## Circuit court meets here

A rare opportunity to see the legal system in action was offered to Cameron Parish residents Tuesday and Wednesday, as the Third Circuit Court of Appeals met to hear cases at the Cameron Parish Court House.

Around 200 high school students were able to attend the sessions and see and hear actual appeals cases being argued before judges Billy Ezell, Glenn Gremillion, and Jimmy Genovese.

Sarah Conner, of Johnson Bayou High School, said it was "pretty cool" because they had never had something like that here before. She plans to major in criminal justice next year at McNeese State university, so the experience was especially meaningful to her.

Another JBHS student, Bailey Oswald, commented on the "rocket docket" portion of the session, where attorneys who want to go to the head of the docket may choose to give a very fast five minute summation. She said she had no

idea that only three judges, not a jury, would decide these cases, and the final judgment would be delayed for a few weeks or even months.

Among the cases heard by the court in Cameron was an appeal of the decision handed down regarding police and firefighter pay in Lafayette which could have implications around the state.

Judge Ezell said the results of the appeals of all the cases will be posted on the court's web site [www.la3circuit.org](http://www.la3circuit.org) around June 1.

## Marker request turned down by Police Jury

The ongoing discussion between the Cameron Parish Police Jury and the Cameron Chapter of the NAACP erupted into an open dispute Monday evening at the Jury's regular monthly meeting.

Louise Cole, president of the local NAACP chapter, said "We only want what we asked for, what they passed and voted on," referring to a proposed marker honoring the Buffalo soldiers and "every forgotten African-American hero from 1770 - present."

Jackie Lewis, of Lake Charles, consultant to the NAACP, presented the organization's request for the status of the marker, stating that after an April 11 meeting with Parish Administrator Tina Horn no one from the NAACP had received any further information.

Horn replied that the matter had been sent to the Division of Historic Preservation and the e-mail reply and written copy had been sent to Cole, but the written copy had been returned unopened as "refused."

Horn's original request stated, "I am working with the Cameron NAACP Chapter and their President, Mrs. Louise Cole, on the wording for a historical marker. I would like your office to approve the wording just as though it were a state historical marker. In other words, I want the historical marker to be accurate and in good taste."

The reply from Pat Duncan stated: "Our office has no role in approving commemorative markers such as this. However, I shared your

e-mail message and the marker text with the staff member who reviews official state historical markers. His response was that, were you applying for an official marker, he would not accept this text. The text of official state historical markers must be more specific and relate in some way to the site... We also require that text be documented with footnotes so that we can check the accuracy of the statement."

The Police Jury contends

that they approved the placement of the marker "pending approval of the Historical Society." Juror Charles Precht explained that, in absence of the expertise on the Jury's part to judge what was appropriate, they wanted the state office to provide guidance.

Lewis and the NAACP counter that since the state admits it does not have jurisdiction over local markers,

## Cheniere's plans are welcomed in parish

For Cheniere LNG, Cameron Parish is "where seldom is heard a discouraging word," as the company's second liquefied natural gas receiving terminal proposed for the area met with no opposition at the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission scoping meeting held Wednesday, April 27, in Cameron.

FERC representative Doug Sipe said the meeting had the largest attendance of the three held on the facility and "the most positive, happy group I've ever been around."

A stream of local officials and citizens praised Chenier for its open willingness to address their concerns and for the jobs and income the facility is expected to bring to the parish.

Most asked the FERC to expedite the approval of the company's application, which has not yet been filed.

Police Juror Darryl Farque, who represents the

Big Lake area, acknowledged there are some concerns in the area to which he is sensitive, but he feels that "the big picture is jobs, Cameron Parish moving forward." He said Cheniere is working with people to answer their questions and he is confident their concerns will be met.

Cameron resident Gilda Bargeman expressed the view of the assembly by saying, "I look forward to the construction, completion, and production of the Creole Trail LNG facility. It will provide opportunities for employment and a higher standard of living. Cheniere is not here to be a part of the problem, but part of the solution."

