Cameron to be in new district

Cameron Parish is expected to get a new state representative as the result of actions taken in the special 12-day session on reapportionment being held by the Louisiana Legislature.

Under the plan expected to be adopted Cameron Parish will become a part of Rep. Mickey Frith's 36th District which also includes Vermilion parish. Rep. Frith lives in Abbeville.

Cameron Parish during the past has been a part of the the B6th district which included all of Cameron and a portion of South Lake Charles and the area south of Lake Charles.

Rep. Dan Flavin, who presently serves this district, will see his district shrunk to include only the present Calcasieu portion. The change was made necessary due to the growth of the area south of Lake Charles.

However, Cameron Parish will continue to in the 25th Senatorial District which is Senator Jerry served by Theunissen of Jennings.

Senator Theunissen will see some minor changes in his district in Calcasieu and Acadia parishes, but there will be no changes in Cameron and Jeff Davis parishes.

Port Board lease is given approval

The West Cameron Port commissioners voted unanimously at a meeting in Holly Beach to grant a lease to two Cameron attorneys on 159.36 acres of port owned property on the Calcasieu ship channel at Cameron.

Under the terms of the lease attorneys Chadd Mudd and David Bruchhaus, owners of Gulf Coast Development Corp., agreed to clean the land at an approximate cost of \$50,000 and to seek industrial development on the property.

Under the lease, the corporation will pay no lease fee for the first five years. For the next 25 years they agree to pay the port a commission of 5.01 percent of the net profits generated by businesses operating there or no less than \$5,000 per year. The Holly Beach meeting

had been advertised as a hearing for anyone who wished to oppose the lease. The only opposition received was in a form of a letter from Rep. Dan Flavin, who urged the board to take no action since a bridge to Monkey Island is being planned. More than half of the property is on Monkey Island. The rest is on the west side of the ship channel.

Several police jurors who were present at the meeting expressed their support for the lease. Assistant District Attorney Cecil Sanner stated: "We think this is a good project and meets legal requirements."

The board then voted to finalize the lease with the two attorneys.

Attorney Mudd said the property on the west side of the channel adjoins property owned by his family and by putting the two pieces of property together there will be enough land to attack development.

Funds are sought for bridge here

The Louisiana Congressional delegation is currently in the process of securing \$100,000 needed by the Coast Guard to complete the transaction for the Monkey Island bridge, State Rep. Dan Flavin wrote in a letter to the West Cameron Port Com-mission last week.

"As soon as this funding has been secured the Department of **Transportation and Development** is ready to proceed with the work on the bridge," Rep. Flavin wrote.

The state announced plans about a year ago to close down the ferry to Monkey Island at Cameron due to high cost and the relatively number of persons living on the island.

At that time, Rep. Flavin was able to get the state to postpone action for two years to see if a bridge could be built to replace the ferry.

State funds were available to build a low level fixed span bridge, but some Cameron interests have been holding out for a moveable span bridge which they say will not interfere with boat traffic as much as the fixed span. In his letter, Rep. Flavin opposed the proposed lease of 159.36 acres of port-owned land on the ship channel at this time. "I am aware there has been no interest in this property for years," Flavin wrote. "However, now is not the time to proceed with a lease such as this due to the fact that a flat level bridge to the Monkey Island property will soon become a reality. Once this bridge is completed, you will see people lined up with an interest in developing the property. The West Cameron Port Commission, being a government agency, can afford to wait until this bridge is completed and then weigh all available options." Rep. Flavin was the only person who expressed opposition to the lease and the Port commissioners voted to finalize the con-

Hero of Calcasieu Pass battle to be honored with a marker

At daylight of May 6, 1864, residents of the little town of Leesburg (now Cameron) were awakened by the boom of cannonading, and occasionally a cannonball would strike the roof of a house. For several days two Federal gunboats, the Wave and out the 90-minute battle. Much of the time he had to get around on his knees, but not once did he leave the scene of duty.

At first it was believed that Guehrs' wound was not mortal since no artery was severed; and for a few days it appeared that his wound was healing. After Guehrs was discharged, another soldier was detailed to accompany him home. They were evactuated to Beaumont, and after 3 weeks of travel by wagon and train, Guehrs arrived back at his home in Waldeck, a tiny German community in Fayette County. Unknown to Guehrs, his commanding officer, Capt. Charles Welhausen, recommended to the Confederate Congress that the wounded cannoneer be cited for valor under fire and be awarded the Medal of Honor for his bravery at the Battle of Calcasieu Pass. The medal was finally given to Guehrs' family a year after his

Bobby Charles, a songwriter and entertainer from the Swamp Pop era, contributed songs like "See You Later Alligator", "I'm Walking To New Orleans", "I Believe in Angels", 'Angel Eyes", etc.

