



Rev. Tanner, former local pastor, dies

A celebration of the life of Rev. Jack Tanner was held Saturday, Sept. 9, at the First Baptist Church of Lake Charles. Burial was in Lakeview Cemetery in Lake Arthur.

Rev. Tanner died Friday, Sept. 8, 2006, at Saint Patrick's Hospital in Lake Charles.

He spent three years in the Navy serving in the South Pacific.

Rev. Tanner graduated from Clark Memorial College in Newton, Miss. and La. College in Pineville. It was in his senior year at La. College that Pineville First Baptist Church asked him to pastor the Pelican Drive Mission in Pineville. Thus began Brother Jack's 51 years of pastoring and serving the churches in Louisiana.

He was preceded in death by his 46-year-old daughter, Danya Tanner Banks who died in a plane crash a year ago.

He is survived by his wife Joy Durapau Tanner; one son and his wife, David and Donna Tanner of Westlake; one sister, Elaine Riggs of Crowley; two grandsons; and two great-grandchildren.

He ministered, lived in and took part in sports activities and social events in Cameron Parish for more than 20 years.

Officiating at the celebration for the life of Rev. Tanner was Dr. David Savage, Rev. Ernest Walker and Rev. Claude Fontenot. Larry and Harriette Dyson lead the music program.

FEMA gives schools \$7 million for repairs

U.S. Representative Charles W. Boustany, Jr. announced that the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has awarded two grants to the Cameron Parish School Board totaling over \$7 million for costs it incurred following Hurricane Rita.

The first grant amounts to \$1,570,258 and is awarded to the Audrey Memorial School. A second grant of \$6,014,688 has been awarded to the South Cameron Elementary School.

"Nothing hit me more emotionally than to see so many of our schools destroyed by Hurricane Rita," said Boustany. "All the residents of Southwest Louisiana can be inspired by the spirit and perseverance of the students and teachers in Cameron Parish. Under the leadership of Superintendent Chance, the Cameron Parish School

Board has done a great job in order to recover, and I am happy to see them receive this funding."

Audrey Memorial School was inundated by high winds, heavy rains and a 20 to 25 foot storm surge from Hurricane Rita. The school and gym were previously converted to a bus repair and maintenance facility for the parish school system.

This funding will go towards replacing the gym with a comparable facility designed for the current use as a bus repair and maintenance facility in an area outside of the flood plain.

South Cameron Elementary School also sustained high winds and a 15 to 20 foot storm surge from Hurricane Rita. Approximately 90% of the structure was destroyed. This funding is an estimate of costs to replace the building.

Polling places moved

Roosevelt letter is given to S. Board

A historical document of high significance to Cameron Parish was given to the School Board by Sen. Gerald Theunissen after a tour of parish schools on Monday.

The letter, written in 1938 and signed by Franklin Delano Roosevelt, recounts a visit to the parish with Sen. Allen J. Ellender to hunt ducks with James Bonsall, of Grand Chenier. Roosevelt stayed at the Bonsall home, which was totally destroyed by Hurricane Rita last year.

When the Cameron Court House burned a few years later, and Roosevelt had become the President of the United States, the rebuilding was assigned the Works

Projects Administration (WPA).

The story is told that the WPA wanted to rebuild the same type of wooden building that had existed before, but Roosevelt, remembering his duck hunt visit, said Cameron Parish needed a better building, one that could stand up against hurricanes.

In consequence, the current concrete courthouse was built, which did indeed survive two major hurricanes, saving the lives of hundreds during Hurricane Audrey in 1957.

Accepting the prized document on behalf of the board, Supt. Doug Chance promised

Frustration expressed by J. B. residents

Johnson Bayou residents took full advantage of the School Board meeting held at their campus on Monday to vent their frustration with the pace of restoration and the conditions on the campus.

Sonny McGee, speaking as a resident not as Police Juror, asked the board to reconsider closing in the covered pavilion on the school grounds since the gym will not be ready for use until the end of October.

He and others were concerned about the cold weather coming soon, overcrowding during PE class, and adequacy of practice space for all groups.

