# Shrimpers express concerns over proposed levee repairs

Twenty years of resentment came to a head Monday night as shrimpers and state and local agencies discussed proposed levee repairs during the Cameron Parish Police Jury's monthly agenda meeting. Tempers became so heated that one shrimper had to be escorted from the meeting.


At issue was the permit request by the Department of Natural Resources to place sheet pilings in the breaches of the Cameron-Creole Watershed levee. The Jury tabled the request last month at the request of Gravity Drainage District #3, which asked for a meeting between all affected parties to discuss the proposal. At the time, Scott Henry, speaking for Gravity Drainage #3, expressed opposition to the

sheet pilings due to fears that future flood waters would not drain from the watershed.

At Monday's meeting, a large group of shrimpers were on hand to express their opinion that the breaches should not be closed. Some said the entire levee system should not be repaired. Many cited last year's bumper crop of shrimp as proof that the levee system had been the cause of poor fishing in the last 15-20 years. Philip Dyson suggested officials look into a study done from 1986-1988 by LSU professor Dr. Ken Robinson of the effect of the levees and weirs on shrimping. Dyson said he was making \$125,000 a year back then, which dropped to \$35,000 after the weirs. He said last year he made \$98,000 and hoped to do even better this year, if the breaches remain open.

Adley Dyson, member of the State Oyster Task Force reported that oystering has improved since the storm, with the mussels that were threatening the fishery all gone. He said "I don't think we need to stop the water, maybe slow it up." He reminded Jurors that before the weirs Cameron was the nation's #1 fishing port, with three pogy plants and five shrimp shops. Now there is only one pogy plant and one or maybe two shrimp houses. Saying the water management system was poorly managed before the storm and water needs to flow freely, he said the State Oyster Board stands behind Gravity Drainage Boards #3 and #4.

Other shrimpers were more pointed in their objections to the repairs. Jimmy Dyson threatened to hook an anchor to the weirs and pull them out if the breaches were plugged, and promised to see jurors voted out of office. Monroe Gray said, "This idea to put it all back like it was and then think about changing it - that's bull and you know it." He suggested that since all the codes and rules have been changed since the storm, this would be a good time to change the weirs. He wants a study done on the effect of the weirs on the shrimping industry. He also rejected the study that recom-


# Water District rolls back tax millage

Cameron Parish Water and Wastewater District #1, Cameron, has voted to roll back its property tax levy for the 2007 tax roll from 5 mills to 4.5 mills. The action is intended to thank and encourage industries and residents who have returned to Cameron.

FEMA funding and other measures have enabled the district to rebuild and even improve operations since the storm. Water meters have been installed, but haven't resulted in increased customer costs. The board is confident that it can operate on the reduced millage. The district's allowable tax levy is 9.51 mills, but it hasn't had to impose that amount for many years.

## Permit asked for J. Bayou facility

Cheniere Sabine Pass Pipeline is seeking a coastal use permit to construct the Johnson Bayou Metering and Regulatory Facility to allow for the receipt, metering, heating and transport of natural gas through the Bridgeline delivery interconnect and the Southwest

Lateral delivery interconnect. The facility boundary will consist of a 150' x 150' SW Lateral M&R platform (meter station and three heaters), a 100' x 100' Bridgeline M&R platform (meter station and heater), access road and three pipeline interconnects.

All three lines will be horizontal directional drilled until they reach the facility and then trenched the rest of the way.



All former residents of Cameron Parish now living in the area are advised that the 132 burial vaults and caskets which were washed out of Cameron Parish cemeteries into the marsh by Hurricane Audrey last year have now been recovered.

Former residents who had vaults of relatives missing are asked to return to the parish and attempt to make identification of the recovered tombs before May 15.

After that date, the identified vaults will be returned to their proper cemeteries, Tombs left unidentified will be divided among the parish's cemeteries on a pro-rate basis according to the number of vaults missing from each.

The expense of recovering the vaults from the marsh and reburying them is being taken care of by the parish disaster relief fund made up of donations received from hundreds of individuals, groups and firms from all over the nation, many from this immediate area.



