

Holly Beach man indicted

Calcasieu parish grand jurors on Thursday indicted the man accused of kidnapping a 14-year-old boy in April and raping him.

Scott P. Mueschke, 40, of 2435 Heron Road, Holly Beach, was indicted on forcible rape and second-degree kidnapping charges.

Mueschke remains in jail in Cameron Parish, where he was first arrested on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a juvenile.

During a hearing weeks after the arrest, Calcasieu Sheriff's Deputy Andree Daugereaux testified that the 14-year-old boy escaped from a mini-storage facility in Sulphur and sought assistance from the Sheriff's Office.

The boy said Mueschke, who is a family friend, invited him to eat and go to a movie.

When the boy and Mueschke left, the defendant told the youth he would have to go to his house in Holly Beach to change clothes.

The rape occurred when the two reached Mueschke's home, Daugereaux said.

Mueschke then drove the boy back to Sulphur and took him to the mini-warehouse, where he forced the youth to perform sex acts.

Mueschke then left the boy in the warehouse. The boy waited until Mueschke was gone, then ran out and sought help.

The kidnapping and rape allegedly occurred on April 7. Mueschke was arrested by Calcasieu Parish authorities the following day. He was later taken to Cameron Parish and booked into jail there on an outstanding warrant.

Creole Nature Trail - All American Road recognized nationally

The Creole Nature Trail, which circle through a large portion of Cameron Parish, has been designated an All American Road, placing it in the same class as the Natchez Trace Parkway, the Big Sur Coast Highway in California and the Pacific Coast Scenic Byway in Oregon, has been named as one of the All-American Roads.

The announcement was made by U. S. Secretary of Transportation Norman Mineta last week and was detailed at a press conference held in Lake Charles Friday by the Cameron Parish Tourism Commission, the Southwest La. Convention & Visitors Bureau and the Creole Nature Trail National Scenic Byway district.

"America's Byways are roads to the heart and soul of America," said Secretary Mineta. "Byways help create a sense of pride in America. They connect us to this country's beauty, history and culture."

Under the National Scenic Byways Program, the U. S. Secretary of Transportation recognizes certain roads as National Scenic Byways or All-American Roads based on their archaeological, cultural, his-

toric, natural, recreational and scenic qualities.

A panel of experts considered the roads nominated for designation this year. Panel members were chosen based on, among other things, their experience with these six qualities expected in All-American Roads and National Scenic Byways.

To receive an All-American Road designation, a road must possess multiple intrinsic qualities that are nationally significant and have one-of-a-kind features that do not exist elsewhere. The road or highway must also be considered a "destination unto itself." That is, the road must provide an exceptional traveling experience so recognized by travelers that they would make a drive along the highway a primary reason for their trip.

The National Scenic Byways Program, established by Congress in 1991 and administered by the U. S. Department of Transportation's Federal Highway Administration was created to preserve and protect the nation's scenic byways and, at the same time, promote tourism and economic development.

2nd ethics ruling made

For a second straight month, the state ethics board dealt with a Cameron Parish School Board-related issue.

Last month the board ruled that Cameron board member Dorothy Theriot can vote on issues dealing with the reopening of Grand Chenier Elementary School if she files a disclosure statement and that she may not ask that the matter be placed on the agenda or otherwise participate in the transaction.

Theriot's husband, Freddie Theriot, is an heir who is requesting the return of the property where the school is located. Cameron Parish Superintendent Judith Jones requested the opinion to determine whether Dorothy Theriot's participation in matters dealing with the reopening of the school violate the ethics code since her husband is an heir.

After the May ruling, it was decided to ask for a second ruling after Theriot's husband divested himself of his economic interest in the land and building involving the school to his uncle.

The board concluded that if Theriot's husband no longer has an ownership interest in the property, she is free to participate in matters involving the school, ethics staff attorney Maris McCrory said.

Cameron Parish Assistant District Attorney Cecil R. Sanner asked for both opinions.

