Wetland Walkway reopens on Sabine Wildlife Refuge

that infamous Sept. 24, both visitors and wildlife are coming back to the Creole Nature Trail All-American Road. The re-opening of the Wetland Walkway at Sabine National Wildlife Refuge is the latest triumph for the area, but more are in the pipeline.

"It's been a long haul," says Creole Nature Trail District Chairman Monte Hurley, "but this area, and way of life, is worth the fight." An unanticipated Enhancements Grant, received in early March, allowed the Creole Nature Trail to accept the bid to repair the two turn-outs south of the Sabine Refuge-completing the west side of the trail from Sulphur to just before Holly Beach. "The Creole Nature Trail is very fortunate to have supporters who believe in the trail as strongly as we do" continues

Another grant from the Highway Federal Administrations competitive National Scenic Byways grants has provided funding to build a walkway and observation tower at Pintail Drive on Cameron Prairie National Wildlife Refuge. "The plans have been drawn but are going through some final tweaks before being sent to the Department of Transportation for bidding." reports Capt. Sammie Faulk, Vice Chairman of the Creole Nature Trail District. "The plans should be at DOTD for their review and approval by late spring, and we hope to have bids in by the end of this year so that construction of the walkway can begin in

In addition to re-building efforts and due to Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding obtained by the Southwest Louisiana Convention & Visitors Bureau, the Creole Nature Trail is also in the process of compiling a new promotional video to attract visitors, and visitor dollars, to the area. "Now, more than ever, it is critical that we educate visitors on the role our coastal wetlands play in the food-chain and economy

of this nation," says Faulk.
The Creole Nature Trail National Scenic Byway District board is moving forward to secure land and obtain funding for a center in Cameron Parish which will be associated with the National Hurricane Museum and Science Center located in Calcasieu Parish. The Cameron Parish facility will memorialize the losses sustained due to Hurricane Audrey in 1957 and Hurricane Rita in 2005, and Audrey in 1957

Building code penalties considered by P. Jurors

Penalties of up to \$500 for building code and elevation violations are being discussed by the Cameron Parish Police Jury . The penalties were on the agenda of a special voting meeting held Monday, March 24, at 3

Assistant District Attorney Tom Barrett presented a copy of the Calcasieu Parish ordinance, which provides for a lengthy procedure, but he recommended sending complaints directly to court.

Barrett said the Jury could decide to provide the judge with a penalty of "up to \$500" for each offense or to set a range depending on the severity of the violation.

The main problem with the proposed ordinance, Barrett said, was that he needed more time to determine the Jury's legal authority to impose such fines. The measure was tabled for further review. It may be discussed further at the agenda meeting set for 3 p.m March 31 at the OEP office.

COMPANY HIRED

Jurors voted to hire a company to manage the parish's entire FEMA project worksheet (PW) process. Royal Engineers and Consultants, New

seven applicants interviewed by a committee. Parish Treasurer Bonnie Conner said Royal has extensive experience in post-Katrina FEMA PW work, and was recommended highly by several references.

The company will be responsible for reviewing and overseeing the over 300 FEMA PWs pending for the parish, with special focus on 60 or so priority projects. They will make sure the parish gets as much funding as it is entitled to, and will follow the process through to the final audits, which could be several years from now.

Subdivision planned at Hackberry

Charles has applied for a Coastal Use Permit to construct the 6.79 acre North Residential Riverside Subdivision containing 30 home sites and five docks adjacent to the Ship Channel

at Hackberry. Approximately cubic yards of native material will be impacted by dredging to construct a septic system, underground utilities, and ditches. An additional 11,784 cubic yards of fill material will be hauled onsite and placed on most of the site to elevate roads, lots, and driveways.

Approximately cubic yards of concrete will be poured and 39 cubic yards of top soil added for improvements to the project site.


Cameron **Officers** graduate

MURIA FIRE STATION Parish Engineer Lonnie

Harper presented plan changes for the Muria Fire Station which will add \$82,000 to the cost of repairs. The changes were suggested by the FEMA hazard mitigation committee, which wants more water resistant wall coverings, insulation, and doors than initially designed.