# New flood insurance maps to be ready by year's end

Cameron Parish Police Jurors learned Monday night that the new Federal Flood Insurance rating maps for southwest Louisiana will be probably ready by the end of the year.

FEMA is presently conducting computer modeling of 300 storms to determine the new base flood elevations and zones, said Jerri Daniels with the Louisiana mapping project.

Until the new maps are completed, current flood elevations are in effect for Cameron Parish.

Jay Rutherford reported to the Jury that the Coastal Protection and Restoration Authority's recommendations have been presented to the legislature, and he was unable to see any changes from the draft plan to raise Highways 27 and 82 and also to protect "coastal forests," including oak trees on the cheniers, by expropriating them

OEP Director Clifton Hebert reported that the bids will be opened May 7 for the salt water tree removal program. He also said that a statewide hurricane exercise will be conducted next week

# Afternoon of Reflection on HIV/AIDS held

LAKE CHARLES - A crowd of 170, 125 youth and 45 adults, attended the "Afternoon of Reflection on HIV/AIDS Awareness" for African youth of the Central and North Lake Charles communities held at Sacred Heart of Jesus gymnasium. The April 15 event was sponsored by the Diocese of Lake Charles Office of Black Catholics and the Sacred Heart Catholic Youth Organization (CYO). Area churches were also invited to participate in the event.

According to Deacon Edward Lavine, Director of the Office of Black Catholics, statistics indicate African American adolescents and young adults account for 46

percent of total AIDS cases diagnosed in people 13-24 years old through the year 2002. With 61 percent of AIDS cases newly diagnosed among the above age groups in 2002, this indicates the figures are increasing and that African Americans account for 40 percent of total estimated AIDS diagnoses through 2004, although African Americans make up only 12.2 percent of the population. They also represent an estimated 50 percent of persons newly diagnosed with HIV/AIDS in 2004.

Hispanics account for 19 percent of total estimated AIDS diagnosis through 2004, though they make up only 14.2 percent of the population. The number of Asian/Pacific Islanders and American/Alaskan natives living with AIDS continue to rise. With approximately a 10 percent increase each year over the past five years.

White adolescents and young adults represent an estimated 25 percent of all persons ages 20-24 who were newly diagnosed with HIV in 2002.

According to Deacon Lavine, because of the epidemic proportions of AIDS cases in the African American community, the Black Catholic Office will continue to share with the African American community the importance of AIDS awareness and promoting abstinence as was the main thrust and objective of the conference.

Dr. Donald R. Parker was the keynote speaker and presented a power-point presentation, reviewing with those present that they are responsible for their actions and noting that they need to be aware of the consequences if they indulge in premarital sex. Dr. Parker made an effort to emphasize Christian principles referring to the Scriptures in reference to promiscuous behavior.

All the youth present were given a pledge card promising to abstain from sexual intercourse before marriage.

Truman Trail, a Senior at McNeese State University, gave a faith testimonial to the audience with reference to his con-

His proficiency with his feet extended to more areas than just day-to-day care. He remembers that "at first, I started playing push-button organ. Then in high school I began playing around with the guitar and harmonica." He also began writing his own songs. Whether it was "playing around" with music or merely adjusting to a normal high school routine, Tony never let his handicap get in his way. "I was pretty secure in what I could do," he says.

It was also in high school that he became deeply involved in the Catholic Church. "I went when I was a kid because my parents took me. I drifted away as I got a little older. When I was in high school, my brother kept saying 'come on, you've gotta go. It's great!' So I went again and made a lot of friends, and wound up changing my life in the process."



In the first day's event, there were eight bass weighed in at over six pounds and in the second days event, the two top bass were over eight pounds. The first day's top stringer on five bass was 18.6 pounds and the second day's, the stringer was over 33 pounds and ten bass took the event.

The event was held at Cypress Bend, where prizes were drawn for anglers entered into the classic. ## Seatrout study to be made here

Researchers from Louisiana State University (LSU) are teaming up with the Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries (LDWF) for a study on the movement patterns of spotted seatrout in Calcasieu Lake. The two-year study will begin May 2007 and roughly 120 adult spotted seatrout will be outfitted with acoustic transmitters or "pingers".