Tracy Webb demanded to know which individual was in charge of supervising the restoration, since it seemed to be going so slowly.

Destiny Sonnier, spokesperson for the entire girls basketball team and dance line, begged the board to do whatever possible to speed up progress on the gym, since all the teams are now practicing on a cement floor which is shared during PE with grades 6-12. She said the teams are concerned that all their games will be away games, making it harder to do homework during the week and keep up their grades. Also, the lack of home game support will make it harder to keep the team's spirits up through the year.

Everett Shelton Doland, 89, of Lake Charles died Friday, Sept. 8, 2006.

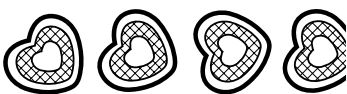
He was born to Sam and Ethel Doland, one of Grand Chenier's early cotton, cattle and farming pioneer families.

Infected mosquito is found at Hackberry

A mosquito sample collected on Sept. 3 off of Alladin Rd. in south Hackberry has tested positive for St. Louis encephalitis. Mosquito Control activities including ground adultciding, aerial adultciding, and larvaciding have been performed in this area to prevent the spread of this disease.

SLE is a disease that occurs naturally in birds; however, birds do not get sick from it. Mosquitoes become infected while feeding on an infected bird. Infected mosquitoes can then transmit the virus into the human population.

Symptoms will usually show up 5-15 days after a person is bitten by an infected mosquito. Symptoms of a mild infection are fever and headache. More severe infections include headache, high fever, neck stiffness, stupor, disorientation, coma, tremors, convulsions, and paralysis.

A very small percentage of people that are exposed to SLE will show any symptoms, however the mortality rate of a person that gets a serious infection ranges from 3% to 30%.

The people at the highest risk are the elderly, but everyone should take precautions to protect themselves. This is the time of year that most mosquito borne diseases are most likely to occur.

It only takes one infected

mosquito to transmit a disease like this so it is important to protect yourself by taking the following precautions:

*Wear long light colored clothes.

*Wear repellents containing DEET when mosquitoes are active, especially at dusk and dawn.

*Make sure that all window screens are in good working order.

*Do not leave outdoor lights on at night. Use a light with a motion sensor instead.

*Keep your yard mowed or bush hogged to eliminate mosquito resting areas.

*Empty containers that hold water every three to four days.

*Eliminate standing water around your house.

Theunnisen said the signature has been authenticated, and the letter has been appraised at \$700. However, its importance to Cameron Parish history is invaluable.

The Roosevelt letter was written on White House stationery and was dated Dec. 27, 1938. It was addressed to Mr. Bonsall thanking him for his hospitality on the hunt which was made prior to Roosevelt becoming president. A note on the back of the letter said it was donated by Frank Tartamella of Lake Charles.

Patty Morris, Johnson Bayou school board member, said even if the gym gets done soon, both facilities need to be enclosed because the recreation center which had previously been used for a second gym will not be ready this season.

School Board accountant Margaret Jones reported that the district still has about \$65,000 left in bond issue funds, however, architect Gayle Zembower estimates the cost of enclosing and climate controlling the pavilion to be near \$200,000.

Zembower said the project would have to be re-bid, because it has been more than 90 days since the original restoration bid was made. The pavilion was an alternate option on that bid, but was

eliminated at the time due to the cost, according to school superintendent Dr. Doug Chance.

Zembower said it would take at least six weeks to re-bid the pavilion project, by which time the gym should be finished. He went on to explain that the slow speed of the restoration was due mainly to the scarcity of materials, the large amount of recovery work being done across the entire Gulf Coast, and the special drawings needed for each part of the restoration.

He said the contractor works within a time line and price set by the contract, and the Johnson Bayou project is moving at "as good a pace as possible" within those parameters.

In answer to Webb's question about supervision, Zembower said that the Bessette Development supervisor is on site every day.

Chance said that Doug Welch is the school board's supervisor over all the facilities, and is under his, Chance's, direct supervision.