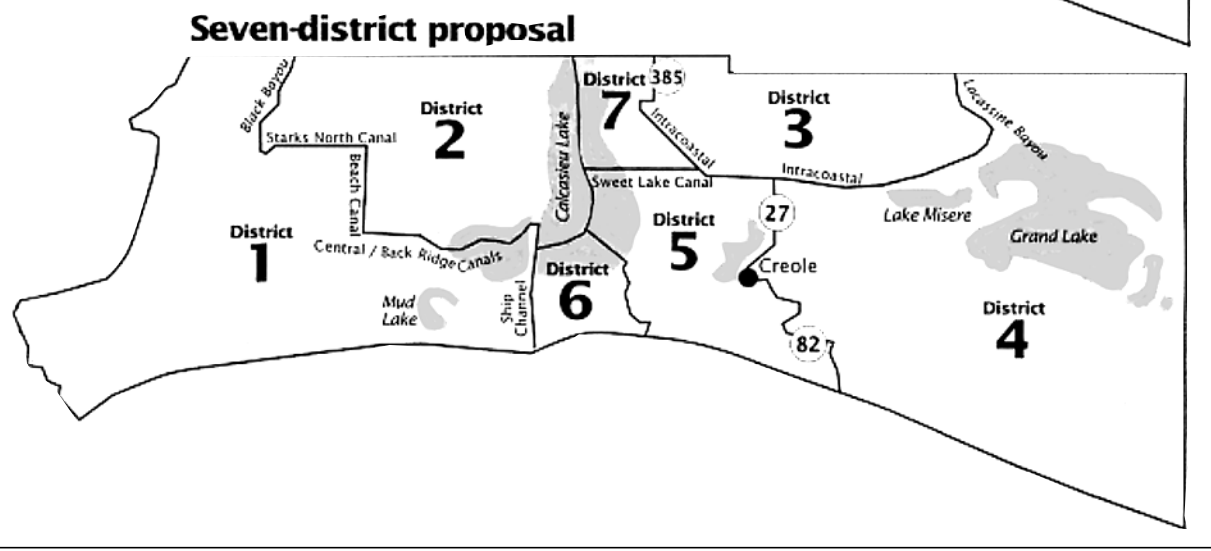
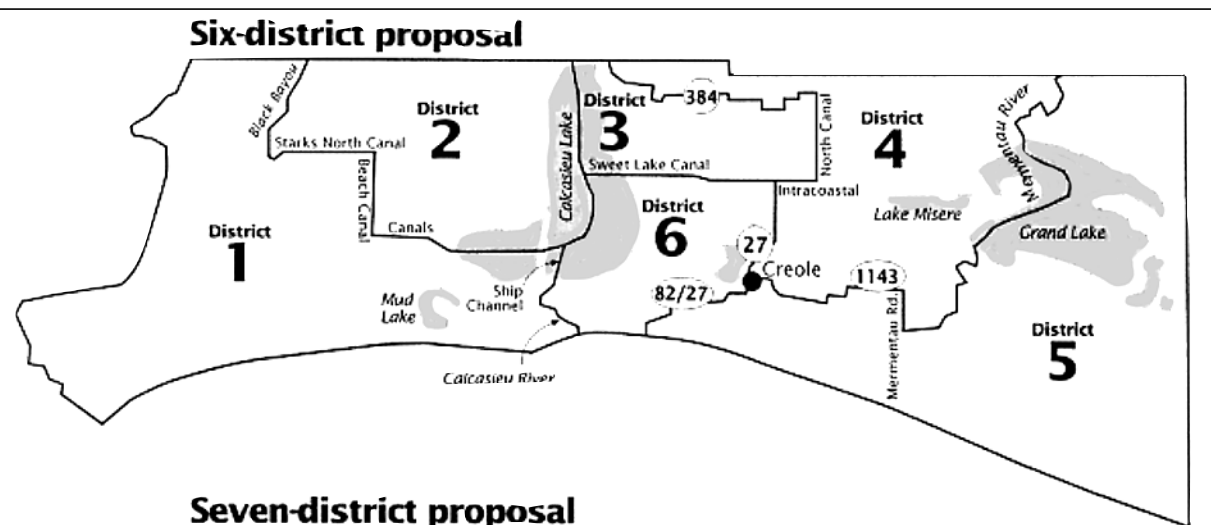

School Board redistricting plans

School Board to hire expert

A special meeting of the Cameron Parish School Board was held Tuesday night before a packed audience of interested citizens to discuss the mandated reapportionment plan of the board which has been accepted by the Justice Department.

On hand for advice was Bob Hammond, a school board attorney and consultant who is an expert in policy and personnel, and Jennifer Jones, assistant district attorney for Cameron Parish.

At issue is the board's plan, which was in by the March 1 deadline and has the parish broken up into six areas.