Proceeds will benefit the restoration of the Sabine Pass Lighthouse in Cameron Parish.

Granite City, had been at anchor in Calcasieu River in front of Duncan Smith's home.

The battle began when the entire Confederate garrison of Sabine Pass opened fire on the gunboats. Leading the Rebel attack was Creuzbauer's Battery of four 6-pound and 12pound howitzers, and the cannoneers were mostly German immigrants from Fayette County, Texas, many of whom spoke no English.

The No. 1 Confederate gun, a 12-pound battery commanded by Corp. Walter von Rosenberg, became the first casualty as soon as the gunboats returned their fire. A 24-pound Union shell hit the gun and exploded, killing Private William Kniep instantly and gravely wounding Private William Guehrs, with a shrapnel wound in his thigh.

Guehrs was offered the chance to leave the battle scene and report to the medical wagon, but he refused. Instead he fastened a belt around his thigh as a tourniquet; then he continued by swabbing out his gun barrel as needed, and reloading the No. 2 gun through-

I have been sentenced to imprisonment for one year with the Louisiana Department of Corrections with my sentence to be suspended upon the condition that I serve three years of supervised probation with the special conditions that I make restitution to the Cameron Parish Police Jury in the amount of Eight Thousand Two Hundred Twenty Five and 50/100 (\$8,225.50) Dollars and restitution to the Louisiana Department of Environmental Quality in the amount of Four Thousand One Hundred Seven and 25/100 (\$4,107.25) Dollars, and I have also been ordered to make a donation to the Southern Environmental Enforcement Network in the amount of Five Thousand and 00/100 (\$5,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of providing training to regulatory, law enforcement, and prosecutorial organizations to facilitate successful environmental crimes, investigation, and prosecution. I have also been ordered to make this public apology.

I want to assure the citizens of Cameron Parish that I will take all steps necessary to ensure that in the future I will respect all environmental laws, and I hope that other potential violators will learn from my experience.

The United Nations

This month, the United Nations will celebrate a birthday. The organization was developed in 1945 by 51 countries. Today, 188 countries belong to the United Nations.

The United Nations is not a world government and does not make laws. It was set up for four purposes: to keep international peace and security, to develop friendly relations among nations, to solve international problems and promote respect for human rights and to help unify the actions of nations.

Throughout the world, the United Nations works to clear land mines, improve drinking water, help countries produce more food and loan money to developing countries.

There are six parts to the United Nations:

The General Assembly is a group of nations that meets yearly to work on the world's worst problems.

The Security Council is responsible for keeping peace in the world.

The Economic and Social Council is under the authority of the General Assembly, and it takes care of the economic and social work.

The Trusteeship Council supervises and helps areas around the world that want to govern themselves.

The International Court of Justice has 15 judges that help work out disputes between countries.

The Secretariat takes care of the day-to-day functions of the United Nations and has about 8,700 employees around the world.

So You Want to Be...

When you combine music with movement, you find dancing. There are different types of dancers, but one thing is the same: They all bring ideas, stories and sound to life with the movement of their bodies.

Dancers perform in ballet, musical shows, opera, ads, television, movies and music videos. They perform modern, folk, ethnic, tap and jazz dances, and many of them sing and act.

Although most dancers work as a group, some dance alone, some teach dance and some choreograph dances. Choreographers create new dances or develop new ways to use older dances.

Even though it may look fun, dancing is actually hard work. Because most of the shows dancers are in take place at night, they work late hours, then practice and have long rehearsals during the day. Many times they have to rehearse and practice on weekends and holidays. If a show they are performing in goes on the road, they have to travel, too.

Most dancers don't have dancing jobs all the time, so they find work in other places, such as restaurants or dance studios. And because of the hard work, long rehearsals and long hours, most dancers stop working by the time they are in their late 30s. Some become dance teachers and coaches when they retire.

Dancers must be in good shape. Their training begins in ballet, usually with private teachers, when they are between 5 to 8. Girls usually start training earlier than boys. If dancers are good when they get into their early teens, they get more advanced training. By the time they are 17 or 18, most have a professional audition.