All fish with acoustic transmitters will be marked with a yellow dart tag below the dorsal fin that states "LSU-REWARD-PLEASE RELEASE." Fishermen who catch fish with this tag should release the fish alive and call 1-800-891-3977 to report the tag number and where and when the fish was caught. It is vital that these fish be released alive so that researchers can continue to collect movement data.

The tag number is given at both ends of the tag. An example of an LSU tag number of "LT166001." Fishermen who provide recapture information and release the tagged fish alive with receive a Louisiana Sport Fish Tagging Program hat and T-shirt, and be entered in an annual drawing for GPS units and cash prizes of up to \$500. An array of receivers also will be placed throughout Calcasieu Lake to "listen" for fish with transmitters. Receivers will be placed on channel markers in the Calcasieu Ship Channel and on buoys in the main body of the lake. Boaters and fishermen should not tamper with or moor to the buoys. The Coastal Conservation Association (CCA) and LDWF also tag fish in Calcasieu Lake. These dart tags are placed in the same location on the fish, but have different text on them.

This book quotes from the diaries of those courageous preachers, who on horseback brought the first taste of the Protestant Gospel into Louisiana even before it was a state.


Although these horseback riders were mostly Methodist, their stories of bravery and courage as they made their way through the bayous, swamps and the desolation of early Louisiana, transcends religion and is more exciting than fiction. They faced wild animals like bobcats, as well as unfriendly Indians, while making their way on horseback through Ohio, Virginia, Tennessee, Alabama and Mississippi. Crossing into Louisiana they also faced alligators, moccasins, and swamp rats.

The dedication of those early Circuit Riders compelled them to ride through Louisiana's almost impossible swamps and marshes, through raging high water, often icy, with little food and only rough wet or cold ground in which to sleep. The few items they could pack in their saddlebags were all they had for months and sometimes years.

Most of the Louisiana Circuit Riders died before the age of 30, because of the harsh, strenuous life they lived. Their adventures are as exciting as any adventure novel and are a vital part of our Louisiana Heritage.

This new book Diaries of Louisiana Circuit Riders, which is over 200 pages long, and has pictures of many of the Circuit Riders and their trails, as well as stories of the reenactment of 1966 made by Methodist Ministers. repairs to the levee system. Of that amount \$1 million has already been spent. The plan is to repair the weirs first, then plug the breaches where the bayous emptied into Calcasieu Lake. At some future date, if funds become available, the entire 19 miles of levee would be restored to the original seven foot height.

Reportedly, the plan for the breaches was developed last year. It was presented to Gravity Drainage District #3 last December, at which time, Henry says, several objections were raised. A permit application was brought to the Police Jury at the April meeting, and the project was advertised for bids. Bids are to be opened this month, and if the permit is not issued, Clark said, the money may well be re-allocated elsewhere in the state.

David Richard explained that the Cameron Creole Watershed Project was designed to stop the deterioration of the marsh, which had already gone from freshwater in the 1920s to brackish in the 1960s due to salt water intrusion from the Calcasieu Ship Channel. He said the large shrimp harvests in the '60s, '70s and '80s were due to the food being made available by the dying of the marsh, which, if not stopped, would result in an open lake, providing no food for shrimp in the future. The

watershed was designed to keep the diversity it had in 1960 - shrimp, fish, crabs, alligators, ducks, and furbearers.

Richard said the marsh is managed to accommodate many species, on which many people's livelihoods depend, including shrimpers. Juror Charles Precht said this will probably be the last year he can plant rice on his land in Sweetlake because of salt water intrusion.

Henry asked that the promised meeting be scheduled before a final decision is reached, and the Jury agreed to set up a meeting of the Cameron-Creole Watershed Advisory Board. Representatives from the Oyster Task Force and the Shrimper's former Association are to be included. and the meeting will be open to the public.

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

We're asking Co-op consumers who received and paid a minimum bill from October 2005 through August 2006 when their service wasn't restored to contact a local Jeff Davis Electric office and begin the process to determine if they are eligible for a refund," Heinen stated.