Dot Theriot moved to have a bid package prepared for the enclosure of the pavilion, but members of the crowd wanted to know why the board couldn't approve the project first, and then find out how much it will cost. Board President Loston McEvers replied that they would like to do so, but it would not be legal.

The Board had just learned that it will have basically no surplus in next year's budget. The special projects account has around \$450,000 left in it, for the whole parish. One member of the crowd said the board has \$9 million in the "rainy day" fund, and it should be made available for this project.

The Johnson Bayou restoration is the first, and thus far the only, restoration or building project in lower Cameron Parish for the school board. The cafeteria restoration was completed in time for start of school, and the gym will be nearly on time, Zembower said.

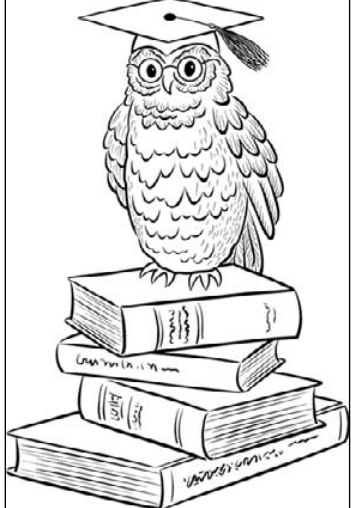

ALLIGATOR SEASON

The alligator hunters/trappers are doing good, filling out their tags. Rumors are the price could go to \$50 a foot. If this happens, it is good news, as hunters were cut quite a few tags. I noticed traveling the Lake Misere/Lacassine Bayou fishing, that 3/4 of the lines had alligators hooked and we saw some swimming around. This makes me believe that there were lots of alligators that survived the hurricane.

Jimmy Trahan and I made a good trip, fishing Lake Misere, Lake Latonia and Lacassine Bayou. We had bass, catfish, gaspergoo and red fish. Jimmy had one bass weighing 4.20 pounds.

I was looking at the Project Map of the debris in Big Lake/Calcasieu Lake. I knew there was debris, some you really see well, but I didn't picture that there was as much debris as is marked. To me I knew the south end of the lake would be the worst, and it is, but it's all the way to the north end of the lake, especially on the east side.

West Cove also has some, but not as bad as the lake itself. Workers say they think there's still lots of debris that is there that they haven't located yet. They used buoys with orange floats. Anglers are asked to mark spots where they have located debris. You can pick these markers at Calcasieu Point Landing.

FISHING REPORTS

Lake Sam Rayburn is producing nice bass as some of our local anglers are fishing Rayburn because of Toledo Bend's low water (162.25), however the generators are also running on Rayburn and their level is down four feet at 160.50.

The anglers on Big Lake are catching nice trout, some up to five pounds, still the same pattern, top water early, soft plastic later and live bait being the best, to include mullets and live shrimp. I didn't get any offshore reports, but Friday and Saturday there was plenty of rain right off the Cameron coastline.

TEAL HUNT

Hunters will be busy this week fixing blinds for opening day of teal hunting, Saturday, Sept. 15. Limit is four per day, per hunter and shooting hours are 1/2 hour before sunrise to sunset.

Hunters may also shoot rails and gallinules. The limit on gallinules is 15 per day per hunter.

CCA's STAR RODEO

The CCA's STAR tournament ended on Labor Day for 101 days of competition. Leaders were as follows: West Zones - Speckle Trout, Session I: Tony Hayden 8.20, Jared Verrett 7.65, and David French 6.90. Session II: Gary Burt 7.75, Joseph Buckley 7.25 and George Gott 7.20. Flounder: Paul Frilot 5.80, Tom Lemoinie 4.40 and Chance Trahan 4.05.

The largest speckle trout in the east zone was 8.30 and the central zone 8.15 in Session I. In Session II east zone was 7.20.

The central zone Session I largest trout was 8.15 and Session II was 6.48. As you can see, there was nice trout caught in all three zones in both Sessions I and II.

The top flounder is the east zone weighed 5.45.

