Parish leaders met with regional and state economic development directors Tuesday evening to map out a plan for Cameron Parish's economic future.

The planning meeting was organized by George Swift, director of the recently formed Partnership, Southwest which was formed to promote economic development for the five parish SW Louisiana

Participating in the planning session were James Ducote of the State Office of Development, Economic newly appointed Cameron Economic Development Director Julie Benoit, Parish Administrator Tina Horn, police jurors, parish businessmen and women, and other community

Professional facilitator Tom Hatfield led the group through a series of exercises designed to identify Cameron Parish's strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats.

Arrest made for fishing violations

While working under a Joint Enforcement Agreement with the National Marine Fisheries Service, agents from the Special Investigations Unit of the Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries Enforcement Division initiated charges on Qui Van Tran, 26, of Cameron, for allegedly taking over the limit of cobia and violating federal law by taking red snapper without a required federal permit and taking red snapper in closed

On July 2, agents boarded the fishing vessel Richard II at Cameron Fish House in Cameron. Upon inspection of the vessel, agents discovered a hidden compartment used to allegedly smuggle red snapper. The compartment was found to contain 11 cobia weighing 228 pounds and 1,343 pounds of red snapper.

It was determined through interviews with the captain and crew that a four-member crew was on board during the fishing trip. Louisiana law allows the sale of two cobia per licensed commercial fisherman aboard a commercial

Upon further investigation it was discovered the vessel had no valid class 1 red snapper permit allowing the captain to catch and sell red snapper. It was also determined that the captain had started fishing prior to the opening of the July red snapper season.

The penalty for over the limit of cobia is a fine of up to \$350, jail for not more than 60 days, or both plus court costs. Penalties for taking red snapper without a federal permit, a violation of the Magnusson Stevens Act, are fines of up to \$120,000 per day per count.



A crowd of over 750 people, including more than 379 registered Jefferson Davis Electric Co-op (JDEC) members attending their annual membership meeting July12 in the Jennings High School auditorium, heard Louisiana Public Service Commissioner Dale Sittig praise the Co-op board's effective leadership and congratulate them for "having the lowest electric rates and most reliable service in southwest Louisiana."

The membership also reelected three directors, heard encouraging reports about system improvements and were told most of them were qualified to receive a credit on their August or September

District 4 Public Service Commissioner Dale Sittig

who has represented consumers in 18 southwest Louisiana parishes for over 20 years commended the consumer-elected Jefferson Davis board of directors for its work in solving the Cajun Electric bankruptcy in a manner that insured consumers received millions of dollars in refunds or bill credits in 2000, 2002 and 2004. Qualified JDEC members will receive their final credit in that process on electric bills during August or September, 2004. Sittig stressed the greatest benefit consumers got out of the Cajun settlement were long-term, lowcost, stable wholesale power costs that have resulted in some of the lowest electric bills in the region and which are expected to continue

through this decade.

Sittig praised the Co-op for continuing system improvements and recognized the Coop employees for their rapid, professional response to outages in all kinds of weather. Sittig reported getting fewer calls about service problems from Jefferson Davis Electric members then any other utility consumers in his district.

He recalled that non-profit electric Co-ops were created 66 years ago to serve areas ignored by power companies and they continue to promote local economic growth, noting that while electricity is commonly taken for granted, it's vital to our way of life. He added that while nearly all other commodities and ser



It Seems Just Like Yesterday

GOV. SAM JONES ON THE DEEP WATER CHANNEL

Gov. Sam H. Jones predicted a "new era for Lake Charles and Southwest Louisiana" and not only a new waterway at the official opening Saturday of the new outlet to the Gulf of Mexico by direct deep water route from Lake

In an interview with the governor on the Ilderim, the motorboat leading the flotilla on the maiden trip, he said:

"The opening of the channel opens not only a new waterway, but a new era for Lake Charles and Southwest Louisiana.

"The progress is clearly shown when we consider that during the past year there have been located in Lake Charles a new refinery, a new air base, soon to be located a new magnesium plant, and soon to be constructed a new highway bridge to take the place of the present bridge."

640,000 ACRES TO BE SPRAYED IN 1971

Some 640,000 acres of Cameron will be sprayed this week to kill the mosquitoes to try to stop the spread of horse sleeping sickness that has moved into south Texas from Mexico. The disease is spread by mosquitoes.

T. E. Kinsey, U.S. Dept. of Agriculture plant protection supervisor for Louisiana, who is in charge of the operation, said that four huge DC-3 airplanes will spray each acre with 3 ounces of technical Malathion, which is expected to kill mosquitoes and yet not harm wildlife and fish.

