7 wildlife fires plague Sabine Nat'l Refuge

Seven wildfires were ignited by lighting on Sabine National Wildlife Refuge throughout three days of severe weather. Fire Personnel began managing two fires at the eastern edge of the refuge in the West Cove Unit, east of Highway 27 on Saturday morning, Aug. 28. Resources brought in to manage the fires included a helicopter, a fire boat, two fire engines, and fire personnel from the SW Louisiana and SE Louisiana National Wildlife Refuge Complexes, Felsenthal National Wildlife Refuge, Kisatchie National Forest, and Bienville National Forest in Miss. A helicopter with a 120 gallon bucket attachment was used to put out a small half acre fire near the refuge headquarters. It took approx-

imately 15 bucket drops to put out the fire. Bucket drops were attempted on a larger fire south of West Cove Recreation Area that posed a threat to oil and gas facilities, including a manned oil rig and Highway 27. The bucket drops knocked down flames, however, the dry grass was so thick it just continued to fuel the fire. Evacuation measures were set in place for the oil rig and the highway was monitored for smoke. "Erratic winds associated with thunderstorm cell development caused the fire to spread rapidly in all directions. Head fire flame lengths were 12-16 feet high and spreading at approximately 3000 feet per hour. Flanking fire flame lengths were 8-10 feet high and spreading at a slower rate per hour," said

Sammy Gray, Incident Commander. The fire continued to burn through the night despite the relative humidity reaching 100% for two hours in the early morning hours. By Sunday morning the fire burned 298 acres on the refuge, 66 acres on private land, and still posed a threat to smoking out Highway 27. A 160 acre "burnout" operation was conducted to remove fuels between the head fire and Highway 27. A "burnout" fire is a controlled burn conducted by refuge fire management staff to safely and effectively remove fuels ahead of the wildfire so that it can no longer burn. "When the two fires came together they created a fantastic column of smoke that the winds transported to the southeast away from Highway 27," said Gray. No evacuations were necessary and the highway remained open to traffic.

Screening for strokes is to be offered at Cameron

Residents living in and around the Cameron and Sulphur communities can be screened to reduce their risk of having a stroke. Life Line Screening will be at the Cameron Multipurpose Building in Cameron on Sept. 14 and the Immaculate Conception Church in Sulphur on Sept. 15. Appointments will begin at 11 a.m. in Cameron and 9 a.m. in Sulphur. A stroke, also known as a "brain attack", is ranked as the third leading killer in the world, and the second among

women. Through preventive screenings, the risk of having a stroke can be greatly reduced. Screenings are fast, painless and low cost. They involve the use of ultrasound technology, and scan for potential health problems related to: blocked arteries which can lead to a stroke, aortic aneurysms which can lead to a ruptured aorta, and hardening of the arteries in the legs, which are a strong predictor of heart disease. Also offered for men and women, is a bone density screening to assess their risk for osteoporosis.

Cameron has probably the largest beach cleanup efforts in the state as Cameron parish has more accessible beaches than any other parish. Hospital Service District. Coincidentally, I have also experienced illness in my family which has necessitated use of the services of South Cameron Hospital and other health care services available in this parish, as well as elsewhere. As we all know, the hospital has faced great difficulties over the last ten years. I personally feel very thankful every day the doors are open. The Hospital Board has been exploring various avenues to obtain assistance for the hospital. We are also interested in furthering the availability and the quality of health care throughout the parish. I think that this is an issue which is of utmost importance to every citizen of this parish. We are geographically unique and face special problems. I would like to form a non-profit corporation with the stated purpose of providing improved health care to the people of Cameron, especially the indigent, the elderly, and

the uninsured. In order for this organization to be a success, I need your help. None of us has the time to devote all our energies to this project. If more people are involved, more resources can be available to achieve our common goal. Ms. Marsha Broussard is the director of the Louisiana Rural Access Program. LRAP is funded by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, and one of their target parishes is Cameron Parish. Ms. Broussard is willing to come to Creole to meet with interested persons and discuss finding a plan to address the various health care challenges that our parish is facing. Fontenot opens law office here

Cameron native Jonathan Fontenot has opened an office in Cameron for the practice of environmental law. It is in former home of Nona Welch, located behind the Cameron courthouse. Fontenot is the son of District Judge and Mrs. Ward (Martha) Fontenot and is a graduate of Grand Lake High School. He studied at McNeese and received his law degree from Mississippi College in 1996. He worked as a clerk in the district judges' offices in Lake Charles for a year and then was an assistant in the Calcasieu District Attorney's office for five years.