There were 50 tagged redfish turned to the Louisiana waters and only two tagged redfish were caught that were entered into the event, so there's still 48 swimming - Chris Vallette of Sulphur and Al Bienvenue of New Orleans had the lucky catch.

DOVE SEASON

The first split of dove season is over, and yes, some nice dove hunts, but rain kind of put a damper on Saturday. Although some shooting was better than none. We'll just have to wait for the second split, which will take place Oct. 14 - Nov. 19.

TALK AROUND

Our archery deer hunters are getting prepared for the opening of archery season in Zone 3, Sept. 16 and run through Jan. 15, 2007.

I'm really waiting to see what will happen for our rabbit and squirrel, and especially how much damage was done in lower Cameron Parish. These two seasons open Oct. 7 and will run through Feb. 28.

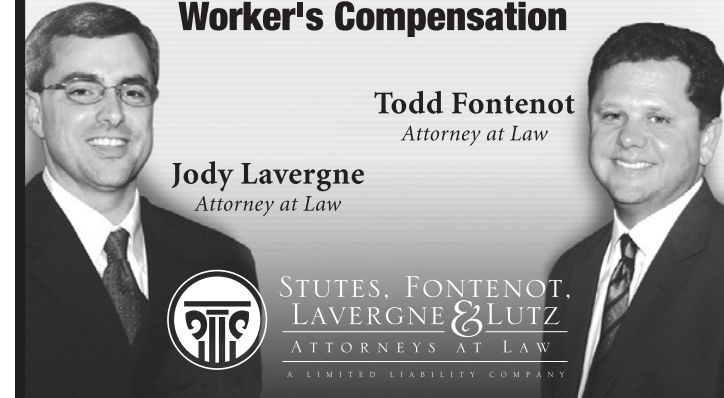

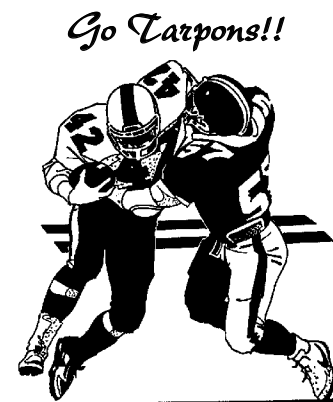

STORM PROBLEMS TALKED BY JURORS

Problems associated with Tropical Storm Delia which threatened Cameron Parish recently were discussed by the Police Jury Tuesday.

Civil Defense Director Roland J. Trosclair, Jr., told the jurors that the CD needs about seven more mobile or portable radios for use during emergencies. He estimated the cost at \$1000 and \$1400 per unit. The jury agreed to buy the equipment.

Jury Secretary Jerry Jones said he had been advised by the Port of Lake Charles that there were no charges for Cameron boats to dock there during storm emergencies. He said that several boat owners had received bills for mooring, but these bills had come from a mooring company. He said the owners were not obligated to pay these bills, since the Port had made no charge.

CAUSEWAY TOLL ACTION

The Cameron Police Jury Tuesday voted to recommend to its partner in the ownership of the Sabine Lake causeway bridge that tolls on the causeway be removed during an emergency evacuation of the parish and that tolls be charged only one way at other times.

If the Jefferson County Commissioners Court, co-owners with Cameron Parish of the causeway, agree to these two proposals, they will be put into effect in the near future.

Rep. Conway LeBleu of Cameron and Jim Simpson, causeway manager, of Port Arthur, both appeared before the jury to recommend the removal of tolls during evacuation.

LeBleu said it seemed a little unfair to charge residents of the parish a toll when they were fleeing from a storm.

Simpson said that collection of tolls during an evacuation was somewhat of a problem anyway since many of the people left hurriedly without change, and the collection of tolls slowed down the traffic.

He estimated the elimination of the tolls during an emergency would only cost the bridge owners about \$200.

The jurors, also noting that the bonds have been paid off on the causeway and that a \$100,000 surplus has been built up in the operating fund, agreed that the toll charge be reduced.