Harper said the work on the building was stopped immediately when word of the possible changes came in. Approval of the plan change will allow work to resume. Another suggestion, installation of flood vents in the walls, was not acted

The Muria Water Board also asked for a plan change to allow a control panel to be moved into the building. The panel, which cost over \$100,000, was placed outside on a pole after the storm. It controls the functioning of two water wells. The board would like to move it indoors, possibly to a higher level, while the repairs are being made. The \$15,000 to \$18.000 cost may be covered by FEMA, since the building had not been repaired when the panel was installed. But if not, the Water Board will pay for the move itself, said Juror Thomas McDaniel. Jurors agreed to the propos-

JETTY PIER REPAIRS

In other matters, Harper reported that parts of the Jetty Pier repair project are close to being ready to bid. The Cameron Multi-purpose building is ready to bid as soon as the Jury votes to advertise.

He is working on plans for the parish barn on Trosclair Road, which served both the Cameron and Creole road crews before the storm. Jurors reviewed a proposal from the parish livestock committee to postpone the barn remodel while an improved project combining the barn and livestock arena is reviewed.

The proposed facility would include an indoor rodeo arena, and could be used for many parish functions, proponents said. Not

all of the facility would be covered by FEMA, however, and some jurors wondered about the cost of maintaining such a facility over time. It was decided to let the new program management company look over the proposal once their contract is signed.

HOUSING NEEDS

Two Cameron residents asked for assistance with housing needs. Giz Guilbeau asked for help with a mobile home permit for a "new" trailer park on family land. His is one of the properties certified after the storm, based on affidavits that there were once mobile homes on the site.

There are 211 such mobile home parks in the parish, and while they are under investigation no permits can be given for mobile homes for those sites. There are 78 mobile homes already located in these parks, and their fate is unclear.

FEMA is now requiring that proof be given, but while several jurors remember the trailers being there in the 1970s, records are no longer available and the former renters and landlords are now deceased. ADA Barrett said that unfortunately those are the new rules, and while they may not be reasonable, there is nothing the parish can do about them.

Kathy Rowland asked for the parish's help in getting elevation money from the Road Home. Her home was eligible for ICC(Increased CostCompliance) funds from her flood insurance because it was already elevated. The Road Home would not provide elevation money for the same reason, but her insurance did not pay enough to rebuild at elevation.

Again, Barrett said, there is not much the parish can do to change the rules set by FEMA and the state.

Next week's agenda meeting was moved to the parish OEP office due to a conflict with district court. The meeting was changed to 3 p.m. due to conflicts with two jurors' work schedules.



Fishermen plead guilty

Dane Tilley, Michael Andrus, and Grant Derouen, all of Lake Charles, each pled guilty on Tuesday, March 25, in the 38th Cameron, to Illegally Taking Fish by Électrocution. Judge H. Ward Fontenot accepted the guilty pleas from the three defendants and ordered each to pay fines and court cost, gave each 45 days in the parish jail, suspended, placed them on 1-year unsupervised misdemeanor probation and revoked their fishing privileges for one

Judge Fontenot ordered Tilley and Andrus to each pay \$700 in fines plus court cost and Derouen to pay a \$400 fine plus court cost.

The guilty pleas stem from the three men Illegally Taking Fish by Electrocution Refuge Agent Cleve Pugh on Aug. 17, 2007. Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries Enforcement Senior Agents Aaron Herpin, Beau Robertson, and Chris Hoag were on boat patrol near Lacassine Bayou in the northeast corner of Cameron Parish when they observed two boats and went to conduct a boat safety inspection.

While conducting the safety inspection the agents observed several feet of electrical wiring connected to the boat. Upon questioning the Judicial District Court in agents determined the men were obtaining the fish by electrocution.

The Louisiana Wildlife and Fisheries agents found the three men with several dozen catfish weighing about 350 lbs. total. The catfish were seized and later donated to charity. Also seized were the two 16-foot boats, 2 40 h.p. motors, and 2 trolling motors. As part of the plea agreement, the Judge ordered the forfeiture of the boats and equipment to the Department of Wildlife and Fisheries.

Cameron Parish Assistant District Attorney Thomas Barrett prosecuted the case. assisted the agents in the case. Attorney Barry Roach represented all three defendants in the case.