Mr. Kinsey said 90,000 acres, mostly along the Sabine River, also will be sprayed in the same operation, which is expected to take four or five days. A second spraying will

be done seven days later.
The area to be sprayed in Cameron Parish is located between Highway 27 (the Creole road) and the Texas border and generally north to the Calcasieu line.

Officials attend training seminar on Elderly Abuse

Cameron Parish Law Enforcement officials attended a three day training seminar in New Orleans on July 12-14. The training was designed for prosecutors, law enforcement officials, and victim advocates. Topics discussed during the seminar included "Dynamics of Abuse Against the Elderly and Disabled Adults", "Louisiana Laws Pertaining to Crimes Against the Elderly," and "Law Enforcement Case Building."

Guest speakers included various law enforcement officials from around the country, a Deputy District Attorney from San Diego, Calif., and representatives from various Louisiana elderly social services. The attendees received training on how to investigate elderly physical and financial abuse, how to prosecute elderly crimes, and what agencies should be contacted when elder abuse occurs.



Shrimper laws told on internet

Since they were first developed, Turtle Excluder Devices (TEDs) and Bycatch Reduction Devices (BRDs), and the laws governing their use have changed several times. Although commercial shrimpers use both as required in their trawl nets, many have had difficulty finding all of the information necessary to comply with the use. Louisiana Sea Grant has added a new section to its fisheries web site to address this need. At www.seagrant fish.lsu.edu, an entire section, reviewed by the National Marine Fisheries Service (NOAA Fisheries) and approved for publication, has been added.

The new section includes diagrams with dimensions for all approved TEDs and BRDs used in Gulf of Mexico or South Atlantic waters, background and identification information on sea turtles, and links to many official sites with additional TEDs and BRDs information.

Basic questions about the gear are answered in an easy to understand Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) format, and archives of official documents provide background on the evolution of the TEDs and BRDs laws as well as issues surrounding their

Because NOAA Fisheries continues to study the effectiveness associated with the use of TEDs and BRDs, changes in the laws or approved designed are probable in the future. Through this web site, Louisiana Sea Grant will make every effort to provide the most current information.

Rep. Frith explains new bill that promotes mariculture

King Neptune would be curious, and, if mariculture makes it imprint on Louisiana's Gulf Coastal waters, so will King Midas.

Mariculture, broadly defined as the cultivation of the sea, has only just begun to establish itself in Louisiana's vocabulary. But the success for mariculture in other countries has local researchers and others convinced that discarded oil platforms in the Gulf have enormous potential to become cornerstones of new and lucrative Louisiana industries.

Some of these possible ventures include commercial fish and shellfish cultivation, electricity production using thermal energy conversion, wind and other renewable energy systems, and mineral extraction. Discarded platforms can be developed to create new sources for pharmaceutical, cosmetics, nutrition and medical agents.

Blue water platforms create complex coral reef ecosystems that would otherwise not exist, and which produce, rather than just attract, fish. These platforms can also be used as artificial reefs, advanced sustainable fishery systems, coral and live rock mariculture units, fish nursery grounds and other related enterprises.

State Rep. Mickey Frith, D-Abbeville, said that HCR 176, which establishes the Mariculture Task Force, will enable the state to explore the feasibility of developing these new, unique offshore indus-

tries in the Gulf of Mexico using existing offshore platform structures.

"The possibilities are staggering," Rep. Frith said. "With a little ingenuity, we will be looking at a whole new, untapped source of industrial development with thousands of jobs right at the end of our nose. The task force needs citizens' ideas and input to develop these new offshore industries."

Department of Natural Resources marine scientist Steve Kolian, who is working with the task force said, "Developing the retired platforms could potentially create hundreds of thousands of new jobs and generate billions of dollars in economic impacts for Louisiana. Japan, Norway, Russia and Ireland have employed offshore platform industries for decades. Many of their platforms were built specifically for mariculture industry," Kolian said. "And mariculture offshore industries will employ far more people than oil and gas," Kolian added.

House Concurrent Resolution 176 established the Platforms for Mariculture Task Force to explore the economic feasibility, viability, sustainability, and benefits of establishing an offshore mariculture industry in the Gulf of

Co-op Board President Eugene C. Todd of Welsh welcomed the members and their families to the meeting, announcing over 6,800 official notices were sent to the membership for the 2004 annual meeting.

Todd presented the President's Report, noting Jeff Davis Electric, established 66 years ago, continued to grow and offers "the best service at the lowest possible cost. Your employees deserve your respect for the excellent job they do in maintaining a safe and reliable distribution system. We stress good technology at Jeff Davis Electric, but when you call us, you'll speak to a real, local person, not a machine or someone in a distant city.'

