



P. Jury tables decision

To table or not to table, that was the question more than once during Monday night's regular Police Jury meeting. Two permit applications from Pioneer Exploration, Ltd., for relocation of an existing oil and gas production facility and flowlines in the Oak Grove area, were tabled due to objections from affected landowners.

The previously tabled permit request by the Louisiana Department of Natural Resources to repair the breaches in the Cameron Creole Watershed levee system was unanimously approved. The Jury accepted the recommendation of the Watershed Advisory Committee to plug the breaches but leave the control structures open until a new operation plan can be developed.

Police Jury President Darryl Farque said he had appointed three shrimpers, representing Cameron, Big

Lake, and Hackberry, to sit on the operation plan committee, which will have its first meeting in July. The plan is expected by the end of the year, with implementation beginning in January.

CONTROVERSY

Sparks flew when a request by Creole juror Scott Trahan to give control of rentals, maintenance and operation of the Creole Fire Station to the Creole Fire Department. Grand Chenier juror Douaine Conner moved to table the matter until more information could be received from his constituents who are included in the Creole Recreation District, which had shared the operation and maintenance of the building before the storm.

Trahan took offense and vehemently refused to accept a motion to table. When his original motion went to a vote, it was either 3-2 against or tied, with Conner, James Doxey, and Steve Trahan vot-

ing against and Sonny McGea and Scott Trahan voting for. Farque later called it 3-3, indicating he had voted for the motion. Trahan took Doxey to task for voting against him, but Doxey said he had just found out about the recreation district opposition and wanted more information.

The motion was an "add-on," not discussed at last week's agenda meeting. Depending on whether the president's vote was recorded as in favor, thus making a tie, the matter may be brought up again at next month's meeting.

One item which was tabled was the public information requests policy. Requests for public documents have been running to hundreds of pages and greatly slowing down the operation of the parish administration office, according to Parish Administrator Tina Horn. Assistant District Attorney Tom Barrett is preparing a policy to deal with the problem.

Book features courthouse

A recently published book surveys the New Deal projects and their lasting impact in Louisiana and includes a photograph of the Cameron Parish Courthouse and several mentions of the local PWA project.

Robert D. Leighninger, Jr., the author, is a faculty associate in the School of Social Work at Arizona State University. One of his contacts for information on the Cameron Courthouse was the Cameron Pilot.

During the New Deal era of the 1930s, a tremendous amount of Louisiana's physical and cultural infrastructure was built in a very short time. Most of these buildings have been in use now for almost seven decades, yet few people are aware of the circumstances surrounding their origins. *Building Louisiana: The Legacy of the Public Works Administration* (University Press of Mississippi) documents all of

the projects of the Louisiana Public Works Administration and places them into social and political context.

Author Leighninger tells the story of the establishment of PWA, the battles between Interior Secretary and PWA Administrator Harold Ickes with Senator Huey Long during the early New Deal, the rapprochement of Long's successor, Richard Leche, with Washington, and the feverish building activity that ensued.

This book is divided into three sections: the first provides an overview of the PWA in Louisiana; the second deals with cultural infrastructure and community development, while the third focuses on physical infrastructure and the development of the broader economy. Also included is an annotated inventory of every PWA project in the state, community-by-community and structure-by-structure.

"When the Cameron Parish courthouse was being built," the book relates, "REI (resi-

dent engineer-inspector) P.M. Davis reported that the contractor asked what it would take for Davis to 'go fishing every day and spend more time on the river and less inspecting the work.' Davis declined and reported the bribery attempt."

The book states that four parish courthouses/jail received funding on Feb. 12, 1937, including Cameron, Caldwell, East Carroll and Terrebonne.

Commenting on the strong construction of the Public Works Administration courthouses, the author states:

"All the PWA courthouses were built to last. All are still standing, and all are still the focus of parish judicial life. Testimony to the structures' solidity can be found in Cameron Parish, where its courthouse was one of the few buildings in town to weather Hurricane Audrey in 1957 without serious damage. In 2005 Hurricane Rita leveled almost the entire town, but

the courthouse is still standing."

Commenting on the Cameron courthouse's style, the author states:

"With its smooth, light plaster walls and relatively undecorated surfaces, the Cameron courthouse is more similar to New Iberia's."

He also notes that the Mayan theme is carried out in the Cameron courthouse. "This can be seen in the pylons flanking the entrance to the Cameron courthouse. The Mayan influence was felt not only in art deco but also in the 1920s southern California work of Frank Lloyd Wright."