Cameron businessman Scott Henry said the offshore marine industry and users of the Calcasieu Loop and East Fork were initially concerned over congestion in the area of the facility, but after discussion found that Cheniere was committed to keeping those

## Virus shuts down school computers

Grand Lake School this week became the latest in the parish to be struck by a computer virus. School Superintendent Doug Chance reported that most of the computers at GLS were shut down Tuesday by the "w32 spybot worm," which has the effect of multiplying rapidly once inside the computer system and filling all the available space, effectively shutting down the units.

In the past two weeks, Cameron Elementary, Hackberry, and Johnson Bayou Schools have all been affected by the virus, but have mostly been cleaned up.

The parish Food Service computers were completely

shut down for a while, but are now back up and running. South Cameron High School had a "major problem" as well.

Technical support people are in the process of cleaning the virus from all affected computers. Chance reports that there has been no damage to hard drives, and at no time was any confidential information compromised.

The only effect has been to "freeze" the affected units. He said other school systems in the state have also been affected, as well as some Lake Charles businesses that he is aware of.

The school system's technical consultant Scott Turner is trying to locate the origin of the virus.

## Survivor recalls Audrey ordeal

(EDITOR'S NOTE--June 27 will make the 48th anniversary of Hurricane Audrey which devastated Cameron Parish and took nearly 500 lives in 1957. The following is the account of one family who went through the storm. The writer, Joseph Russell Broussard, now of Hemphill, Texas, was 28 at the time. Others in the home at the time were his wife, Lurlie Mae, 26; children Francis, 5, Mark, 4, Richard, 3 and Lisa, less than 1 year. Also present were two visitors, Hendrid (Faulk) McGill, 25, and JoBeth McGill, 5.)

Through the night of June 26, 1957 and into the early morning hours, my neighbor, C.J. Stoute and I were moving things into my family's new home that was just a few hun-

dred feet down the road from the little rental house where we were staying.

The final move-in date was still two weeks away. The new house had been built mainly by the labor of friends and family. It was financed through a bank loan that was insured by a builder's risk policy that my banker required that I carry.

I did not evacuate my family from Cameron before Hurricane Audrey, because like many others that I knew, I was also of the opinion that storms had come before with little harm. C. J. and I intended to have our two families weather this storm in the roomy new house and this is why we were bringing in water, food, blankets, bedding, and other supplies that we felt would be needed.

It was 3:30 a.m. when we finished and left the new house. On walking back to the rental house, we noticed that the wind had increased dra-

matically and that it was raining much harder. There was still no water on the road. When I entered the rental house, I found that my wife, Lurlie, was awake and asked her to make coffee. I knew we would not sleep, and both C. J. and I were wet and cold and needed a coffee boost.

As we sat waiting for the coffee to brew, I heard the gurgling of water and realized that the sound was coming from rushing water lapping up against the floor joists under the house. I told C.J. and Lurlie to, "Grab the kids; the water's rising!"

They woke everyone and led them to the car including our visitors from Georgia, Lurlie's cousin Hendrid McGill and her daughter JoBeth. I went outside and waded through about twelve inches of water to get to the car. I jerked open the hood and cut the fan belt with the thought that in high

After the meeting, Mary Poe, a charter fishing boat captain from Big Lake, asked the Coast Guard representative to clarify the level of security which will be required around LNG tankers in the Calcasieu Ship Channel.

Lt. JG David Ambos told her that there is a "safety zone," not a "security zone," around LNG ships, but that it shouldn't disrupt fishing boats as long as they stay the required distance away.

Poe reported an incident recently when she was told by a Coast Guard officer to stay out of the Trunkline LNG industrial canal for 18 hours while a tanker unloaded and left the facility. She questioned whether the same situation would apply to the Calcasieu Ship Channel.

Ambos promised to check on the incident and get back to the charter captains with a clarification.

The FERC will continue to take written comments even past the May 4 deadline, throughout the review of the project. Electronic filing is encouraged. An original and two copies of a letter should be sent to: Magalie R. Salas, Secretary, Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, 888 First St., Room 1A, Washington, DC 20426.