Many said that it isn't a true voice for all the people, since those in one area do not know or

understand the needs of other areas of the parish.

The northern part of the parish, the Grand Lake-Sweetlake area, is growing like wildfire, while the lower part of the parish, near the coast, is dwindling in population.

The Johnson Bayou area is sparse in population but contains 561 camps at Holly Beach, owned mostly by summer residents who pay utilities to the parish.

The purpose of the meeting was to decide whether to keep the present plan or to go with a plan that the police jury is looking at that has divided the parish into seven districts and adds another member.

Comments were heard from several local citizens, including Dusty Sandifer, police juror, who

gave a synopsis of the plan the police jury has adopted, and Howard Romero, who urged the school board to have a plan that serves all the communities in Cameron, saying, "I would rather have a plan that works and have it challenged in court."

Pat Howerton, school board president, gave a history of the board's plan which was approved by the federal court but had additional wording that was not asked for.

After a lengthy discussion, the board voted 4 to 2 to rescind the plan and instructed Judy Jones, superintendent, to hire an expert to look at the plans, using federal and state guidelines, for a seven-member board and come up with a recommendation.

New terminal proposed for HB

The Hackberry LNG Terminal, L.L.C., has announced that it proposes to convert a liquefied petroleum gas terminal in Hackberry to an LNG import terminal which will include two unloading docks, three storage tanks, and equipment to vaporize the LNG to natural gas.

The new facility will be capable of delivering 2.5 billion cubic feet of natural gas per day.

In addition to the terminal, Hackberry LNG proposes to construct a 35-mile pipeline to transport natural gas from the terminal to connect with existing interstate pipelines to the north.

Work associated with the construction of the proposed LNG Terminal is expected to begin in the fall of 2003. Construction on the proposed pipeline is expected to begin in April 2006 with completion by September 2006. The terminal and pipeline should commence operations in the fourth quarter of 2006.

The new 36-inch diameter natural gas send out pipeline will begin at the LNG Terminal in Cameron Parish, run through Calcasieu Parish connecting with existing interstate pipelines, and end at a compressor site in Beauregard Parish.

Hackberry LNG Terminal, L.L.C., is a wholly owned subsidiary of Dyneq Midstream Services, L. P. The principal office is located at 1000 Louisiana, Suite 5800, Houston, Texas 77002.

Community meeting held Monday night

Local citizens concerned over the reapportionment plan proposed for Creole, the plan that both the parish police jury and school board are mandated to put into place before their next elections, was discussed at a special meeting Monday night at the community center.

The two bodies have different plans, with the police jury deciding on a seventh juror and the school board proposing a sixth district plan.

The police jury will have to elect another board member, but they feel that this will give the areas better representation.

The new plan, adding one more member on the school board and police jury, calls for two representatives from Grand Lake and one each from Johnson Bayou, Cameron, Creole-Oak Grove, Grand Chenier and Hackberry.

The police jury will have to elect another member, but this is necessary since the Sweet Lake - Grand Lake area, in the northern part of the parish, is growing so fast it was necessary.

Cameron Parish is unique in the state in that it is the largest in land area and the smallest in population, with only 991 people

registered to vote in the parish. "We do not want to lose our voice in the parish or community," Police Juror Dusty Sandifer said. "The people in the spread out communities do not know about the concerns in the other communities. We are willing to fight for our plan all the way to the Supreme Court."

Howard Romero, a resident of Johnson Bayou, said, "Let's all stick together and back our school board in its decision and we must have a plan by the end of August."

The added cost annually will be approximately \$7200 for another member.

Tina Horn, parish administrator, reminded the group that voting precincts can be split in the school board election, but the police jury has to use whole precincts.

Sandifer said that the police jury felt that with their plan every man will have an equal vote and be represented with the addition of one more man on the police jury.

He also said that the worst thing that could happen is if we are challenged to a court of law, but we are prepared because the police jury has been working on this plan for two years.

(Lake Charles American Press, June 21, 1939) CHANNEL DREDGING

Definite assurance that the direct channel allotment will be spent by the war department in a manner that will "provide the maximum benefits for the public" has been received by Rep. Rene L. DeRouen from Major General Julian L. Schley, chief of U. S. Army Engineers.

Cong. DeRouen, in a letter to Gen. Schley, pointed out that if the current appropriation, \$2,500,000 is applied on the dredging portion of the project, the channel can be opened to deep sea traffic at least a year earlier than under an alternative plan in which a major portion of the fund will be expended for the jetties.