FIRES INVESTIGATED

Cameron Fire Chief Ray Burleigh said that a State Fire Marshal was called in Wednesday of last week to investigate the fire Tuesday night at Gulf Coast Supply in Cameron which caused around \$150,000 damage to the building and contents. Arson is suspected in the fire.

Burleigh said that due to the hard work of the few volunteers that were available they managed to contain the fire within the one building thus preventing what could have been a major fire.

Burleigh praised the work of volunteer firemen Calise Dupont, Helier Hebert, Floyd Saltzman, Roland J. Trosclair, Sing and Michael Faulk, Sheriff Claude Eagleson and Deputies Peter Constance and Freeman Turner.

He said that during the height of the fire, when more help was needed, three inmates of the Cameron jail,

volunteered their services and helped during the 5-hour fight to try to save the building.

The old fire truck was used since the new truck had been evacuated to the Central Fire Station in Lake Charles. However, one fire truck is always left in Cameron, for just such an emergency as this.

Chief Burleigh said that arson is suspected in the fire which was only partially covered by insurance. In fact, Burleigh said Carl Faulk, owner of the building and contents, had only enough insurance to take care of only a small portion of the loss.

The new fire truck has arrived back in Cameron. Burleigh said that when the local firemen went to pick up the fire truck, the Lake Charles firemen had washed and polished it for the return trip home.

STATUS OF ROAD PROJECTS

Numerous road and bridge projects were discussed at the Cameron Police Jury meeting Tuesday, with work to start on a number of them in the near future.

Rep. Conway LeBleu, who met with the jury, announced the status of the following projects:

A contract will be let in October for the construction of the new high level bridge to replace the Gibbstown pontoon bridge north of Creole. This is a part of the state's hurricane evacuation program and a similar bridge at Ellender's crossing north of Hackberry already is under construction.

A contract to replace the old one-way draw bridge over Kelso Bayou at Hackberry will be let next spring.

At the suggestion of the Cameron Lions Club, LeBleu said he was trying to get a new road built from behind the courthouse either to the Methodist Church street or the Beach Road to provide a higher alternate route during flooded conditions.

ROUNDABOUT THE PARISH

Robbie Seay, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Oran Seay of Hackberry, and a member of the Hackberry Sr. 4-H Club, was named state winner in Girls Achievement and will receive an expense paid trip to National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago.

Betty Nunez, Hackberry Athletic Association president, announced there will be a meeting of the association Thursday, Sept. 13 in the school cafeteria. Everyone is invited to attend and meet the new basketball coach Albay Hanks.

Gerald Landry, Hackberry Volunteer Fire Dept. Chief, says that he department has donated a fully equipped rescue unit to the newly organized Holly Beach area Volunteer Fire Dept.



School Board office plans are announced

Cameron Parish School Board members got a first look at plans for their new office during the regular meeting held Monday at Johnson Bayou School. Architect Gayle Zembower unveiled preliminary floor plans and elevation drawings for the proposed central office to be built on the Cameron Elementary School site.

Plans are to build a two story building above a raised parking area. The parking and receiving area, which could have storage bays and some office space, will be some ten feet above sea level. The first floor will hold the board meeting room and offices, with the third floor housing a conference room and other offices and work rooms. The main floor will be 20 feet above sea level, exceeding FEMA guidelines, but considered practical considering the location.

An elevator and stairs will connect the floors and restrooms on each floor will be stacked for economy. A sprinkler system will be installed throughout. A suggested change to allow for a receptionist at the second floor entrance to direct visitors is being worked into the plan. The attic will have room for a small storage area.

On the outside, windows will be inset deeply between the concrete columns that support the building. Metal roll-down shutters will provide additional protection for the windows during storms.

The first and second floors will include 15,000 sq. ft., while the possible addition of offices and storage on the parking level would bring the total square footage up to 20,000. The cost is estimated at \$3,502,000 for the two story plan, or \$3,970,000 if the ground floor space is added.

The board moved to proceed with the plan, to include some fine tuning. Pat Howerton abstained.

The board adopted its budget for the next year. Total expenditures are expected to be \$18,776,413, with an apparent surplus of \$467,819. However, income projections include protested taxes of around \$500,000 which cannot be used, so there is in effect a zero surplus.