One interesting story concerning the Cameron courthouse is not mentioned in the book. Prior to the elected president, Franklin Roosevelt had been on a hunting trip to Grand Chenier where he hunted with Jim Bonsall. Some years later when the PWA was planning to build courthouses in Louisiana, Roosevelt urged the agency to erect a good one in Cameron Parish because of his friendship with Bonsall.

Later the president wrote Mrs. Bonsall recalling his hunting trip to Grand Chenier. A copy of that letter was presented to the Cameron Parish School Board last year.

Cameron square plans released to the public

The Cameron Parish Office of Planning and Development has released the master plan for the Cameron Square development project, a cornerstone of the parish recovery plan. A copy of the report is available at the Cameron Public Library branch.

In it, drawings and floor plans are shown for two new government buildings, the East and West Annexes, adjacent to the Court House, and a new Sheriff's Office and Jail to be built behind the Cameron Multipurpose Building. Costs and funding sources are also included.

The East Annex is to house the District Attorney's Office and Tax Assessor when completed in the fall of 2008. It will cost an estimated \$3.1 million, most of which will be funded by FEMA, as it replaces the original Police Jury annex.

The West Annex is planned for the other side of the square, on land that will have to be acquired from private owners. Parish Planner Ernie Broussard says owners have been contacted and are willing to discuss selling. The West Annex will house the Parish Administration, Office of Planning and Development, Permitting, GIS, and Office of Emergency Preparedness. It will cost \$5.2 million, which is expected to come from federal, state and local sources.

The new law enforcement center and jail will require

\$9.8 million. The property behind the multipurpose building is owned by the parish. Funding is hoped to come from federal, state and local resources as well.

After all these agencies have moved out of the court house, the building will be occupied by the 38th Judicial Court, the Clerk of Court, and in the basement, the Registrar of Voters, Department of Motor Vehicles, and the Veterans Administration. Plans to upgrade the court house building with plaster repair, new paint, new interior walls, and suspended ceilings will cost \$3 million.

Including the future waterfront development south of the court house, the entire plan would cost \$45 million, of which \$35 million is hoped to come from state capital outlay funds. Some of the waterfront plan is expected to involve private business investment.

Broussard announced Monday that Gov. Blanco has included three Cameron projects in this year's capital outlay budget. They are \$500,000 for planning and engineering for the Holly Beach Sewer System, \$4.5 million to build the system designated Priority 5, and \$5.5 million non-cash line of credit approved for the Cameron Square program.

The welcome news that Pres. Bush has agreed to waive the 10% FEMA match for all Louisiana public rebuilding projects means that Cameron Parish will save \$2.6 million in rebuilding costs.

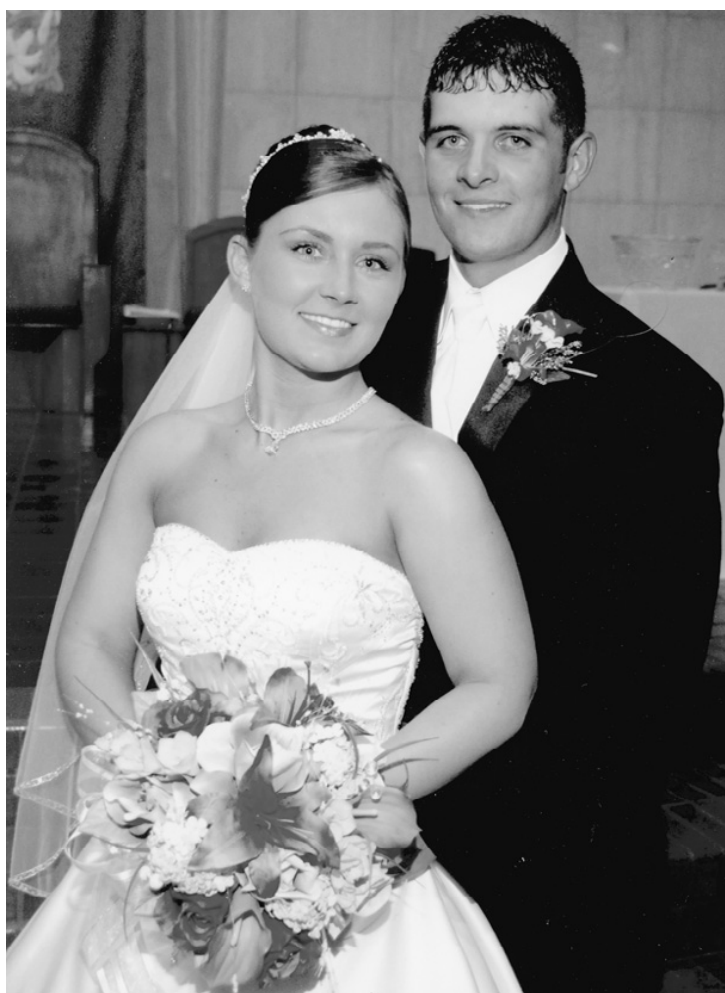

The U. S. House of Representatives on Tuesday approved a resolution supporting a proposed National Hurricane Museum and Science Center in Southwest Louisiana. Rep. Charles Boustany Jr., R-La., authored the resolution.

