

## Cell phones will be permitted at school

Cell phones and other electronic devices will be permitted on school grounds and on buses when school starts in August, but they must be turned completely off, unless authorized by a school administrator or designee, as a result of action taken by the Cameron Parish School Board Monday.

Penalties for violating the cell phone policy have been increased in order to make violations less common. A first offense will result in confiscation of the device, parent notification, counseling, and a day suspension. Subsequent violations can lead to expulsion.

School Board members were reluctant to allow cell phones at all, but in view of the fact that so many students were bringing them to school already, in violation of the existing rules, and the desire of many parents to have easier communication with their children after school, the new guidelines

were adopted.
School Board member Marvin Trahan said the "problem is not with the rules but with the enforcement," and suggested that if a few examples are made at the beginning of the year there

will not be a problem.

The Code of Student Conduct is given to each student at the beginning of each school year, and students must sign their acceptance of the rules. To make sure parents aware of all the rules, the board asked that parents be required to sign a note saying they have also read them.

#### SUPPORT STAFF PAY SUPPLEMENT

All support staff who were not included in the legislature's one-time salary adjustment for teachers will receive an equal amount (about \$530) from the School Board.

An unexpected surplus of funds from increased oil and gas royalties will allow the Board to give support personnel this one-time salary adjustment. Support personnel have not received a raise in over 13 years.

One employee said she has only \$58 per month left after paying for taxes and insurance. Another said her take home pay 13 years ago was \$699 and now it is \$483, and she has had to drop the dental insurance for her family.

Most support personnel cannot afford to take part in the savings plan or to buy life insurance. While the cost of living and the price of insur-

## VISIT TO HOME BEFORE

FIRE TOLD
(EDITOR'S NOTE--The following feature story was written Friday just a few hours before fire destroyed the old Creole landmark.)

A visit back into time was experienced by this writer on a routine photographic mission to get some pictures of the historic old Dr. S.O. Carter mansion in Creole which will go on the auction block next month.

Just one glance at the lovely old antebellum home, built at the turn of the century, will tell you that some very gracious living took place

It still stands in all of its splendor despite the ravages of time and a killer hurricane. It was sturdily built by a carpenter of the "old school" Ben Castine of Grand Chenier, who believed in using plenty of nails.

The front features two wide verandas, both downstairs and a "widow's walk" above. The roof is supported by four wooden carved columns. Windows serving the attic or third floor form a dormer in the roof.

An enclosed sitting room, or porch is located on the north side of the house.

The original old wooden cistern is located on the south side of the house, just off the back porch.

The house was originally heated by three chimneys which serve all the rooms as corner fireplaces.

The house was occupied until the death of the owner Dr. S. O. Carter 4 years ago. He died at the age of 98.

Dr. Carter, for 63 of his 98 years, served the people of lower Cameron Parish devotedly to the utmost of his professional ability.

He was one of the real old-

timers of the parish whose life and the history of Cameron Parish were closely interwoven. They thought so much of him they dedicated the Cameron Parish Centennial to him in 1970.

Dr. Carter came to Cameron Parish in 1893 when the parish was 23 years old. He was 23 years old too and just out of Vanderbilt Medical School in Nashville, Tenn. He settled in Creole and set up his practice.

He originally came to Cameron Parish with the intention of staying only one year to help out a doctor classmate who had promised to set up a practice in the parish.

When the classmate failed to show up after a year, Dr. Carter remained in the parish a lifetime, dedicating his life to the medical needs of the

The doctor and his wife, the former Selike Penouilh of Cade, La., had a family of seven children, four sons and three daughters, all of whom were born and reared in Creole.

When Dr. Carter began his practice, lower Cameron parish was so undeveloped that it lacked direct communication with the outside world and local transportation was carried on by horseback, buggy, and buckboard over dirt trails and marshes.



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



Teachers were disappointed that the legislature failed to provide the \$1000 per year raise they were hoping for, but the Cameron School Board tries to make up some of the difference by giving a

"13th check" each year. Interest earned by the Board's "16th section fund" is divided 75-25 between the teachers and support personnel each year. The Board also gave each teacher \$100 to use for supplies last year.