Board accountant Margaret Jones said she did not include any FEMA payments in the budget, because it is not known whether they will be forthcoming. Insurance settlements have also not been completed, so those figures are still a question.

Another question mark is how much it will cost to rebuild the South Cameron schools and the Central Office. Jones says the "rainy day fund" so often asked about is being held to cover shortages in rebuilding funds after FEMA and insurance is received. This budget has only \$1 million in it for construction.

Cameron Parish Economic Development and Long Range Planning Director Ernie Broussard made a presentation to the board on the possible implementation of the tax pre-payment bond issue plan being developed by his office and Cheniere Energy.

Broussard hopes to use the plan to "re-create Cameron Parish as a quality community," not only bringing it back to a pre-Rita condition but preparing it for future economic development.

Under the plan, which is

still being worked out by teams of lawyers, Cheniere would pre-pay the taxes on its two LNG facilities now under construction. These taxes would not normally be due for ten years after opening. Cheniere would pay the first ten years of taxes at a rate of \$2.5 million per year for the first ten years of operation. Then, during the next ten years, they would only pay any amounts left over.

The funds received would be used to retire a \$30 million bond issue which would be used to construct capital projects for the parish designed to improve the infrastructure and economic development climate of the parish.

The School Board receives 39% of all parish millages, so \$11.7 million of the bond issue would be dedicated to school board projects. Broussard said Cheniere considers education very high on their list of priorities as it is necessary to building a quality community.

Cheniere representative James Ducote explained that as soon as operation begins at each facility the parish will begin to receive taxes on the pipelines and product inventory, which he said will probably exceed the property taxes on the facilities themselves. This should still allow entities to benefit from increased revenue for maintenance, etc.

Jones expressed concern as to the legality of taking tax money dedicated to maintenance and putting it into a bond issue. And then there is the question of how to know what millages might be in place ten years from now, and how to handle the difference. Broussard said those questions are being worked on, but what seemed a wonderful, and simple, gesture, has turned out to be much more complicated.

He said the school board would have final say over which projects are included in their portion of the bond issue.

A flap over the moving of temporary office buildings at the Grand Lake School site was settled when Hackberry board member Dwayne Sanner made a motion to move the buildings onto school board property as was stated in earlier actions.

The buildings were to be placed near the baseball field, but there were objections, so Chance had them moved onto adjoining property, owned by the Police Jury but used by the school. Board member Rachel Abadie said the buildings were only 10 ft. away from school grounds and it would be ridiculous to move them back such a short distance.

Cameron Board member Marvin Trahan and Grand Chenier member Dot Theriot said it was the principle of the thing. On a vote of 4-2, with Abadie and Howerton voting nay, the motion passed.

Sept. 29 deadline for disaster program aid

Calcasieu-Cameron Parish farmers have until Sept. 29, to apply for four hurricane disaster programs.

The four programs - Livestock Indemnity Program, Feed Indemnity Program, Hurricane Indemnity Program, and Tree Indemnity Program - are funded through Section 32 of the Act of August 24, 1935.

The Livestock Indemnity Program provides payments to eligible livestock owners and contract growers who incurred death of livestock due to the hurricanes. The Feed Indemnity Program provides payments to eligible livestock owners and cash lessees who suffered feed losses or increased feed cost due to the hurricanes.

The Hurricane Indemnity Program provides payments

to eligible producers who suffered crop losses and received either a Federal Crop Insurance Corporation crop insurance indemnity payment or an FSA Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) payment.

Due to how eligibility is determined for HIP, all producers who either filed a claim with a re-insurance company or received an indemnity must contact the FLA prior to Sept. 29. The Tree Indemnity program (TIP) provides payments to eligible owners of commercially grown fruit trees, nut trees, bushes and vines that produce an annual crop and were lost or damaged due to the hurricanes.