According to museum organizers, the center will chronicle all recorded U.S. hurricanes, feature a memorial to victims, and emphasize the 2005 hurricane season.

The center would cost about \$100 million to build.

The project is being led by the Creole Nature Trail All-American Road District board of commissioners, which began working on it before the 2005 storm season. In September, the project was awarded a \$1.3 million U.S. Department of Transportation Scenic Byways grant.

The center would partner

with the National Weather Service, the media and other public and private organizations to provide information on severe weather events and their aftermath.

Site selection is expected to be announced this month. Two of the proposed sites are in Cameron Parish.

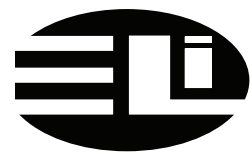

The deadline for entry fees is Friday, June 8 at 6 p.m., but someone will be at the park between 6 a.m. and 8 a.m. on Saturday morning for late entries.

Entry forms can be turned in at Kelley's Mart, Grand Chenier; Nunez 1 Stop, Creole; Wade Carroll's at the Y in Cameron and Chesson's in Sweetlake. Lake Charles anglers can go to L. C. Tackle, L. C. TROUT TAGGING

The LSU research team is teaming up with the La. Dept. of Wildlife & Fisheries, (LDWF) for a study on the movement patterns of spotted sea trout (speckle trout) in Calcasieu Lake. The two year study began last month. Roughly 120 adult trout have been outfitted with acoustic transmitters or "pingers."

All fish marked with acoustic transmitters will have a yellow dart tag below the dorsal fin that reads "LSU-Reward-Please-Release." Anglers who catch the tagged fish, should release the fish alive and call 1-800-891-3977 to report the tag numbers; where and when the fish was caught. It's very important that these tagged fish be released alive so that the research team can continue to collect movement data.

Tag numbers are given at both ends of the tag; example (LSU tag) LT166001. Anglers who provide recapture information and release the tagged fish alive, will receive a La. Sports Fish Tagging Program hat and T-shirt and then be entered in an annual drawing for GPS units and cash prizes of up to \$500.

Some of the transmitters will be placed throughout Calcasieu Lake to listen for fish with transmitters. Receivers will be placed on Channel markers in the Calcasieu Ship Channel and on buoys in the main body of the lake. Boaters and fishermen should not tamper with or tie up to the buoys.

The Coastal Conservation Association (CCA) and LDWF also tagged fish in Calcasieu Lake. These darts are placed in the same location on the fish, but have different text on them.

The goal is to have a better understanding of movement and seasonal migration patterns of spotted sea trout, to have effective management of this species. This will tell if trout leave Calcasieu Lake and go offshore, if so, do they return and when? Where do the fish spawn and spend winter months? Do migration patterns differ by size and sex? Also in addition, the different habitat they use and does environment change their behavior. Also the use by trout of artificial oyster reefs.

TOLEDO - RAYBURN

Conditions have been good on both lakes, some windy, choppy days, but anglers are doing well in both places. We had some of our locals fish Sam Rayburn last weekend and did O.K.

Toledo Bend's water is still about 170 feet and water temperatures are holding in the 76-79 degree range, but it's getting hotter as we move into June and these temperatures will rise. Anglers are still catching bass in the shallow waters, but good catches in the 15 to 25 feet area with crank baits and weightless worms.

Tournament fishing having adverse effect?

The perception that tournament fishing has negative impacts on bass populations is widespread among non-tournament anglers. Many studies have shown that heavy tournament activity does affect bass fishing, but generally not to the degree that many believe.

The most recent data from a study on a huge Texas impoundment tends to support the conclusion that population impacts do occur, but are not excessive.

Sam Rayburn Reservoir is the site of more than 300 bass tournaments every year. About half of the total number of anglers surveyed there participate in tournaments, which is a much higher percentage than average. The result is that about a fifth of total angling effort on Sam Rayburn occurs during tournaments, and more than 150,000 tournament angler-hours were expended during the study.

Estimates of fishing mortality in the reservoir were generated from a tagging project that marked more than 6,000 fish. Of these, only 40 fish were later documented in creel surveys.