He recently resigned that position and accepted an offer from a New Orleans law firm to specialize in oilfield contamination cases. It was in the process of relocating to New Orleans that he realized that while Cameron Parish is a major oil and gas producing parish there had been relatively few cases of contamination being cleaned up here. He said that other coastal parishes for years have been testing and cleaning contaminated sites.

"Would it not be a share," he asked, "if the Legislature closed the door on these types of cases and Cameron folks never got on board." He says he knows that Cameron people know how fragile wetlands can be, "still they are generally unaware of their rights to have sites tested and cleaned up." So Fontenot convinced the law firm of Cauley, Bowman, Carney and Williams of Little Rock, Ark., with experience in environments contamination, to open an office in Cameron. Fontenot said he also wants to make Cameron residents aware of wetlands damages. He says "any levee, canal, pond or road which was used for exploration or production must be returned to its original condition, and that is my mission."

Millage rollback

The Cameron Parish Gravity Drainage District No. 3 at its August meeting, unanimously passed a tax roll-back from 6.5 mills to 5.00 mills for the tax Year 2004.

Police Jury gets good and bad news Monday

The Cameron Parish Police Jurors received both good and bad news at their monthly agenda meeting Monday evening in Cameron. Darrell Williams, assistant parish treasurer, told jurors that just past the midway point of the year, almost all of the jury's accounts, including the special districts, are under budget and are in good shape.

However, he said there has been a considerable drop in the road royalty funds that the parish receives from the state. These are the parish's share in state mineral production revenues in the parish.

He said this drop was due to a decrease in the number of oil and gas wells and production.

"It makes me nervous," he said, "I wish the revenues would go back up."

TAX ROLLBACK
Jurors were given a list of parish millages and the amount of taxes brought in by each in the past. Under reassessment these millages will bring in additional revenues unless they are adjusted downward.

Jurors agreed that these adjustments be made and they will vote on this at the regular meeting Tuesday.

It was noted that the Cameron Parish Library board had lowered its millage from 6.00 to 5.75 mills.

GRAND LAKE PROPERTY
Jurors agreed to permit the Grand Lake-area jurors to pursue an agreement to buy an acre of land adjacent to parish property on which the Grand Lake fire station, Council on Aging office, branch library, Head Start and branch post office are located.

Jurors agreed that the property was needed to provide additional parking for all of these agencies.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT
Julie Benoit, parish economic developer, reported to the jury concerning a number of contacts she made and meetings she has attended. These including a possible new doctor's clinic here, dredging of the Intracoastal Canal, widening of the Sabine waterway, ship channel restoration, etc. She said the jurors should

LIBRARY PROJECT

WEEDS PROBLEM
A Cameron citizen complained to the jury about tall weeds around abandoned homes near the Council on Aging office. He was told that the jury would write the property owner and request that the weeds be cut but that the jury cannot legally force the cutting at this time.

Juror Darryl Farque said the jury is working on a parish zoning ordinance which would enable the jury to take corrective action.

SEPT. MEETING
The jury's September meeting will be held next Tuesday instead of Monday due to the Labor Day holiday. It will be at 5 p.m.

The jurors will set the tax millages for 2004; hear a report on the proposed bike trail; and hear a report on the West Calcasieu-Cameron hospital plans to sell some property in Moss Bluff.

Water board reduces millage

At the regular scheduled meeting of the Cameron Parish Water & Wastewater District No. 1, the board voted to reduce the current millage from 7.08 to 5.50 mills for the year of 2005.

Football is sought at Grand Lake

Ray Burleigh, Chief of the Cameron Volunteer Fire Department, reported that around \$5,000 in property and equipment were lost in fires in and around Cameron last week.

Burleigh said a major portion of the loss was due to grass fires started by farmers and ranchers burning off their pastures.

The fires which took place this week were: The Clinton Oil Co. on Grand Chenier where 200 feet of board-run for oil field roads were burned.

A grass fire at the Cameron Elementary School burned approximately one-third of the hurricane fence on the playing field.

A grass fire ignited a chemical fire in front of Millwhite Co. endangering approximately 15 cars. Burning drums filled with chemicals blew about 75 feet in the air when they were ignited. Chief Burleigh said that the local fire department was able to keep it under control and the cars were saved.