One copy should be labeled Gas Branch 2. The docket number, PF05-8-000 should appear on all copies. For e-filing, follow the instructions at the Commission's Web site www.ferc.gov under eFiling and the link to the User's Guide.

## Geneva & Son to be in a movie

I have just returned from Houma, where I had a part in a movie along with my son, Leslie based on my story on Hurricane Audrey on which I won a national award years ago.

I was told by the California producer of the film, "You are a movie star now" as she handed me money for the one day's work I did on the film.

I did not have a speaking part but my Leslie did, he was only 11 years old at the time and my daughter, Cherie was barely five. She only remembers hanging in a tree all day.

We lost my father-in-law who drowned in my arms and was washed away.

My husband D. W. later pulled me up into the tree and I told them all goodbye. I remembered something he had told me once that in the Gulf there are always three large swells, then a little one, so I would stay under and count three and come up on the third one, but I had done that so much I just couldn't last any more.

So I waved goodbye to my family and told them I loved them. When my husband saw that he motioned to me to grab hold of the tree limb PaPa Griffith was hanging to and he finally pulled up into the tree.

I had to stand on my crushed foot all day until the water went down enough for us to climb down onto the roof of our home that lodged against the tree. We crawled down on it and covered with our living room carpet that we retrieved from the water.

We finally made it down the ridge to the school house before dark.

We slept fitfully during the night on mats the men had taken down off the wall in the gym. We had taken off our wet clothes and put on warm band uniforms that were wrapped in plastic in the band room. Cheri came out in a majorette uniform.

By that time our local pastor Rev. Wallace Primeaux, led us all in prayer.

The movie that we just appeared in depicts the hurricane in the eyes of an 11 year old boy, Leslie's age at the

time.

The movie is on weather, and is set in Houma. The producers are working on a \$5 million budget. The producer said probably the film will be out in June of 2006 and will be an IMax film and will be shown in New Orleans.

The producers were surprised when they asked me how many lives were lost in the hurricane and I told him 529, he said that was the first time he had heard about Hurricane Audry.

high water the turning of the fan would splash water on the spark plugs and kill the engine. With the belt cut, the fan could not turn, so perhaps this would help the engine run long enough to get us to safety.

It took about five minutes for everyone to dress and load, and by that time, the water rose another six inches to about 20 inches over the top of the oyster shell road. I jumped into the car and drove us down the street. We stopped at C.J.'s house to pick up his mother and father Louie and his brother Louie, junior.

C. J.'s mother forgot her purse, and instinctively ran back into the house to search for it. This delayed us another fifteen minutes. During this short period, water began to rise quickly up the side of my car, and the car stalled. From then on, we had to push the car towards the main road for a distance of about six city blocks. I let Lurlie drive, while C. J. and I pushed.

The car was easier than normal to push, since it began to float. We picked up more people as we went along, first the Peshoff family then the Authements and then the Savoyes. We had eighteen children in the car with four adults to help keep the children calm. The rest of the adults were outside helping to push.

The atmosphere in the car was hushed with kids on best behavior. I think that the faces of the adults probably hinted to the children of the danger. My son Mark and his brother Kirk were on the floor in the back seat and remember that it was odd, and somehow wrong, to see water leaking in from the outside through cracks in the doors. The adults on the outside were wading through flowing saltwater. A friend and neighbor named Gordon joined in the pushing.

By the time we made it to the main road, the water was waist high. There, in front of Buster Roger's home, a large number of people had assembled. The main road had an elevation of about three feet above the surrounding land, so that it was not yet flooded. The rain kept us all wet, and the wind was blowing at about 30 miles per hour.

C.J., Timmy LeBlanc and I walked down the road to a Phillips 66 station where we found an electric line repair truck. Not having the keys, we hot-wired the ignition and got it started. With the truck, we decided to scout out conditions by making a run into town with the intention of going all the way to the center near the courthouse.

We picked-up C. J.'s father Louie at Buster's. We made it as far as the Methodist church which was a quarter mile out of town. There, the water was too deep, even for a work truck. We were scared of going further, because if we killed the engine, we might not get it restarted. We decided to turn back.

