Daigle helps in saving submarine

(EDITOR'S NOTE--Machinist's Mate 2nd Class Gilbert Daigle of Creole was aboard the attack submarine San Francisco when it ran aground on Jan. 8 leaving one sailor dead and two more seriously injured. Daigle played a key role in executing an at-sea rig-and-host operation to save the sub. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert Daigle of Creole. The following article tells of the mishap.)

It is increasingly clear that the submarine that hit a seamount in the Pacific Ocean last week came close to being lost and that only the valiant efforts of its crew kept it afloat, navy sources said Tuesday. With uncontrolled flooding in its forward ballast tanks, the USS San Francisco had to run a low-pressure air pump for 30 hours straight to maintain buoyancy on its trip home, Navy sources said. The pump is rated for only intermittent use.

In addition, the submarine ran its diesel engines, channeling the exhaust into the forward ballast tanks in an effort to force out more of the water and make the ship lighter. "Based on the information I've seen so far, they're very lucky this ship didn't sink," said retired Navy Capt. John C. Markowicz. "Only through the heroic efforts of the crew did that ship survive."

The San Francisco, homeported at Guam, was traveling more than 500 feet below the surface at more than 30 knots--about 35 mph--when it slammed into the seamount about 360 miles southeast of Guam.

The New York Times reports that the submarine hit so "incredibly hard" that about 60 of its 137 crew were injured and that the one sailor who died was thrown 20 feet by the impact.

The accident came just minutes after the crew had finished a "field day," a cleaning process that involves breaking down a lot of equipment. If the accident had happened an hour earlier, the situation could have been much more serious because the loose equipment hatches and other parts could have become missiles, one source said.

The San Francisco, SSN 711, was commissioned in

Contract is awarded for G. Chenier Library

The Grand Chenier community will at long last be getting the branch library they have been promised. The Police Jury Monday evening awarded John D. Myers & Associates of Lake Charles the bid for the renovation of the old Bonsall store building near Grand Chenier Park. Myers' low bid of \$238,800 was accepted along with a \$1000 option to install underground power conduit. A second option for a limestone parking lot was deleted. The feature will be added in-house at a later date to save money.

When complete, the library will have a new front porch, a meeting room with separate entrance, concrete handicapped parking, public access computer stations, and a children's area, as well as books, magazines, videos, and audio books.

Video conferencing equipment will allow patrons to participate in telemed classes and discussions and possibly take courses in real time. Industry will also be able to utilize the teleconferencing equipment for business meetings, according to Parish Librarian Charlotte Trosclair. The Johnson Bayou, Hackberry, and Grand Lake branches already have these capabilities, as does the main branch in Cameron.

After the contract is signed, which should take about a month, the contractor has seven months to complete the work, according to architect Gene Sellers of Lafayette. Sellers, incidentally, is not related to Library Board President Cyndi Sellers, and is only very distantly related to her husband Paul Sellers,

several generations back.

The Police Jury also awarded the bid for plumbing repairs at the court house. Charles Miller Construction was the low bidder, at \$112,400. Repairs are expected to begin in about three months, which should give the Sheriff's Office time to make the necessary adjustments for the disruption.

A decision on bids for limestone was postponed until next month to allow time for District Attorney review.

In other business, Raven Benoit and Kevin Boudreaux were reappointed, and Leslie Griffith was appointed, to Gravity Drainage Dist. #4, and Ernest Vincent was reappointed to the Mosquito Control Board. Openings on the West Cameron Port Board and the Economic Development Task Force were tabled until next month.

The jury gave the President Scott Trahan authority to sign a resolution dedicating remaining Rural Development Grant funds to the West Calcasieu Ship Channel Boat Launch, which was recently damaged. There is about \$192,000 remaining in the grant. Landowners are being contacted to sign leases on the boat launch property.

Jurors agreed to send a request to DOTD to reduce the speed limit on Hwy 82 one-half mile either side of the Chenier Sabine Pass LNG construction site to 45 mph for the duration of construction, and to post construction zone signs. At its height, the job site could see 600 workers a day entering and leaving on the two lane highway.

Parish Administrator was assigned to work with the Cameron NAACP chapter to get the wording for their proposed historical marker approved by the State Historic Preservation Office after Louise Cole, chapter president, presented a memo

Job Fair to be held Monday, April 11

A Job Fair will be held in Cameron on Monday, April 11 in connection with the Sabine Pass LNG Terminal Site project.

The fair will be held at the Police Jury building from 8 a.m. to noon. Hiring for the job starts April 18. Approximately 20 heavy

equipment operators will be hired to operate dozers, track-hoes and motogradars.

About 15 light duty operators will be hired to operate off-road dump trucks, rollers and tractors.