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# Bedding plants can make colorful garden

As May approaches, we move from the warm days and cool nights of spring and early summer to the hot days and warm nights that will be with us until sometime around September. With the increasing heat, you also will notice the inevitable decline of your cool-season bedding plants.

Do not allow plantings of cool-season bedding plants to go too far down the road to oblivion before you decide to pull them out and replace them. Beds of colorful flowers are meant to be noticed and appreciated, and they generally are located in prominent spots in the landscape. A few lingering flowers in an otherwise disheveled bed will not contribute anything positive to your landscape's appearance.

As you make those changes – or if you don't have that problem because you didn't plant cool-season bedding plants – now is an excellent time to plant warm-season bedding plants that will brighten your landscape all summer long.

Whether replacing coolseason bedding plants with warm-season bedding plants or planting them in an empty or new bed, there are a few decisions you should make before you head out to the nursery.

Note the light the bed receives. This is critical in selecting the right bedding plants for the area. The terms full sun (eight hours or more of direct sun), part sun (about six hours of direct sun), part shade (about four hours of direct sun in the morning), shade (about two hours of direct sun) and full shade (little or no direct sun) are used to distinguish various light conditions. Even bedding plants for shade generally will not do well in full shade, but areas of full shade fortunately are not terribly common in most landscapes.

Look at the size of the area to be planted and try to estimate how many plants will need to be purchased. On average, bedding plants are spaced about 8 inches apart. Keep a record of how many plants are used in a bed from one season to the next to make this process simpler. Also, consider desired heights of the plants you will use.

Decide on a color scheme. It's flabbergasting that gardeners who take the time to choose which colors to combine in their living room will grab anything in bloom at the nursery and plant it together in a flower bed. No one can you what colors you tell should use in your flower beds – you know what you like. The point is to think about it and consider which colors you think will look good together. Generally, avoid purchasing bedding plants in cell packs of mixed colors so vou have control over which colors you will combine.

Prepare your beds carefully before putting in the summer bedding plants. A common mistake is to remove the faded plants, half-heartedly turn the soil and then plant the new plants. We must give back to the soil if we expect each new planting of bedding plants to do its best.

First, remove any weeds or other unwanted plants from the bed. Use a herbicide, such as glyphosate, or dig the weeds and plants out by

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hand. Turn the soil to a depth of about 8 inches.

Spread a 2-inch to 4-inch layer of compost, rotted leaves, aged manure, finely ground pine bark or peat moss over the bed and then evenly sprinkle a light application of a granular all-purpose fertilizer. Or you can use your favorite organic fertilizers. Thoroughly blend the organic matter and fertilizer into the bed, rake smooth and you're ready to plant.

Make sure you plant the transplants into the bed no deeper than they were growing in their original containers.

Bedding plants are commonly purchased in cell packs and 4-inch pots, but these days you can even find them offered in gallon containers (for those who have the budget to indulge in instant gratification).

Transplants in cell packs are the most economical, and planted this early in the season they have plenty of time to grow and produce spectacular results. For larger transplants, choose 4-inch pots, but expect to pay several times more per plant. Sometimes it's worth it, especially for tender perennials grown as annuals, such as pentas, blue daze and lantana, which generally are only offered in 4inch or larger pots.

Tender perennials grown as annuals are especially good for the summer flower garden. They have the stamina to reliably last from now until October or November – when you will replace them with cool-season bedding plants.

Here are some suggestions:

Warm-season Bedding Plants for Sun to Part Sun – Abelmoschus, Ageratum, Amaranthus, Balsam, Celosia, Cleome, Coreopsis, Cosmos, Dahlberg Daisy, Gaillardia, Gomphrena, Lisianthus, Marigold, Melampodium, Narrow-leaf Zinnia, Portulaca, Rudbeckia, Sunflower, Tithonia, Torenia, Verbena (hardy perennial types) and Zinnia (especially Profusion zinnias).