WOMEN SHOW INTEREST IN SERVING ON JURIES

Berton Daigle, Cameron Parish Clerk of Court, said that a great deal of interest is being shown among women in several communities of the parish in serving on juries. He has received many inquiries and requests have been made for placing their

LETTER

Dear Editor,

My brother Lawrence Otis Block, of Buna, Tex. who died Aug. 29 had the same connections in southwest Louisiana that I have. Our mother was born and raised in Grand Chenier, our father was born on Black Bayou near Hackberry. Our paternal grandmother Ursula Smith was born and reared at Johnson Bayou, and our great-grandfather Duncan Smith (no kin to the other Smiths) settled in Cameron (Leesburg) in 1861.

The street near the Cameron courthouse, Phineas E. Smith, was named for our great uncle. And we probably have more distant relatives, Sweeneys, Smiths, McCalls, Bonsalls, Crains, in southwest Louisiana than we have in Texas.

For many years Otis owned the L. O. Block Construction Co., about 10 dirt pits, a fleet of dump trucks and he built many of the overpasses and hurricane levees in south Jefferson County. He was a graduate of Nederland High school and served in the U. S. Navy in World War II.

Our parents were Will Block, Sr. and Sarah Jane Sweeney of Port Neches.

Burial was at Oak Bluff Memorial Park in Port Neches, which during 1920-1930's, was our father's farm, where we scratched potatoes, pulled corn, and picked butterbeans together. Otis was 80 years old. Otis carried his nickname of "Broomtail," which I (W. T. Block) gave him all of his life.

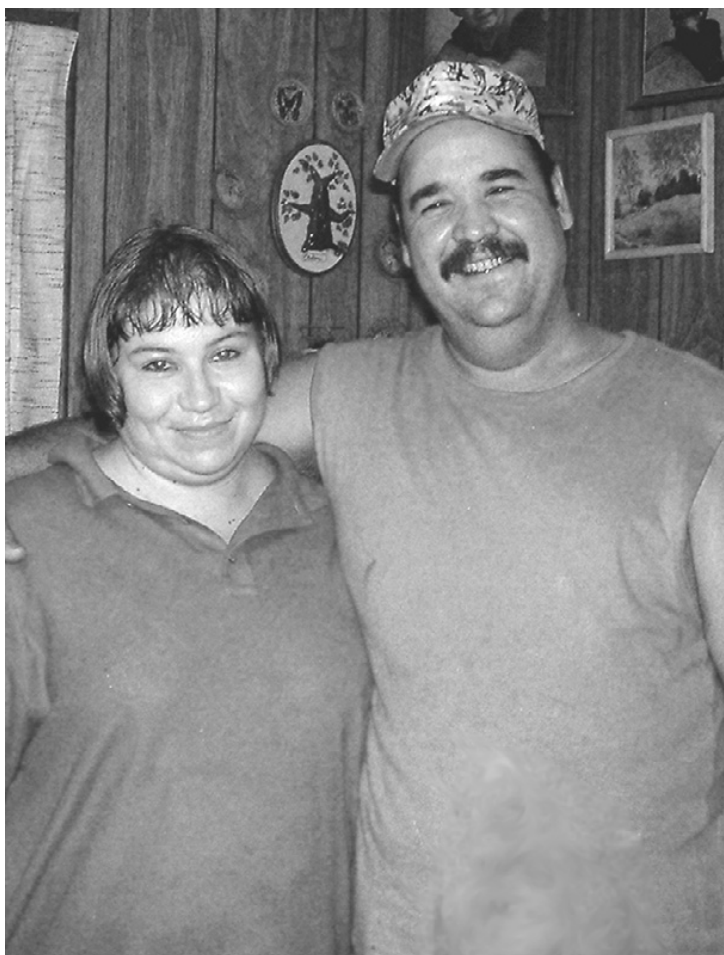

WELCOME SEPTEMBER!
 The great month of
 September has arrived, I say
 great because this is the only
 month during the year where
 so much activity for the out-
 doorsman takes place, when
 it comes to hunting, fishing
 and many other activities. It's
 also the month for prime time
 hurricane season, and it
 seems this week we have seen
 a storm on the east coast and
 we have a category 4 hurri-
 cane moving west, northwest,
 that's unpredictable.

We should see cool fronts
 coming in and this will move
 flounders, redfish, sheephead
 and black drums to deeper
 water. It's time to get pre-
 pared for teal season. Bow
 hunters should practice for
 their opening day. We'll see
 tree ducks in our marshes
 and rice fields. I did see some
 wood ducks in some of the
 trees along the levees in the
 Big Burn, but not many teals.

