Early Voting to end on **Saturday**

Early voting for the Oct. 20 election can be done in the Cameron Parish Registrar of Voters office behind the courthouse until Saturday, Oct. 13, from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Offices to be voted on in Cameron Parish include Sheriff, Assessor, Police School Board Jurors, Members.

Races for the Louisiana Senate and House are also on the ballot.

State races include Lt. Governor, Governor, Secretary of State, Attorney General, Commission of Agriculture, Commission of Insurance and BESE board.

There are also four constitutional amendments to be voted on.

Voters are asked to bring identification such as driver's

If a candidate makes a statement in an ad about his opponent that we feel that the opponent should have the opportunity to answer he will be able to do so.





Kansas zoo not to 'extradite' fugitive flamingo from Cam.

(EDITOR'S Cameron Pilot writer Cyndi Sellers got a "scoop' week when she reported the sighting of two flamingoes in Cameron Parish. She also had a photo of the two birds that she had taken. Her photo, when enlarged, showed one of the bird's leg band which indicated that it was an escapee from a Wichita, Kan. zoo. The following story from Čharles Lake the American Press tells "the rest of the story")

After two years on the lam, a pink flamingo that escaped from the Sedgwick County Zoo in Wichita, Kan., has been spotted in Louisiana with a wild Caribbean flamingo in a ship channel area of southwest Louisiana.

The latest sighting three weeks ago was in the Calcasieu Ship Channel on

private land in Cameron Parish accessible only by boat. Officials with the zoo in Wichita learned of the wayward flamingo's whereabouts late Friday because the birds were identified by numbers on their leg bands.

The zoo's flamingo was still traveling with the same companion that was with it during an earlier sighting. The two birds were seen at Arkansas National Wildlife Refuge on the Gulf Coast of Texas in December

The other bird, a rosy-red wild greater flamingo, came up from Mexico during Hurricanes Rita and Katrina. The discovery excited bird watchers in Louisiana because it was the first documented sighting of a wild greater flamingo in the state.

"We're very happy to see he's been spotted again," said zoo spokeswoman Christan

Baumer. The zoo does not plan to try to get the flamingo

"There really isn't an easy way to recapture the bird. It would only disturb wildlife where it's been found and possibly could do more damage to the bird than just leaving him alone," Baumer said.

Flamingos are social birds, so it is not unusual they are staying together, she said.

Members of Louisiana's ornithological society tried to locate the birds a few days after they were identified, but they had left the area. The zoo expects more sightings as the birds continue to look for safe places, food and water.

The program, if adopted, will permit Cheniere to prepay some of taxes which would be a benefit to the Parish, which is still recovering from Hurricane Rita two years ago.

Times have just gotten rougher for students who contraband intoCameron Parish schools. On Monday the Cameron Parish School Board voted to hire **Interquest Detection Canines** to conduct random searches in all parish schools.

School Board member Scott Nunez proposed the use of the service, saying principals wanted more searches than were being provided by the Sheriff's Office.

He also said Interquest Detection's dogs are trained to locate more kinds of contraband than the Sheriff's dog. Items like alcohol and guns are not illegal on the road, so the K-9 unit does not train for them.

Interquest's according to handler Kristi Munk, use a passive signal to alert on alcohol, prescription medications, any gunpowder related items, and illegal drugs. The company has been contracted in Calcasieu Parish schools for the past four years, and monthly reports show a decline in contraband, Munk said.

Searches will be completely random, with all schools being checked once a month. Interquest dogs, all golden retrievers or Labrador retrievers, will search buildings, lockers, grounds, and random classrooms. Any contraband located will be turned over to the school administration to be dealt with as policy dictates.

Munk said she is available for additional searches if requested, and also for extracurricular events like school dances. The \$400 per day fee will be partially funded through Title IV Safe and Drug Free Schools.

POLICY CHANGE

The Board is considering a policy change in disciplinary action, allowing for in-school suspensions at Grand Lake High School and Friday suspensions at Hackberry, South Cameron, and Johnson Bayou High Schools for certain offenses. Students serving inschool suspensions will not lose study time or test grades, but will spend their time in supervised activities.

In-school suspensions are not available for certain serious offenses by law, such as weapons, arson, assault and encroachment. been chosen by principals to be included in the list. Board members discussed whether it would be best to make the list final or to allow more discretion to principals on some offenses.