When the researchers used extreme estimated rates of exploitation and mortality, tournament fishing would kill six percent of legal-sized fish, accounting for 28 percent of total angling mortality. And when using more realistic exploitation and mortality rates, tournament fishing kills just two percent of legal fish, or 16 percent of total angling mortality.

At 16 percent, tournament-caught bass mortality is actually lower than that of

catch-and-release fishing, which is 20 percent of total fishing mortality. Of course, mortality in the ice chest is 100 percent, and fish that are harvested by non-tournament anglers account for between 56 and 83 percent of total angling mortality.

Will these numbers stop the debates between tournament and non-tournament anglers? Of course not - there are still plenty of issues to argue. It seems that anytime that two or more groups utilize natural resources differently, disagreements spread.

This study supports the idea that all types of bass fishing will affect populations - even 100 percent catch-and-release. How much impact occurs from tournament, catch-release or harvest fishing depends on local conditions.

Still, some tournament anglers would prefer that no bass be brought to the table, while harvest-oriented fishermen are probably correct in assuming that fish that see lots of lures, and may have been caught before, are often difficult to catch. In fact, the authors of the current study provide some issues for further debate.

Their data, like some previous work, indicates that the mortality from tournament bass fishing may be greatest for larger fish. They also point out that their conclusions are not necessarily applicable to lakes much smaller than Sam Rayburn, which is nearly 180 square miles in area.

Apply to Road Home by July 31

Owners of single-unit, double-unit, condominiums and mobile homes are encouraged to apply.

Road Home officials announce funding

Road Home program officials announced Tuesday, June 5, the second round of funding through The Small Rental Property program. Through this round, up to \$300 million will be made available to encourage property owners to restore much needed rental housing and to commit to make that housing affordable. This second round comes on the heels of the first round, which funded over \$202 million to help revive more than 5,000 rental units in 13 parishes.

The new round will continue to place the highest priority on owner occupants of three and four unit properties followed by other small rental owners whose buildings suffered significant damage from Hurricane Katrina or Rita. This round will also be open to middle size rental owners (those who own between 21 and 100 units) and new owners (those Louisiana residents who have purchased property since the storms) if funding is available after the priority groups. As in Round One, there will also be a 5% set aside for non-profits focused on providing longer term affordability and targeting units to those households with special needs.

The program will continue to be limited to small rental buildings between one and four units. However, partially occupied buildings will now be eligible for funding as well as vacant buildings. Round 2 will remain open until July 5, for both general and nonprofit organization applications and offers an easy-to-use online application submission.

The program offers awards through a series of competitive application rounds to ensure incentives are available to those owners who need it most. Larger property owners will have an opportunity to apply in later rounds. The amount of the incentive owners may receive will depend on the affordability of rents they are willing to charge.

"The momentum started back in the middle of April when we announced the first awards from Round 1. That was an outstanding starting point for the program and gives us high hopes for Round 2," said Louisiana's Office of Community Development Rental Program Manager Calvin Parker. "Round 2 keeps the momentum going by offering more opportunities to rebuild our neighborhoods by making new investors eligible in this round as well as partially occupied properties."

To be eligible for Round 2, applicants must own a one- to four-unit rental property located in one of the 13 parishes hardest hit by the storms: Acadia, Calcasieu, Cameron, Iberia, Jefferson, Orleans, Plaquemines, St. Bernard, St. Tammany, Tangipahoa, Terrebonne, Vermilion or Washington. All eligibility criteria can be found online at www.road2LA.org/rental or by calling The Road Home call center at 1-888-ROAD-2-LA (1-888-762-3252).


"As a result of Round 1 more than 4,000 units will be rented at affordable rates for low- to moderate-income working families and offer housing options that people can actually afford," said Senator Derrick Shepherd. "Anticipating there will be more applications for Round 2, the program is offering up to \$100 million more funding for this round."

Starting today, property owners with up to 100 rental units at the time of the storms, nonprofit organizations, and owner-occupied three- and four-unit property owners can apply to Round 2 by printing or submitting an application online at www.road2la.org/rental. Paper applications can be printed online or requested by calling 1-888-ROAD-2-LA. Paper applications should be mailed to P.O. Box 4729, Baton Rouge, LA 70821-1182. Applicants who were not awarded in Round 1 but met basic eligibility requirements are strongly encouraged to reapply.

"There is a great need for affordable rental housing for the 13 parishes funded in this round," added Parker. "Round 2 helps provide additional opportunities to property owners providing affordable rental options to low- to moderate level income families in those communities."
