 kWh will be a credit of \$0.08 per month, the first year's Rider SSCO imposed on the monthly bill of one of its LPSC-jurisdictional Small General Service customers using 500 kW and 182,500 kWh will be a credit of \$0.08 per month, the first year's Rider SSCO imposed on the monthly bill of one of its LPSC-jurisdictional General Service customers using 500 kW and 182,500 kWh will be a credit of \$10.95 per month. EGS proposes that the amount of Rider SSCO applied to each customer class be calculated based upon the allocation methodology and billing determinants specified in the Commission's Financing Order.