During meeting, $_{
m the}$ incumbent directors from districts 1, 4 and 7, running without opposition, were reelected. Re-elected from District 1 was Joseph L. Tupper, Jr. of Elton,; District 4, Richard J. Byler of Lake Arthur, and District 7, Charles S. Hackett, Bell City.

Also serving on the Jefferson Davis Electric board of directors are E. Scott Henry, Robert P. Sarver, Claude Breaux, Eugene C. Todd, E. Garner Nunez and Webster James Todd, Jr.

In his report to the members, Co-op Manager Mike Heinen noted that Jeff Davis Electric continues to make system improvements to reduce "blinks" and outages, helping the Co-op remain among the most reliable utility systems operating in Louisiana.

Heinen praised the hard work, professionalism and dedicated performance of the Co-op's employees working out of offices in Jennings and Cameron.

With lightning, hurricanes and so many fast-growing trees to deal with in Louisiana, it's impossible to achieve perfect reliability,' Heinen explained. "But we've invested millions of dollars in new poles, lines and facilities which will benefit out consumers." He also noted the Co-op has made modifications to its lines in the Cameron area to deal with problems caused by salt accumulation on hardware.

Heinen stressed JDEC hasn't had a rate increase since 1989 and reminded the membership that the Co-op's 44 full-time employees do an $outstanding\ job. \ \bar{} The\ manager$ then asked members to cooperate whenever Co-op crews ask to trim trees on their future outages.

Board Secretary-treasurer Joseph L. Tupper, Jr. presented the financial report which was included in printed material provided to members as they registered for the meeting, noting the Co-op's total assets came to \$30,847,928 revenues totaling \$15,532,349 in 2003. Capital credits and patronage dividends totaled \$646,499. In a break down of expenses, wholesale power came in on top at \$14,998,763 with operating costs of \$3,948,909. Taxes were \$470,441; depreciation came to \$919,919, and interest expenses

\$631,617. The meeting closed with the awarding of 23 door prizes and two bikes to children who attended the meeting with their parents.

Three weeks on the job - and I'm excited to be here! Our transition has gone smoothly and I plan to provide you with the Sheriff's Department and service that you deserve. As I said while campaigning, I chose to be a resident of Cameron Parish and the more I go around the Parish the more I know that I made the right decision. I love Cameron Parish and her people.

As you have read in the paper, I have named Ron Johnson as my Chief Deputy. Ron's law enforcement and public relations experience will be a great asset to the Sheriff's Department. Nearly every deputy employed by Sheriff Savoie was given the opportunity to serve with me. Those who retired have been replaced by moving qualified deputies into new positions. I will be available to you when you have needs and am here to talk over any problems you may be having. Feel free to call on me.

As your new Sheriff I have plans to continue providing the 24 hour patrol, service and protection you have been accustomed to. I also have plans to improve service with new technology and fight to rid our parish of drug problems. As administrator of the finances of the Sheriff's Department, I know that first we must make sure that the revenues are secure. This brings me to our first order of business. . .

It's been five years and it's time to renew the Special Law Enforcement taxes to run the Sheriff's Department. The taxes on the ballot on September 18th will be a renewal of the 8.00M and 2.00M Special L.E. Taxes. I know it's a bad time to talk about taxes because of the reassessment of the value of properties over the parish, but we need to renew these taxes to continue to maintain law enforcement in Cameron Parish.

In order to get this tax issue on the September 18th ballot, we had to initiate the process with a Board meeting during Sheriff Savoie's last week in office. This allows me to present this renewal to you and still have the opportunity to run it again.

These taxes are very important to the Parish and Sheriff's Department as a whole, as it generates not quite 1/2 of what we operate on to be able to offer 24 hour patrol in our communities for all areas. Renewal of these two taxes is vital to continue and maintain the type of law enforcement you are getting now and provide for growth with new technology.

I know with the new reassessment year many will be hit hard. The Legislature sets the 11.41M tax for us to operate and years ago Sheriff Savoie saw the need to run these additional taxes as needed to improve salaries and service. The need is even greater now. With what's going on in the world today and the types of businesses and crises that can arise in our parish, we must try to maintain as good law enforcement as possible.

Remember that these two taxes - 8.00M and 2.00M - are renewal taxes. I have chosen not to increase them and run them for only 5 years. These taxes are needed to maintain the Sheriff's Department they are not additional funds - but the funds necessary to keep 24 hour patrol, maintain salaries and provide for the ever increasing cost of insurances and skyrocketing costs of running vehicles 24-7-365.

I have confidence that you will support our taxes so that we can provide you with the service and protection needed.