Others to be hired are 10 laborers and one timekeeper.

Monkey Island Ferry--three years left to run

The Monkey Island Ferry at Cameron is still operating but as things stand the ferry probably will be closed three years from now--July 1, 2008.

The ferry had been scheduled to close last July, but Senator Jerry Theunissen was able to get a bill passed moving the closing date up to 2008, by then a bridge may--or may not--be built.

Theunissen said last year 55 years ago the Calcasieu River channel was straightened, and that process created Monkey Island. He said that until a bridge is constructed, the ferry needs to serve the seven families who

live there, and the Lake Charles Pilot's station and a U. S. Weather Bureau facility that are also located there.

Tina Horn, administrator of Cameron Parish, said last year the island also has potential for economic development by the West Cameron Port Board.

The federal budget contained \$100,000 for a Monkey Island bridge study, but Theunissen said that money was moved to another project.

The U. S. Army Corps of Engineers has been doing a bridge study.

It costs \$697,000 to operate the ferry every year.

No hearing is needed for Pearl Crossing project

The Coastal Management Division of the Dept. of Natural Resources has announced that a public hearing is not warranted in connection with a request for a coastal use permit for the Pearl Crossing LNG Terminal and Pipeline.

The project will consist of the construction of a 63.66 mile 42-inch onshore pipeline to serve an offshore LNG facility located in the Gulf.

Two 42-inch pipelines will be installed from the facility and end at a compressor station at Johnson Bayou.

From the station a single 42-inch line will be installed which will proceed westward and then take a northerly turn and end at a Transco pipeline.

The pipeline will go through Cameron and Calcasieu parishes.





1981. Starting with the Groton-based USS Providence, SSN 719, Los Angeles-class submarines have 12 missiles in vertical launch tubes in a compartment just behind the sonar dome. Several submariners acknowledged that such an incident involving a newer boat could have led to a fire in the missile fuel systems, which could have led to a low-order detonation of up to 12,000 pounds of high explosives.

The San Francisco had just submerged from periscope depth and had taken a bottom reading with its Fathometer four minutes before it hit the seamount and that the reading indicated the bottom was 6,000 feet below the keel.

The damage to the submarine, which includes a cracked sonar sphere and severe damage to three of the four ballast tanks near the bow, and some buckling of the forward pressure hull, all argue that the submarine hit something akin to an underwater cliff.

San Francisco crew members honored for heroism (Navy Times) March 25, 2005

An emotional week for crew members of the attack submarine San Francisco came to a close Friday with an awards ceremony in Guam for 20 crew members who distinguished themselves in the wake of the violent Jan. 8 undersea grounding that left one sailor dead and seriously injured two dozen more.

Three days earlier, six of

their shipmates, who unofficial sources said included the heavily damaged submarine's executive officer, navigator, assistant navigator and three pretty officers, were punished at nonjudicial hearings that held each at least partially culpable for the tragic mishap. The Navy would not confirm the crew members' positions on the sub.

On Friday, the Navy recognized those who played key roles in treating injured crew members and in the successful effort to get the crippled sub back to Guam safely.

Two crewmembers--Lt. j. g. Craig Litty and Hospital Corpsman 1st Class (SS) James Akin--were given the Meritorious Service Medal for administering emergency triage to 70 injured crew members and organizing the crew's mess into a makeshift emergency trauma center. Nine others received the Navy and Marine Corps commendation Medal.

Three other sailors--Sonar Technician (Submarine) 1st Class (SS) Christopher Baumhoff, Machinist's Mate 2nd Class (SS) Gilbert Daigle and Lt. Jeff McDonald--played key roles in the planning and execution of the at-sea rig-and-hoist operation.

Council in their Fourth Degree activities.



APRIL'S HERE!

April is the month to start your weed control in ponds, collect mayhaw for jams and jellies and not to forget to pay IRS before April 15 and your state taxes by May 15. Wild turkey hens begin nesting as well as ducks nesting in northern breeding sites. The osprey also begin nesting in south Louisiana.

If you are fishing in the marsh you will soon start hearing the male alligators bellow to begin mating season. Spotted sea trout (speckled trout) spawnings begin in high-salinity bays and near shore waters.

If you are a shrimper, don't forget to renew your shrimp licenses. Our commercial fisheries will see the pompano permit qualifying ending April 30 while our commercial season on red snapper in the Gulf of Mexico will end for their 10 days of fishing April 10 at noon.

FISHING REPORTS

Kevin Natali who has always placed in several categories during saltwater fishing tournaments or rodeos may just have himself a state record, landing a red fish at 38.1 pounds caught with a fly rod, fishing out of West Cove.