Tender Perennials That Can Be Used As Warm-season Bedding Plants for Sun to Part Sun – Angelonia, Blue Daze, Coleus (sun-tolerant Dusty Miller, types), Ornamental Lantana, Pepper, Ornamental sweet potato, Periwinkle, Pentas. Purslane, Salvia and Scaevola.

Warm-season Bedding Plants for Part-Shade to Shade – Balsam, Browallia, Caladium (perennial tuber), Cleome and Torenia.

Tender Perennials That Can Be Used as Warm-season Bedding Plants for Part Shade to Shade – Begonia,

# Credit information available for everyone

Ah, freedom! The world opens up to us at 18-yearsold. We can leave the nest, vote and stay out as late as we want. Yet, our parents' words still reign true: with privilege comes responsibility.

At 18, American teens can assume control of their legal and financial futures. Yet they need to understand that slip-ups now can affect their futures for years to come.

"Once kids turn 18, they have their first shot at establishing a positive credit history," said Mike Sullivan, director of education for Take Charge America, a national non-profit credit counseling agency. "If they end up abusing or misusing the system, their actions can prevent them from qualifying for additional lines of credit down the road."

According to the most recent statistics from Nellie Mae, in 2004 college students reported freshman year as the most prevalent time for obtaining credit cards, with 56 percent having obtained their first card at age 18.

"Our homes, cars and other valuables are all rooted in our credit history. The younger you start, the sooner you'll be able to achieve financial independence," said Sullivan. "Without a consistent, positive track record, teens and 20-somethings won't be able to rent an apartment, buy a car or apply for a loan without their parents' signature."

So, what does it take to build a positive credit history? Sullivan describes what not to do:

Don't go on a spending spree – Just because you have the credit, doesn't mean you should spend it all. Your first credit card should have a low limit, such as \$100 or \$500. This will help prevent large impulse buys. If you know you're an impulse shopper, you can further restrict temptation by applying for a store or gas card, as opposed to a general bank credit card that can be used at almost any location.

**Don't test your credit limits** – Make a small purchase to kick off your credit history and then make consis-



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# Ferns need lots of shade to thrive

I don't know about you, but as the hot weather of summer arrives I'd much rather work in shady gardens than sunny ones.

I've heard gardening in the shade called challenging, but it's really no different than gardening in the sun. When the proper plants are selected for shady areas the results can be beautiful and durable.

Lots of great plants for shady areas can be found among the ferns. The different species range in size from under a foot to as much as 3 feet

The leaves of ferns are called fronds and provide the primary ornamental feature of the plants. On ferns that are commonly used in landscaping, the fronds generally are finely divided and delicate in appearance. They contrast beautifully with coarser-textured shade plants such as hostas, aspidistra, fatsia, gingers and aucuba – although holly fern is an exception, since its fronds are coarser than most ferns and give this plant an almost shrubby look.

Ferns do not produce colorful flowers. Their attributes are more subtle, but no less beautiful, to the discerning eye. It would be unfair to say that ferns are just green. They come in many shades from chartreuse to deep olive, and some produce fronds that are tinted with red or have silvery variegations. Ferns often possess a grace of form and movement that is unique among garden plants (except for maybe ornamental grass-

Some of the ferns we can plant in the landscape are evergreen, and some are deciduous. Deciduous ferns such as the wood fern (Thelypteris kunthii) and royal fern (Osmunda regalis) lose their fronds in the winter and go dormant. Some of the evergreen ferns also may suffer damage or loss of their

fronds during severe winters, but more often they retain their foliage throughout the winter season. If they are frozen back, they reliably return from their roots.

One of my favorite things about ferns is that they are so easy to grow. Generally not prone to any major insect or disease problems, ferns are plants you ordinarily can make happy with minimal care.

Ferns will grow best in areas that receive one to four hours of direct sun or dappled light during the day. Morning sun is greatly preferred. Definitely avoid hot, dry areas that receive several hours of direct sun in the afternoon or areas that receive sun all day. If you want a fern-like plant for sunnier areas, you could plant yarrow (Achillea millefolium) or asparagus fern (Asparagus densiflorus 'Sprengeri', which is not a true fern).