The deer hunters are
 starting to plant winter
 wheat and clover food plots
 for the opening of deer sea-
 son. This is a peak month for
 redfish spawning.

Autumn begins Sept. 22
 while National Hunting and
 Fishing Day is Sept. 25.
 Labor Day is this Monday the
 6th and to all the grandchild-
 ren, remember
 Grandparents Day on Sept.
 12.

Alligator harvest begins
 Sept. 1 and nutria season is
 here. Remember when shoot-
 ing nutria with a shotgun, use
 only non-toxic shells.

DOVE SEASON
 This weekend, Sept. 4-12,
 our dove season opens for the
 first split. This weekend, 4th
 & 5th, shooting hours are at
 12 noon both days. This hap-
 pens opening weekends of
 each split. Although we have
 a 70 day season, the first two
 splits are best shooting.
 Regular days after opening is
 30 minutes before sunrise to
 sunset. The limit is 12 per
 day for mourning doves. We
 also are beginning to have
 quite a few of the turtle doves
 in our areas. This dove looks
 like a smaller pigeon, has a
 feathered ring collar around
 their necks. Different names
 are ring-neck doves, turtle
 doves, collared ringed turtle
 doves and Eurasian doves.
 These you have no limit, but
 when in the field, do not dress
 these birds, as Game Agents
 can't see if you have morn-
 ing doves or turtle doves. If
 you field dress these birds,
 they count in your daily 12
 limit.

Hunters can call Cameron
 Prairie National Wildlife
 Refuge for hunts as they have
 yearly dove hunts the first
 split. Call 598-2216.
NEWS BRIEFS
 Remember effective Sept.
 1, Rockefeller Refuge will be

Alligator harvest set on three wildlife refuges

Complex Wildlife Biologist,
 Steve Reagan, announced
 that the annual alligator har-
 vests will be taking place on
 Cameron Prairie, Lacassine
 and Sabine National Wildlife
 Refuges from Sept. 7 through
 Sept. 16. Each of the permit-
 ted hunters will use the stan-
 dard hook and line sets to fill
 their tag allotment.

Managers of each National
 Wildlife Refuge caution
 boaters and anglers to stay
 away from alligator sets
 which contain baited hooks
 and possibly hooked alliga-
 tors. It is a violation of State
 and refuge regulations to tam-
 per with alligator sets, includ-
 ing poles, lines or bait.

As hunters check their
 lines and travel to launch
 areas, their boats can become
 heavy and hard to maneuver.

Boaters are asked to take
 care when passing. As men-
 tioned within Boater Safety
 Courses, you are responsible
 for damage caused by your
 wake.
 All National Wildlife
 Refuge visitors are asked to
 stay clear of boat launch
 areas and hunters. All
 boaters are reminded to wear
 life jackets. Drowning is the
 leading cause of death for
 boaters across the United
 States.

Red snapper season is closed until Oct. 1st

The spring commercial
 fishery for red snapper in
 Louisiana waters closed on
 Aug. 10. The season will
 remain closed until the open-
 ing of the fall commercial red
 snapper season on Oct. 1.

The decision was made by
 Louisiana Department of
 Wildlife and Fisheries
 Secretary Dwight
 Landreneau, following notifi-
 cation by the National Marine
 Fisheries Service that the
 Federal waters of the Gulf of
 Mexico will not re-open for
 the Sept. 1-10 time period,
 since the commercial red
 snapper season is projected
 to have been taken.

Secretary Landreneau was
 authorized by the Louisiana
 Wildlife and Fisheries
 Commission to take these
 actions to provide consistent

regulations between state and
 adjacent Federal waters, and
 noted that the season closure
 is necessary to prevent over-
 fishing of the species.

All commercial harvest,
 possession, purchase, barter,
 trade, sale or attempts to pur-
 chase, barter, trade or sell red
 snapper is prohibited until
 noon, Oct. 1, the date set for
 the opening of the fall season.

The prohibition on
 sale/prohibition of red snap-
 per during the closure does
 not apply to red snapper that
 were harvested, landed
 ashore, and sold prior to the
 effective date of the closure
 and were held in cold storage
 by a dealer or processor pro-
 vided appropriate records in
 accordance with R.S. 56:306.5
 and 56:306.6 are properly
 maintained.