This meant that the option for getting everyone to the Court House was out. Louie Stoute was out of the truck, wading in the water and

heading toward town. We assumed he was just checking the water depth, so we called to him to come back.

He said was going to check his ferry boat, the 'George Hamilton' located on the other side of town. He would later safely ride this boat back through town and down Main Street during the storm in an attempt to get back to check on his family.

We turned back to Buster's house and hooked up five cars each filled with people and towed them all down the road like a train. Now that the Court House was out as a shelter, the best option for survival was for everyone to stay in the largest home in the immediate area.

This was a civil war mansion built by George Wakefield in 1844, but known to locals as Austin Davis' house where the elderly Mr. Davis still lived. Once we arrived with a load of people, the adults carried the children through the water and into the house. C. J. and I returned to Buster's house to pick up more people. We made three trips in all. After the third trip, we had to give it up, because flood waters were beginning to wash cars off the road and into the yard at Austin's house.

We went inside and made a head count. We counted 152 people, including, to my surprise, my mother Louise and father Claude who had made their way from their home near the eastern edge of town.

The weight of the people in the house might have aided in anchoring the building.

Maybe it was the large oaks in the front that shielded it from other houses colliding. Perhaps, the jumble of cars formed a bulwark barricade which diverted flood waters and floating debris around it. Certainly, the order given by Mr. Davis to open all the bottom windows helped relieve the pressure of the wind, and more importantly allowed water to enter and prevented the house from floating like a boat. Whatever the cause, the result was that the house never left its foundation. They don't build houses like that any more.

We estimated the wind was now about 130 to 140 mph. All women and children were sent upstairs in two rooms. All the men were downstairs for a period until later in the storm when the water got too high even though the first floor had sixteen foot ceilings.

The idea was to form a human chain to catch people as they floated by. C. J. and I tried to catch a man and his wife, but the attempt failed. C. J. was swept away, and I was flung back into the house and through a window by a wave.

The window had jagged glass. As I clutched the window frame to keep from being drawn back out by the return flow, the glass cut my left arm badly. C.J. was able to swim to the rear of the house and climb to the top of a big pecan tree. He related later that he spent the storm there in the company of a blackbird and a big dog.

Saint Therese donated her gold bracelet to be melted down and used as part of a monstrance at le Sacre Coeur in Montmartre, Paris, France where Jesus in the Sacred Host is lifted up in love through Perpetual Eucharistic Adoration to this day.



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## Jobs are down but wages are up in Cameron Parish

### Capital News

Improvements in several employment sectors in Cameron Parish were not enough to overcome losses in others, causing average employment to drop in the latest quarterly report from the State Department of Labor.

The 2,975 jobs in the parish during the third quarter of 2004 were 75 fewer than listed in the report covering the previous three months. The average weekly wage in the parish, however, grew from \$583.37 to \$592.69 during that period as total wages for the third quarter dipped to \$22.9 million. Total wages during the second quarter of last year added up to \$23.1 million.

The largest increase in the parish occurred in the real estate and rental and leasing sector, where the average employment was up 15 jobs to 110 for the period covering July through September. Health care and social assistance provided 14 additional jobs to bring average employment in that field to 101. The 263 wholesale trade jobs in the parish included an average increase of seven. Two new spots in agriculture, forestry, fishing and hunting brought its average to 13 in the latest report.

The parish's hardest hit job sector, according to the report, was construction, where average employment dropped by 30 to reach 233 in the third quarter. Transportation and warehousing, the parish's largest employment field, fell by 20 to average 485. The mining sector, which includes the oil and gas industry, was down by 10 to an average of 258 jobs in the third quarter.

Single-digit decreases were noted in the average employment in retail trade; finance and insurance; professional and technical services; administrative and waste services; arts, entertainment and recreation; and accommodation and food services; and public administration.