The majority of ferns do best in a consistently moist soil. They thrive in our state because of our high rainfall and humidity. Of course, during dry periods you will need to water your landscape ferns. As with all plants, there is no timetable or schedule that you should follow for watering. Watering is done when the plants need the moisture based on the amount of rainfall that has occurred and how hot it is. Mulching a fern planting with your favorite mulch, such as leaves, dry grass clippings or pine straw, is highly recommended to conserve soil moisture and reduce weeds.

When preparing a planting site for ferns, thoroughly turn the soil and remove any weeds. Spread a 2-inch to 3inch layer of organic matter (compost, rotted manure or peat moss) over the area and dig it in. Make sure it is well blended with the soil in the bed.

Shady areas often occur under trees, and it is entirely permissible to create planted

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turning fork, since it will be less damaging to roots than the blade of a shovel or spade.

Once you have ferns in place, February or early March is the time to cut back the dead fronds of deciduous ferns and to prune away any cold damage done to ever-green ferns. Get this done before the new fronds grow up into the dead ones, and it will be easier not having to work around the new growth.

As time goes by many ferns will grow into a fairly large clump. Should you need to divide your ferns, the best time is in late winter or early spring, around February. Ideally, ferns should be divided before the new spring fronds have made much growth. Once you've divided some out, keep them well watered while they get reestablished.

Most nurseries carry a nice selection of ferns. When visiting a nursery, ask where their shade area is, and that's generally where you will find the ferns along other plants that like the shade and make good companions for the ferns.

Some excellent ferns for use in the landscape include Southern maidenhair fern (Adiantum capillus-vernis), holly fern (Cyrtominum falcaleatherleaf tum), fern (Rumohra adiantiformis), Christmas fern (Polystichum acrostichoides), royal fern (Osmunda regalis), autumn fern (Dryopteris erythrosora, known for its coppery red new fronds), lady fern (Athyrium filix-femina), wood fern (Thelypteris kunthii), lace fern (Microlepia strigosa), painted Japanese fern (Athyrium niponicum 'Pictum') and sensitive fern (Onoclea sensibilis).

# Chose plants that are adaptable to area

Average minimum temperatures are an important issue when choosing plants that are well-adapted to our climate. But so are the summer temperatures, since our landscape plants must be able to survive both extremes.

It wouldn't make much sense to plant a tree, shrub or anything you expect to be a long-lived part of your landscape if it wasn't hardy enough to survive the winter. Of course, it also wouldn't make much sense if your choices couldn't stand up to our summer heat.

To help you in making such decisions, there a couple of tools - known as hardiness zones and heat zones.

With regard to hardiness, let me provide some explanations.

Hardy plants are those that can reliably survive typical winter temperatures without protection. Permanent woody plants, like trees and shrubs, should be completely hardy and suffer no damage from the lowest expected temperature. Other plants may be "root hardy" - meaning they reliably return from their crown or below ground parts (bulb, tuber, rhizome, etc.).

Plants killed by typical winter temperatures are tender. Since our winters vary in their severity from year to year, tender plants may sometimes survive a series of milder-than-normal winters only to succumb to a severe freeze.

For a plant to be considered completely hardy, it must be able to tolerate the lowest temperatures an area may receive, not simply to make it through a milder-than-typical winter. A real concern when selecting a plant, then, is whether it is hardy enough to withstand the typical winter temperatures where it will be planted.

To help gardeners with this issue, the U.S. Department of Agriculture developed a Plant Hardiness Zone Map based on the average minimum temperatures experienced in different areas of the United States. The zones range from 3 to 11, starting with the lower numbers in the colder northern United Staties and the higher numbers in the milder southern part of the country. Each zone is further subdivided into northern "a" and southern "b" sections.

The state of Louisiana includes just two zones, Zone 8 and Zone 9. The northern section of the state is Zone 8a (average minimum tempera-

country. It helps them avoid planting something that is not hardy enough for the zone where they garden. The farther north your garden is in the United States the more of an issue and concern cold hardiness becomes.

On the other hand, because our winters are relatively mild, cold hardiness would rarely, if ever, be a major concern if we didn't plant so many tender tropicals in our landscapes.