Local port interests have long concentrated on completing the direct channel first and continuing with jetty construction later. It was explained that the channel, which has already been completed to Hackberry Point, can be dug to the mouth of the Calcasieu River for approximately \$1,500,000. The remainder can be used either to continue dredging into the Gulf to the 10-foot contour line or beyond, or could be used for jetty work.

(Cameron Pilot, June 19, 1969) PARISH WINS SUIT

It's news when someone wins a suit against the federal government and that's just what Cameron Parish has done in winning a decision against the U. S. Dept. of Interior this past week.

Federal Judge Edwin Hunter of Lake Charles ruled on June 13 that the Cameron Parish Police Jury was entitled to half of 25 percent of the net revenues from the Lacassine and Sabine National Wildlife Refuges in Cameron Parish to be used for road improvements in the parish.

The police jury expects to get a total of \$60,000 that has been held in escrow for the past two years while the matter was settled in court. The jury stands to receive about \$30,000 a year in the future.

In past years, the federal refuges have not paid parish taxes on income from oil and gas production and from trapping. In lieu of taxes, the Dept. of Interior has paid the parish 25 percent of the net revenues of the refuges to be used solely for "schools and roads."

FIRE ANTS TO BE DISCUSSED

Imported fire ants, which have become a serious problem to Cameron Parish farmers and cattlemen in recent years, will be discussed at a public meeting at 1 p.m., Friday, June 20 at the Cameron Courthouse.

County Agent Clifford Myers said a representative of the fire ant division of the State Dept. of Agriculture will be here to outline a control program to interested persons.

He will discuss a proposed state-wide program that will be set up if an appropriation introduced in the current legislative session is approved. Rep. Conway LeBleu of Cameron introduced the measure.

In the meantime, Cameron Parish farmers are carrying out their own control program. Ant poison is available at cost from the State Dept. of Agriculture and may be ordered by farmers through Myers.

The county agent said a concerted effort is being made in the Grand Chenier area to con-

trol the ants. About ten farmers have purchased poison applicators that can be used behind a tractor.