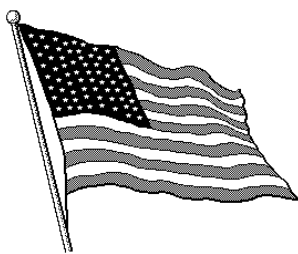

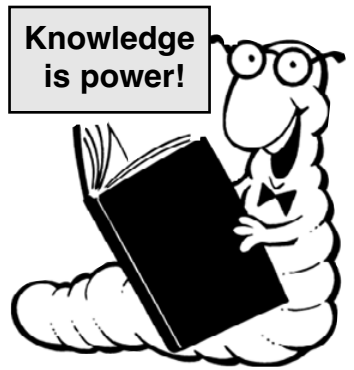

## MAY DAY

The month of May is here, but something tells me it's still late winter, early spring, instead of late spring, early summer. I think it could be all these weekly cold fronts and strong north winds that has our minds messed up.

These fronts sure make it hard fishing, winds 20 to 25 mph makes for rough water, muddy water and it's really hard fishing.

Wild blueberries are ripening in our woods, flowers are blooming and gardens are starting to produce, although they also had to fight the strong winds and winter type weather.

Bluegills begin to bed up, some nice ones caught in the Big Burn last week. Oysters prepare for early summer spawn as waters are warming up, while this is the month we'll start to see and enjoy fresh shrimp here in our parish

Common water snakes become nocturnal for summer months and won't be long before the alligators start following for their mating game.

Brown pelicans begin nesting in full swing, young redcockaded woodpeckers leave cavity nests, while the wild turkey hatch will begin and get underway.

## GIBBSTOWN DOG FIGHT

Week three of the Gibbstown dog fight has seen an entry of 21 boats fight the weather, and once again the Big Burn marshes yielded this weeks top stringer and largest bass.

Johnny LeDoux and Matthew Griffith had the top three bass stringer weighing 6.48 pounds, and also had the largest bass caught by Johnny weighing 3.97 pounds. He caught the largest bass on a Cotton-Candy lizard. Second place three bass stringer went to Clint Ward and Johnny Watkins weighing 5.47 pounds. Third place stringer of three bass went to Bryan Thigpen and Jesse Moss weighing 5.12 pounds. Ricky Canik and Carl Broussard had the second place largest bass hooking a 2.91 pounder. George Melancon was weigh-master.

## LICENSE PLATE PRIDE

Some states are taking pride by putting either hunting or fishing plates on the market. Paying extra for these license brings in revenue to these states wildlife

departments. These plates run 25 to 30 dollars with 15 to 20 dollars going to their states wildlife fund.

The state of Ohio has a bass with ANGLER written across it. These plates will be out this summer with wall-eye, smallmouth bass for the anglers and wild turkey and whitetail deer for the hunter.

## RECORD FISH

Belonging to the Louisiana Outdoor Writer's Association, helps me keep up with new fish records when they come along. We may just have a new Gulf of Mexico record yellowfin tuna caught by Anthony Taormina IV fishing out of Venice. The scales showed 240.3 pounds, 76 inches in length and 52 inches around the girth.

## AREA FISHING

If you can fish Big Lake between the winds, big speckle trout are beginning to hit top water baits, but don't forget, soft plastics in glow, chartreuse, black-chartreuse and I like to throw the purple-chartreuse eel. Some 9 and 10 pounders have been taken to bed, the Mercury--S.T.A.R tournaments don't begin until May 28. Don't forget you have to join the C.C.A. and also join the statewide tournament and angler's rodeo There will also be awards for tagged redfish, black drums, flounders, sheepsheads and offshore species.

Fishing trout on Commissary Point is my favorite spot, but waters have to be calm. West Cove is calmer than Big Lake itself, but the southeastern part of the lake is also good. Watch the birds work as shrimp are entering the lake and they follow these schools of trout trying to feed on minnows and shrimp. Many times throwing topwater baits after trout, you'll catch redfish that either are mixed in the school of trout, are in a school of redfish of their own.

Bass fishing is still tough and water in the Big Burn is really getting low. Vegetation is growing fast, so fishing the area makes it tough. Lake Mesire has been muddy as well as much of Amoco.

The Mermentau River has redfish hitting along the rocks and at the jetties, again if the water isn't muddy.

Take an "Old Timer" fishing, you may learn new tricks!