It's not a bad idea to choose plants that are hardy at least one zone north of where you garden. That way should an unusually cold winter occur your plants could endure it. So when selecting cold hardy plants for a landscape in Zone 9, make sure they are hardy to Zone 8. If you live in Zone 8, choose plants that are hardy to Zone 7.

You might think that as long as the plants you choose are cold hardy, that would be the end of it. But we know, of course, there is still one more factor - how hot it is during summer and how long the heat persists.

Extreme summer heat has a significant effect on how plants grow. In this case, the hardiness zones are not much help. Knowing that a plant is hardy enough to survive our winters does not mean it's tough enough to survive our intensely hot summers.

The American Horticulture Society has addressed this issue by developing its Plant Heat-Zone Map. The zones are based on the average number of days per year the temperature reaches 86 degrees F or higher. The usefulness is clear when we see that most of Louisiana is in heat Zone 9 (120 to 150 days) and that most of Oregon is in heat Zone 4 (14 to 30 days).

Unfortunately, because the heat zones have not been around as long as the hardiness zones, and perhaps because much of the country obsesses more over hardiness than heat tolerance, the heat zones are still not widely used in plant descriptions.

Here in the Deep South, however, where summer heat is a major limiting factor in what plants we can grow, these heat-zones should eventually prove helpful. As time goes by you may begin to see the heat zones used more often in plant descriptions. For more information, see "Heat-Zone Gardening" by Dr. Marc Cathey, Time-Life Books.



ture 10 to 15 degrees F). The central and some of the southern portion of the state is in Zone 8b (average minimum temperature 15 to 20 degrees F). Coastal areas of the state are Zone 9a (average minimum temperature 20 to 25 degrees F), and the southern portion of Plaquemines Parish is Zone 9b (average minimum temperature 25 to 30 degrees

F). When looking at garden catalogs offering plants, bulbs or seeds - or when reading articles in gardening magazines and plant descriptions in books - you often will see the hardiness zones listed after the plant name, such as Hydrangea Forever Pink (Hydrangea macrophylla 'Forever Pink') Zones 5-9. That means the farthest north this plant can reliably be grown is Zone 5. In zones farther north, this plant is likely to do poorly or die because the winters are too cold.

You can see how handy this is for gardeners around the



# Sheriff deputies begin 4wearing new uniforms co

The Cameron Parish Sheriff's Office has a new look. Beginning today, road deputies will be wearing new uniforms. The navy blue "511" uniform shirts are made of a lightweight nylon fabric that should be cooler to wear in heat and humidity. The shirts have back vents and lots of pockets.

New features include embroidered badges and name labels for safety. The metal badges and name tags could have been used as weapons in a struggle. The parish patch on the left sleeve is the same as before, although a star was added two years ago in memory of fallen deputy Terry Cox.

Some deputies will be wearing a specially designed pin made to match the patch but with the addition of a storm cloud and lightning and the motto "We Survived Hurricane Rita." A batch of the pins were purchased at a low rate which deputies may purchase for trading purposes. Many of the agencies who helped out in Cameron Parish after the storm had coins, pins or patches to trade. It is considered a way to create solidarity between members of the various law enforcement agencies.

The need for new uniforms was partly caused by Rita,

which destroyed 40 sets of uniforms. Through a grant, Sheriff Theos Duhon was able to buy all new uniforms. One reason for the new color was to distinguish Cameron officers from those of neighboring agencies, many of which had switched to French blue after Cameron did so. Several deputies tested different types of uniforms for months before the final decision was made. All the deputies were able to vote on their favorite type and color.

Duhon said that a few officers have not yet received their shirts, but should have them soon. Also, he plans to have rookies wear the old uniform until they have completed the academy, at which time they will receive their personalized uniforms.

Duhon also announced a new website for the department. Found at cameronso.org, the site offers sections about the investigation division, tax, office, civil division, jail and DARE program, with contact information. Future additions will have a link to the State Police registered sex offender list, highlights of laws of current interest, and lists of fines for citations.

Duhon has a monthly column on the site, currently discussing internet protection for teens. He is planning an upcoming column on scams.