Anglers who want to fish and take part in the C.C.A.'s STAR Rodeo, had better start thinking of sending their membership and entry fee, as time is passing fast.

Bass fishing on Lacassine Refuges pool is still good, but the water level is dropping. A couple of eight and nine pounders caught last week. Fishing in the Big Burns is still slow, maybe because of the cool weather, but Amoco and Rockefeller are still producing good bass.

Trapping season has closed statewide March 31, for all fur-bearing animals. Fur bearing are classified as beaver, bobcat, coyote, gray and red fox, mink, muskrats, nutria, opossum, river otters, raccoon and skunk.

Folks crabbing have been catching real nice large male crabs and they are full and fat. What is "more" better than boiled crabs, than more boiled crabs and boiling corn, potatoes and onions. "SaSa Bon-vel!"

DUCK NUMBERS

In the past few hunting seasons here in southwest Louisiana's marshes, we've seen a big decline in ducks stopping here. This was a major phrase used at the meeting in Lake Charles a couple of weeks ago. Even the personnel conducting the survey and meeting agreed.

Some of the reasons the experts think is happening is electric ducks and high-tech decoys, farmers tilling more land where ducks are nesting and climate changes. They said the last three years were the warmest on record not only in

our state, but also the northern states above us.

There's the thing about not plowing under the farmers last crop like corn, which ducks stop over to feed on and will stay as long as there's grain there or the snow covers the fields and food.

Predators like wolves were once eating lots of ducks and eggs on the nest, but now our northern breeding grounds are infested with skunks, foxes and raccoons, but also Canada's farmers are not as interested in saving breeding grounds as they once were. There's not as many ducks that breed in Canada like there used to be.

The Louisiana state licenses sales have gone down according to the Louisiana Wildlife and Fisheries. Young hunters are not buying licenses like older hunters in which many of these are dying or getting too old to hunt. Between the 2004-05 season their were 241,662 licenses sold, while 2000-01 season saw 253,035 licenses sold, but in the 1982-83 season that number was 399,077 so we've lost 57,415 license sales in a span of 23 years.

OFFSHORE OUTLOOK

We hear a lot about some of our offshore species of fish that are being depleted. There's some fish that have to be released with no limits such as blue and white marlin, sailfish, black seabass, bluefin, tuna and redfish. Other species have a low count limit such as cobia, black drum, king mackerel, species of amberjack, groupers red snappers and sharks.

Action is likely on greater amberjack where the limit is one per day and a minimum of 28 inches. Unless a 2005 stock assessment finds that we have more, we could find that the greater amberjack are in an overfished state. A three month commercial closing and reduction to one for bag limits for recreational fisherman might help.

Up until 2003, Gulf of Mexico commercial and recreational fishermen combined were catching 1.5 million pounds over the 2.9 million pound allowable quota. On Jan. 6, 2005, National Marine Fishery Service notified the Gulf of Mexico Fishery Management Council that over-fishing is occurring. This gives the council one year to draw up a management plan to reduce harvest to the 2.9 million pound level, unless the new stock assessment bails out the fishery.





4-H Horse camp held at Burton Coliseum

Forty-eight 4-H Club members and the adults who accompanied them recently spent two days learning new skills and developing a relationship with their horses during the Southwest Louisiana 4-H Horse Camp at the Burton Coliseum Outdoor Arena here.

"These young people are eager to learn new skills in training and riding their horses," said LSU AgCenter 4-H agent Jimmy Meaux. "And they're having fun doing it."

This horse camp held March 28-29 and other LSU AgCenter events like it provide an opportunity for youth to spend time learning skills from professional horse trainers and sharing the knowledge they gain with fellow 4-H Club members.

"This is an opportunity for young people to develop relationships - both with fellow 4-H members and with their horses," said LSU AgCenter horse specialist Dr. Clint Depew.

The Southwest Louisiana 4-H Horse Camp was held during the spring break for schools in the area to encourage youngsters to expand their educational experiences

in an informal way.

Such educational events provide an opportunity for youth to use both their hands and their minds to learn skills such as showmanship, horsemanship, basic horse training, basic horse care, health care and nutrition, and grooming.

Concurrent workshops also were conducted by people who graduated from the LSU AgCenter's Master Horsemen class in the area. Those adults conducted hands-on workshops in basic horse training, selection, judging and showmanship.

The camp is about more than training a horse, according to LSU AgCenter officials and participants, who say it provides an opportunity to develop relationships, learn to communicate and practice important life skills such as trustworthiness, dependability, courtesy, responsibility and respect.

"Now, I challenge the participants to practice the techniques you learned at the camp and train your horses before competing in the 4-H Club parish, district and state horse shows in early summer," Meaux said.