## JB LIBRARY

Although it was not on the agenda, the subject of the Johnson Bayou School library discussed. Peggy Boudreaux, who served 20 years as the first full-time certified school librarian at JBS asked the board to keep the librarian position full-

She said "to change the library position to part time ... defeats the goal of providing all our students with a wellrounded, quality education." She asked the board to consider the matter carefully before "putting us back to what we had before ... a room with books that no one could

use."
Supt. Doug Chance explained that while the library is certainly important, the needs of math, science, and vocational education can best be met with a MWF schedule for the library. He said he is still trying to get a full counseling program and would love to have a full-time assistant principal, counselor and librarian, but cannot pro-

vide these at this time. Pat Howerton moved to revisit the library issue after the 2005-05 school year and see how it is working, with an eye to changes next year if needed. Clifton Morris seconded the motion. Dot Theriot said a full-time librarian is needed now because the school is in decline and "kids need to read."

Howerton's motion passed with Theriot voting against it, so the librarian will be parttime for this school year.

## OTHER BUSINESS

In other business, the Board voted to purchase four new school buses to replace the oldest in the fleet. The funds will come from the surplus found last month. The Board will be able to "piggyback" on an open bid held by the Beauregard Parish School Board to purchase four Blue

Bird 65-passenger buses with all standard equipment for \$53,505 each. The buses taken out of regular use will be kept for activity and backup use.

The school lunch program will receive a total of around \$50,000 from the general fund to replace a 2004-05 deficit of \$24,631 and cover the increased cost of retired employee insurance. The recent increase in the price of school breakfasts and lunches should be enough to cover expenses for the coming year, according to Cynthia Carpenter, director of cafeteria services.

The board voted to call an election on Oct. 15 for a renewal of a 10 mill parishwide property tax for maintenance, improvement, and operations. This is one of two parishwide property taxes used to operate the school system.

The low bid of \$166,560, or \$260.25 per acre, on Section 16-15-15 was awarded to Fleetwood Resources, Inc. for an oil and gas lease. Ervis Portie placed the only bid \$125.75, for a surplus/unusable van.



Our deer season will vary because of different gun seasons like muzzleloaders and regular firearms and also bow season, and that'll include where dogs are used. Limit of six deer per person, per season with dates starting from Oct. 1 through Jan. 22. Doe season will also vary in number and days for either-sex hunting.

coming year. One will note that the outlined funding does not include dollars for the purchase of land or for the "bricks and mortar" to house the proposed center. Clearly more

It was reported that we have had some pressure from the Police Jury and Soil & Conservation Service as to why we haven't introduced salt water into the marsh. It was noted that salvinia is better controlled if left dry, and that is the most effective way to address it. It was reported that salt water went into W-1 West Canal at 15 parts per million last Saturday, but no attempts have been made to push it into the marsh. We do have salvinia in the north marshes, but the Police Jury is addressing that.

Edward Peterson presented a pumping report for 2004 and the first 4 1/2 months of 2005 so far.

Mr. Charles Starkovich. District Conservationist with NRCS, Lake Charles, was recognized and spoke to the Board. Mr. Starkovich made a report on the Cameron-Creole Maintenance Project. He presented preliminary plans prepared by Engineer Lonnie Harper to try to refurbish water control structures in the Cameron-Creole Watershed, and to bring the structures to a point where one person can operate the gates when necessary. It was reported that M & M Electric (Tal McCain) has been awarded the contract to do this work. He's got 90 days to complete the work, and Mr. McCain will give weekly progress reports. He will get NRCS and Cameron Parish Gravity Drainage District No.3 Board Members informed on the progress reports at least monthly, so we will know what is being done. After Mr. McCain has completed this work, Glenn Harris with the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, will go through and inspect how the structures operate. Mr. Starkovich also stated that the Operations & Maintenance Inspection will be completed for 2004 and 2005, and we can work up a disclaimer statement when the report is presented, to the effect that approval does not pertain to the actual Management Plan.