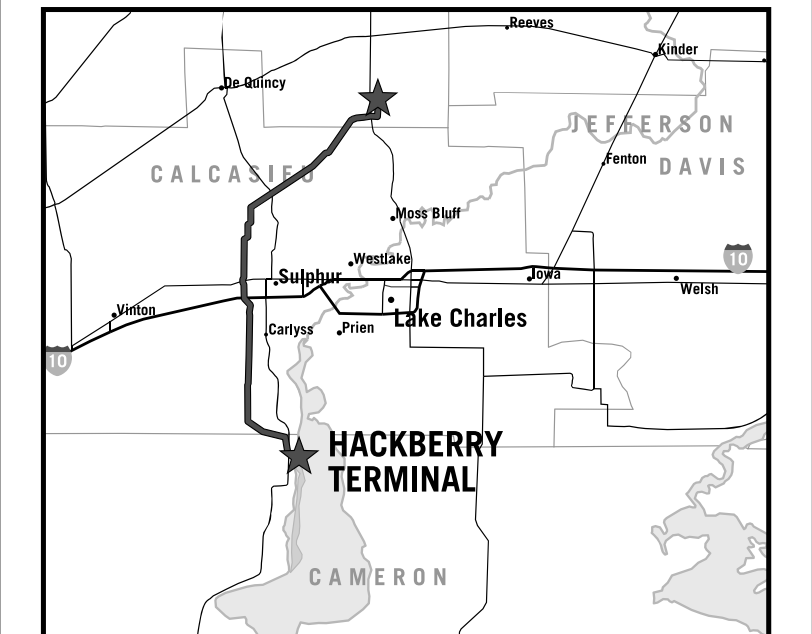

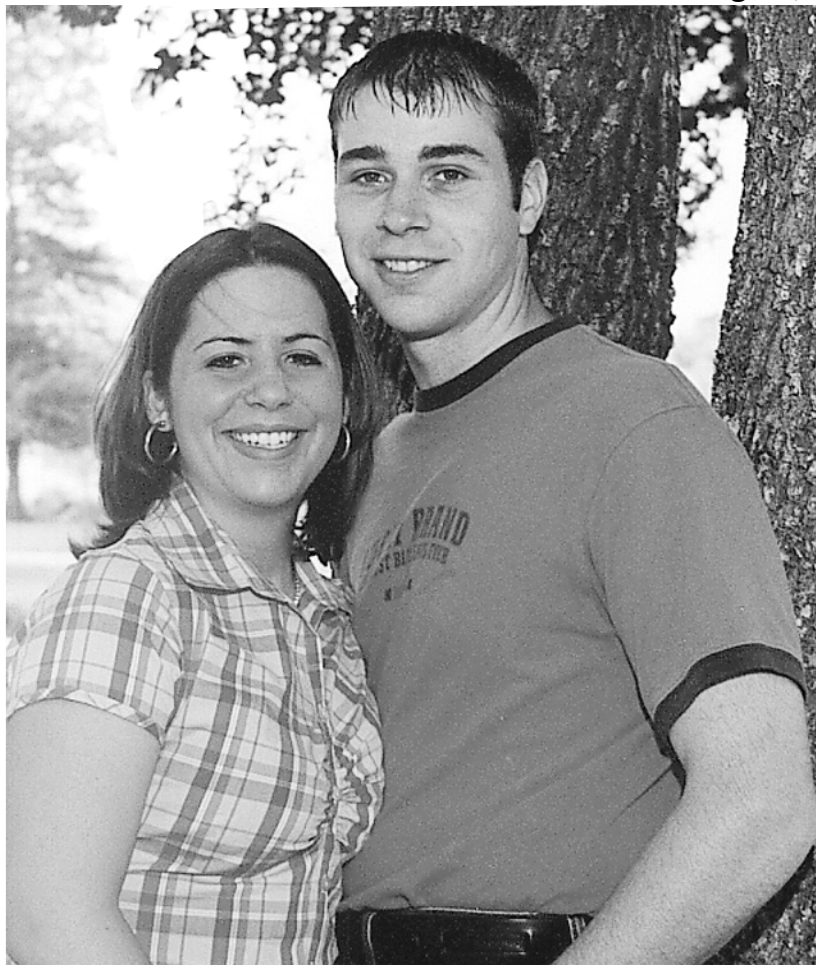

Regarding the School Board Lateral and Pump Project, it was discussed that Lonnie Harper has told the contractor that they didn't put matting down on cattle crossings as agreed, and where they drove their heavy equipment on the approaches to these crossings needs to be repaired, as requested by the landowners. These matters will be discussed further with the contractor before the project will be accepted.

Caladiums are made for shade

Caladiums are an indispensable part of shady summer gardens. They're easy enough to grow that the casual gardener can expect routine success, but their elegant beauty also makes them a staple in the most accomplished gardener's landscape.

Native to tropical South America, caladiums thrive in the heat and humidity of Louisiana's long summers.

Caladiums are grown for their attractive foliage, which is produced from knobby brown tubers gardeners often call bulbs. The 6-inch to 12-inch heart-shaped leaves emerge from the ground on arching stems that are generally 1-2 feet tall.

The foliage may be splashed with combinations of white, pink, rose, red, burgundy, chartreuse or green - often with several colors combined in wonderful patterns. These bright leaves embellish our shady gardens with their bold texture from May until October, when the tubers go dormant. Better yet, they are remarkably free from major insect or disease problems.

Caladiums grow best in shade to partial shade (two hours to four hours of direct sun, preferably morning). In these conditions, they produce lush growth with large, colorful leaves. Some cultivars are tolerant of sunnier conditions and are successful in beds receiving partial sun to full sun (six hours or more of direct sun), but you still must avoid hot, dry, sunny locations.

Caladiums you purchase at nurseries usually have been grown in shady greenhouses, and the foliage will often scorch or burn if you plant them into beds that receive too much direct sun. This results in brown areas and holes literally burned into the leaves. If the cultivar is sun tolerant



had to come up with some inventive ways of proving who we were and our ages.

"I am 89 and Edwin is 92 so when we were born they didn't register births like they do now. We both had baptismal certificates and I had my drivers license from the 1940s. "Edwin had to have one of his children go with him to fill out age verification papers. You know, Edwin and Cecile had 12 children. Mary Lue and I just had the one boy, Eddie. Darbone said.

Because their love for life and their desire to please audiences came through in their music, the Hackberry Ramblers enjoyed success almost immediately.

By the end of the 1930s, the band not only played for audiences in both Louisiana and Texas, but they were appearing on live radio broadcasts and were recording on RCA's Blue Bird label, cutting over 100 titles by the end of the 1940s.