Dove season to begin on Sept. 4 - identify birds well

The Louisiana
 Department of Wildlife and
 Fisheries would like to
 remind hunters to be careful
 with their dove identification
 as they take to the woods for
 the opening of the 2004-05
 hunting season. Sept. 4
 marks the opening of the first
 split of the dove season.

The season is open for
 mourning, Eurasian collard
 and ringed turtle-doves only.
 White-wing doves and any
 other species of doves may
 not be taken in Louisiana.

The daily bag limit for
 mourning doves is 12, with
 a possession limit of 24.

There is no bag limit on
 Eurasian collared-doves or
 ringed turtle-doves, provided
 that a fully feathered wing
 and head remain attached to
 the carcass of the bird.



Two chickens found to have West Nile virus

The Louisiana Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory notified Cameron Parish Mosquito Control on Aug. 25, that two sentinel chickens tested positive for West Nile Virus. The two chickens were located in West Johnson Bayou and in Big Lake at Hebert's Camp.

We have sentinel chickens in every community of the parish and so far no others have tested positive. At this time Cameron Parish has yet to have a human case of West Nile Virus.

West Nile Virus is mainly a disease of birds, but it can affect horses and a small percentage of humans. People should protect themselves and have their horses vaccinated for West Nile Virus and have their booster shots every six months.

Residents can help reduce mosquitoes hiding in barns, garages, etc. by using residual insecticides such as perme-

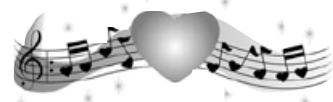
thrin which can be purchased at local feed and seed stores. Permethrin is very safe, long lasting and is labeled to be sprayed directly on pets and livestock.

Residents can also help protect themselves by staying indoors around dusk and dawn when mosquitoes are most active, wearing light colored protective clothing, wearing repellent, and emptying all containers holding water every 3-4 days. These containers include pet water bowls, buckets, bird baths, tires, flower pot saucers, etc.

All areas of the Parish are being sprayed on a rotating basis with areas of high mosquito populations being given priority.

The Health Department is still testing some species of birds which may be reservoir hosts for encephalitis and WNV, so the public should contact them if any dead birds are found. They are mainly testing cardinals, blue jays, sea gulls, grackles, house sparrows, crows and birds of prey, such as hawks and owls.

Waterfowl hunting to be done on Lacassine Refuge

The portion of the Lacassine National Wildlife Refuge, south of the Gulf Intracoastal Waterway and between the Mermentau River and the east bank of the Lacassine Bayou (excluding the Duck Pond) will be open to waterfowl hunting during the State teal season (Sept. 18-26) and the regular State duck season for the West Zone: Nov. 6 and 7 for youth hunters, Nov. 13 through Dec. 5 (1st split), and Dec. 18 through Jan. 23, 2005 (2nd split). Hunters may not enter the hunting area earlier than 4:00 a.m. Shooting hours end at noon each day. Special note: The Duck Pond, located in the Streeter's area, will be closed to hunting during the September teal season in 2004-05.

All Refuge hunters, including youths, are required to possess a Refuge hunting permit. The 2004-2005 Refuge hunting brochure serves as the required permit when it has been signed and dated.

The permit (brochure) must be in the hunter's possession while hunting on the Refuge. Permits (brochure) will be available at Refuge kiosks and at the Refuge headquarters in early September. Hunters are expected to read, understand and abide by all Refuge regulations.

Only portable blinds are allowed on the Refuge. Hunting from a permanent blind, cutting Refuge vegeta-

tion and serving as a hunting guide for profit is prohibited on the Refuge. Hunters are reminded that only non-toxic shot may be used and possessed on the Refuge. All boats, blinds, and decoys must be removed immediately following each days hunt.

The Refuge will institute and administer a Managed Hunt in the Duck Pond in 2004-2005. This area will be available only to hunters selected through a lottery drawing. Hunters (applicants) must be 21 years of age or older to apply. Those selected will be allowed to bring two guests. Applicants will be afforded one opportunity per season to participate in this newly-established hunt. The Managed Hunt will take place on Wednesdays and Saturdays only leaving this area closed to hunting during all other days during the 60 day season.

A special permit will be required. Interested applicants must submit their name, date of birth, address, telephone number and day preference (weekday or weekend) along with this same information for their two guests.

This information must be received by the Refuge office or delivered in person by 4:30 p.m. on Oct. 1 to be considered. Eligible applicants will be selected during the Lottery Hunt drawing held Oct. 14.