It was agreed that Mrs. Margie LeBoeuf will be invited to attend the June 21, 2005, meeting so that we can present to her a plaque honoring her late husband, Mr. James LeBoeuf, for his years of faithful service to the Cameron Parish Gravity Drainage District No. 3.

Management Report

She also reported that the Partial-Day program is being reevaluated due to a payment error by Medicare. The program was being paid at a incorrect rate since last October and this lower rate made the program appear non-profitable. Medicare has agreed to increase the payment rate and reimburse the Hospital for any back monies owed the program. Ms. Trahan stated that once the new rate is in effect and the back payment has been made the programs profitability will be substantially improved.

## Two public meetings to be held on dredging

The U. S. Army Corps of Engineers will conduct two public scoping meetings for the initiation of a dredged material management plan (DMMP) study to investigate dredged material placement for the next 20 years of maintenance dredging of the Calcasieu River and Pass, Federal navigation channel.

The meetings have been scheduled as follows:

Monday, July 18, 7 p.m., Calcasieu Parish Police Jury Building, Lake Charles.

Tuesday, July 19, 7 p.m. Cameron Parish Courthouse,

The Corps of Engineers, invites all interested parties to attend one of two public scoping meetings which will be used to help establish the range of actions and alternatives of the DMMP and the significant resources that may be impacted. The Calcasieu River and

Pass project does not have adequate dredged material disposal areas for the longterm maintenance of the project. Existing disposal sites are at or near capacity, some disposal sites have been substantially eroded into adjacent water bodies, other disposal areas have been lost to commercial developments, or landowners have rescinded permissions for their property to be used for placement of dredged material.

As a result, remaining dis-

posal areas cannot accommodate the volume of dredged material needed to maintain the Calcasieu River and Pass navigation channel to projectauthorized dimensions, and CEMVN has been forced to reduce channel dimensions in some reaches.

The purpose of the DMMP is to develop a long-term strategy for providing viable placement alternatives to meet the dredging needs of the Calcasieu River and Pass project for a minimum of 20 years. Beneficial uses may include, ecosystem and habitat restoration, innovative uses, shoreline stablization, and upland uses.

## **FERC approves LNG plant**

Federal Energy Regulatory Commission on Thursday approved a proposed liquefied natural gas terminal that will be partially

located in Calcasieu Parish. The Exxon Mobil Golden Pass LNG terminal and its connecting facilities will be built in the Jefferson, Orange and Newton counties of Texas and in Calcasieu Parish. It will be located on the Port Arthur, Tex., ship channel and will be built in two phas-

The first-phase will provide import capacity of up to 1 billion cubic feet per day, according to the FERC. The second phase would receive up to 2 billion cubic feet per day of imported gas.

The project is to include two new protected berths and five double-walled, full-containment LNG storage tanks.

More than 122 miles of pipeline will connect the terminal with up to 10 existing interstate and intrastate pipeline systems.

The Golden Pass LNG terminal will be located in Sabine Pass, Tex. The pipeline will go through northwest Calcasieu Parish near Starks.

This is not the first LNG terminal approved by the FERC  $\mathbf{for}$ Southwest Louisiana. In 2003, the commission gave the green light for con-

struction of a \$700 million terminal near Hackberry owned by Sempra Energy. It will be called Cameron LNG. It was the first time the commission had approved construction and operation of an LNG terminal in the United States since approv-

ing the Trunkline LNG plant in Lake Charles in 1977. Cameron LNG will include a terminal, three storage tanks, and a 35.4-mile pipeline that will go through three parishes. The terminal will begin operations in early

2007.The FERC last year approved the Sabine Pass LNG receiving terminal being built by Cheniere Energy of Houston in Cameron Parish.

The terminal is said to be the largest LNG facility ever approved by the commission. It will receive, store and vaporize an average of 2.6 million cubic feet of LNG per day. Construction began earlier this year.

The Golden Pass terminal will be located southeast of the Cheniere Energy project. Other LNG facilities pro-