In 1992 they were inducted into the Louisiana Hall of Fame. In 1993 they released their album "Cajun Boogie," and in 1996 they received the Governor's Arts Award. In 1997

the Ramblers received a Grammy nomination for their recording of "Deep Water." In 1999, they played at the Grand Ole Opry and they have an exhibit in the Nashville Hall of Fame.

The Ramblers, whose careers started in an era when they had to amplify their instruments off the engine of a running car, have won several Big Easy awards and have played 15 times at the New Orleans Jazz and Heritage Festival.

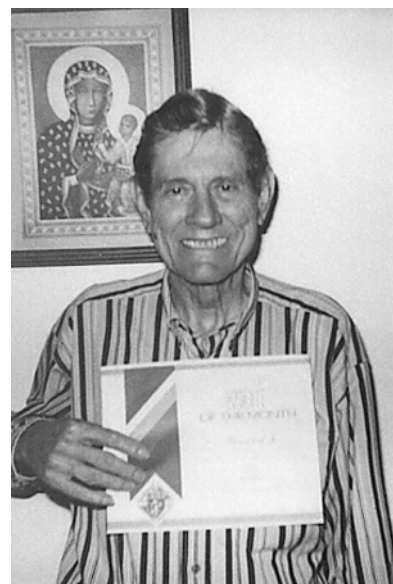

RECORD FISH

A nice big speckled trout was taken off Long Point in Big Lake recently. Fishing out of Hebert's Marina, Dave Brown landed a trout weighing in at 10 pounds three ounces, measuring 32 inches in length. The trout had already spawned.

This trout will tie the trout Rodney Benoit of Cameron caught last year that had set a Big Lake record. We all know an 11.2 trout caught this year was huge and I'm sure there are still some larger trout in the lake to change leaders in the CCA's Star Trout Tournament.

With the fish officially weighed, this will put Quentin LeBoeuf in second place with a 9.8 trout for the month of June.

Speaking of records, the state record is till 12.38 for speckle trout. In the freshwater category, there's been a change on crappie. The old record had crappie which was really mixed between a white or black crappie category at 6.60 pounds. Now the white and black crappie are two separate categories.

In the white crappie division a 3.38 is number one, measuring 16 5/8 inches in length, with a 15 inch girth. This new state record white crappie was caught in the Red River Parish by Buddy Shepherd.

Offshore fishing for red snapper has been good and the smaller platforms closer to shore from Joseph Harbor to west of Cameron have been good for a variety of different fish.

1st quarter oil and gas production up in parish

CAPITAL NEWS

With severance taxes topping \$1.5 million for two of the three months first-quarter natural resource production in Cameron parish outpaced that recorded for 2001.

The March severance tax report from the State Department of Revenue listed \$1.7 million for work within the parish boundaries, ranking the parish seventh overall in the state for the month. The current figure brought the 2002 first-quarter total to more than \$5.6 million. By comparison, production in the parish yielded \$1.6 million in March 2001, making the cumulative total for the first three months of that year \$4.5 million.

The majority of the March receipts were listed for natural gas production, where the parish showed \$998,405. Oil production contributed another \$718,081 to the month's total, and the remaining \$53 was registered for sand production.

The parish collecting the tax on production of natural resources, except lignite and timber, annually receives 20 percent of the total up to \$750,000. Seventy-five percent of all revenue collected on timber products

goes back to the parish.

Statewide, severance tax receipts for March rebounded from the previous month's dip to \$36.1 million and reached a total of \$41.2 million, about \$1.1 million more than reported during the same period a year earlier. Collections for the first quarter of the year exceeded \$121.1 million, compared to the \$118.2 million recorded for the same three-month period of 2001.

In its traditional spot at the top of the overall rankings, Plaquemines showed nearly \$8.7 million in March severance taxes. It was again followed by Terrebonne, which reported \$6.3 million. Vermilion and St. Mary traded places in the listing, coming in at \$3.1 million and \$2 million, respectively. Jefferson Davis climbed into the top ranks with \$1.8 million in March taxes, while Lafourche and Cameron held onto their positions with \$1.7 million each (less than \$6000 apart). Iberia dropped from fifth to eighth with \$1.2 million as Calcasieu listed \$1.4 million and Bienville \$1 million to pull into the top 10. Bossier the only other parish to reach \$1 million in March, dropped out of the top 10, as did Acadia and St. Bernard.