Pete Picou named as principal at J. Bayou

In the short time since school began, Johnson Bayou School has lost and gained a principal. H. E. "Gene" Reynolds resigned the position as of Friday, Aug. 25 in order to retire. Reynolds had moved to the area to take the reins of administering the school in 2004, and had purchased a home in Holly Beach, which Hurricane Rita destroyed. His wife was recently injured in a traffic accident on the Ellender Bridge, which Supt. Doug Chance said may have also contributed to his decision.

Nevertheless, the school found itself without the services of this effective leader only a week after school began.

After a two week advertisement period, only one properly certificated person had applied for the position. Hayes "Pete" Picou, South Cameron High School coach and teacher, was named principal on an emergency basis for the remainder of the 2006-2007 term, with only Pat Howerton voting against the appointment.

Johnson Bayou resident Barry Badon spoke to the board expressing his concern about the difficulty of keeping staff at the lower Cameron Parish schools, due to housing shortages and gas prices for commuters. He asked what plans the board was making to counteract these problems.

Johnson Bayou is still without a girls' basketball coach, and no applications have been received.

Chance said the possibility of providing gas money to teachers has been explored, but there were too many prob-

lems with the state auditors and the concept of "gifts" to employees. However, if a private person or company wanted to give money to teachers to pay their travel expenses, it would be legal.

This would cut out the extra time shown on the time sheets and would correct the violations.

Charlene also informed board that she had been approached about a community swim party that would be put on by the public library. The party date that was asked for was September 2nd or 3rd, 2006. Problems discussed regarding pool party were it would be falling on a date that the pool would already be closed. Pool closure will be August 27, New business was discussed to suggest the aerobics instructor, Crystal Robideaux, teach classes on Saturday morning. Letters sent on portable bldgs

Dear Editor:
Last week approximately 30 violation letters were sent out from the Police Jury Administrative Office. These violations concerned portable buildings. Some of the portable buildings were permitted as agriculture buildings and some were not permitted at all.
In the past, when FEMA does a Community Assessment Visit the FEMA representatives took photos of portable buildings with air conditioning units, which

they called a "dead giveaway" and that this is considered a habitable structure.
I am asked during these visits why the Parish is allowing habitable structures below the base flood elevation requirement. I then have to send out violation letters and get the residents in compliance with the Flood Damage Prevention Ordinance.
If the Parish does not keep structures in compliance with the Flood Damage Prevention Ordinance the whole Parish could lose their flood insurance and federal assistance. We now, also have to be concerned with the International Building Code. Most of the

portable buildings do not meet the wind load requirements.

We are allowing portable buildings to be used as habitable structures temporarily, if construction with a building permit or repairs are being made. Many of the 30 violation letters fell into this category.

The biggest mistake I made was sending so many letters out without letting my Jurors know that I had a problem. I thought we could handle the problem administratively as we have done in the past.

Lacassine waterfowl hunt

For the 2006-07 hunt season, the Lacassine Refuge will institute and administer managed waterfowl hunts in an area of the refuge known as the Duck Pond. Hunts in this area will be available only through a lottery drawing.

Hunters (applicants) must be 21 years of age or older as of Oct. 15 to apply. Those selected will be allowed to bring two guests. Selected applicants will be allowed to hunt one day per season. Hunting in this area will be allowed on Wednesdays and Saturdays during the 60-day season. A special permit will be issued to selected applicants.

Applicants must submit their name, age as of Oct. 15, 2006, address, telephone number and day preference 1st and 2nd choice (dates). Available dates are Nov. 11, 15, 18, 22, 25, and 29 (2006), Dec. 2, 16, 20, 23, 27, and 30 (2006), and Jan. 3, 6, 10, 13, 17 and 20 (2007).

Applications must be received by the Refuge office or delivered in person by 4:30 p.m. on Friday, Oct. 13, 2006 to be considered. Each applicant may only submit one application, if more than one application is submitted the applicant will be disqualified for the drawing. No phone applications will be accepted. If the required information is not provided, the applicant will be ineligible for the drawing. A public drawing to select lottery hunters will be held 1 p.m., Thursday, Oct. 19, 2006 at the Refuge Headquarters. Successful applicants will be notified by mail.