Successful applicants will be notified by mail which day they were selected.

Strange mounds found in northern Cameron Parish

(EDITOR'S NOTE-- Grand Chenier native Archie Hollister, an educator, historian and writer, wrote a column for the Pilot years ago. This was one published in May 1964. Mr. Hollister, who was principal at the Klondike School, died some years ago.)

Every once in a while someone brings up the question of the "gas mounds" found so abundantly in the northern portions of Cameron Parish. This part of Cameron is on the southern edge of the Prairie Terrace, and is, geologically speaking, some forty or fifty thousand years older than the marsh region to the South.

A common feature of the Prairie Terrace is the existence of numerous small mounds of earth variously called molehills, knolls, gas mounds, or some other local term. Scientifically, they are known as pimple mounds.

In size they vary from ten to a hundred feet in diameter and from one to five feet in height. They are usually circular in shape, but occasionally one may find several so closely grouped together that at first glance they present the appearance of a continuous ridge; upon closer examination however, the individual mounds are distinguishable.

In places they may be few and widely scattered; elsewhere they may be so large and so numerous as to cover fully one-third of the surface area. They are as abundant in forest areas as on the open prairie, and even underlie many of our shallow lakes as well.

The soil of the mounds is of a more sandy nature than that of the surrounding land, and a condition which may be due to the results of erosion and leaching. These mounds are found widely scattered throughout the world.

Many theories have been advanced to account for their origin. It has been suggested that they are Indian structures; that they were built by some extinct animal after the fashion of ant-hills; that, escaping gas forced the earth's surface upward; that wind action is responsible; or that any of a half-dozen other agencies might have been the cause.

In the meantime the rice farmer more concerned with their presence than their origin, and considering this presence undesirable, is busily and efficiently removing them with land-levelers and bull-dozers.

Because of their relative unimportance, few scientists have given the mounds more than casual thought, and no thorough research into the matter has been undertaken. Under such conditions the layman's guess is about as

good as the geologist's and he is not nearly so reticent in giving you an opinion.

A. B. Hartwell of Lake Arthur, a rice farmer who has an intimate acquaintance with them proposes this theory. He suggests that the pimple mounds arose when a layer of heavy sediment was laid down over a layer of lighter material, and that the earth which composes the mounds was forced to the surface by the heavier, over-lying materials. This theory reflects careful observation and thinking, and appears to have considerable merit, particularly when we consider the formation of the salt domes in this area.

Geologists are largely in agreement that these domes had their origin in the bed of an ancient sea which subsequently disappeared through evaporation leaving a thick layer of salt upon the sea floor. The same process may be observed in the drying up of Great Salt Lake in Utah today. In time this salt bed became covered with deposits washed down by the rivers through long periods of time.

The gradual accumulation of this deposit finally reached thickness of many thousand feet, and its tremendous weight exerted great pressure upon the salt. Under sufficient pressure salt will react in a manner similar to that of plastic modeling clay and push outward; finding a weak place in the crust of the over-lying deposits, the salt pushes upward towards the surface of the ground, and in some cases actually reaching above the surfaces as may be seen at Jefferson Island and Avery Island to the east of us.

INDIAN THEORY

Lacking clear-cut knowledge, each man can work out a theory to suit himself, but until such time as science can give us a definite answer, we might consider the story told by the Indians; at least it has the merit of being humorous and entertaining.

According to Indian legend a race of giants was employed to build the earth, each giant carrying the dirt in his leather apron. Some unusual occurrence frightened them, each dropped his apron where he stood, and the whole tribe ran away. Thus, they say, were the pimple mounds formed.

The early French borrowed this tale from the Indians, changing the details, but keeping the main idea of the story intact. They substituted Dutchmen for giants, and shirt-tails for the aprons. When the Lord decided the earth was finished, he blew a horn as signal for quitting and each Dutchman dropped his shirt-tail and the earth it contained where he stood. At least this is the story old Mr. Simian Duhon of Hackberry told me thirty years ago.

Youth/senior duck hunts set on Lacassine Refuge

Lacassine National Wildlife Refuge will be hosting its third annual Youth/Senior Lottery Duck Hunts. The lottery is open to youths 10 - 15 years old and seniors age 55 and older. Youth hunts are scheduled on Saturdays and Senior hunts on Wednesdays during the second split (West Zone) of the Louisiana Duck Season, Dec. 18 to Jan. 23. Three hunters are allowed in each blind, as specified below.