School Superintendent Stephanie Rodrigue said principals would still be in charge of

investigating the actions. Nunez, who teaches in Calcasieu Parish, was in favor of more discretion for school administrators, but Rodrigue said that in Cameron Parish parents want to know that each child is treated equally, regardless of school, and principals need guidelines to make sure this happens. The proposal will be considered for a month and voted on in November.

CROCS BAN VOTED DOWN

A proposal to prohibit "Crocs," imitation "crocs," or other similar rubber composite shoes was voted down. Dwayne Sanner moved to defeat the proposal, made last month by Marvin Trahan. Nunez seconded, saying that school administrators have better things to do than police shoes, and making parents buy new shoes midyear would be a hardship.

PROPERTY ISSUES

The Board voted to reject an offer from the US Army Corps of Engineers of \$5,600 for a easement on 15.43 acres of school section 16-13-10 adjacent to the Sabine National Wildlife Refuge on which the Corps inadvertently built a containment dike. Board President pointed out that if the situation were reversed, the Corps would be demanding that School Board remove the

gestions, that property be exchanged or that the Corps build another, lower dike inside the refuge boundary and leave the misplaced one alone, were both rejected. By law, the boundaries of the refuge cannot be changed except by Congress, and project managers said that a lower dike would still require a easement in case the higher one ever eroded.

The Board authorized District Attorney Cecil Sanner to negotiate with the Corps of Engineers, and suggested that they should build another dike, to full height in the right place and just leave the misplaced one alone.

PROPERTY SWAP

Another property matter, a swap between the Police Jury and the Board in Grand Lake, received the go-ahead. Final vote will have to wait on a survey of the Parish's land, 5.135 acres adjacent to Grand Lake School. The exchange will be for an equal value of property, 3.95 acres next to the Big Lake ball park. Both parcels are valued at \$30,810.



FINANCES

Some relief is on the way to offset Cameron Parish's reduction in state Minimum Foundation Program (MFP) funds. The reduction was due to lower enrollment caused by Hurricane Rita displacement. The General Appropriations Bill passed by the Legislature this spring provides public school districts in Jefferson Parish, Cameron Parish, and the City of Bogalusa with 55% of the shortfall. In Cameron Parish's case, that comes to

\$598,344. These three districts were chosen because they had extensive hurricane damage as well as loss of students.

The Board authorized the president to sign an agreement with Cheniere Energy to accept payment in lieu of taxes of \$811,537 for 2007, with authorizations to be signed annually for future payments, up to ten years.

The actual receipt of the check, originally expected in August, has been postponed, but a ceremony may take place in early November.







IRON SHOT SHELL

Refuge Manager John R. Walther announced that the 1974 waterfowl hunt regulations for Sabine National Wildlife Refuge are now available for public distribution. 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



I didn't get many local fishing reports, as I spent three days on Sam Rayburn fishing the annual Rayburn Oilmen's Classic, as they still allow retired oilfield workers to fish. My son-in-law Travis Broussard fished hard, catching a few fish, but the low water and lack of grass in most areas made fish hard to find. We never had a keeper limit for either day.

There were four other teams from Cameron Parish that we talked to, but there luck was about like ours. There was a 10 pounder caught on Friday and that stringer was 24 pounds, so they were in the fish. Water levels on Rayburn Lake are 168.8 feet with two generators running and I noticed one of the dams was open and lots of water flowing out of the lake.

Although Toledo Bend has had plenty of water, the water is dropping, now down to 168 feet from over 172 feet, but the generators are not run-

I did get a chance to talk with a couple of Big Lake Anglers, and their catching lots of trout from Turners Bay, all the way down to the South end of the lake. A few good catches of Flounders are also reported. A few redfish at the weirs are being caught, but jetty fishing for redfish and large drums is still the

DECOYS

Today we've seen duck decoys come a long way from back when decoys were made of hand carved wood and paints. Light-weight decoys are the trend, but some hunters will have up to a 100 decoys per pond while years ago hunters were satisfied to have three dozen decoys, but they set them out before daylight and picked them up after there hunt, where today decoys stay in the pond all through duck season.

Then we have the electric duck that flaps it wings and swims and splashes water. However, the most effective duck decoy and duck caller were live decoys, which are now banned by law since 1935. Some hunters used these decoys for several years after the ban.

I remember my grandmother had about 20 or so English Callers with the chickens in a fenced-in area and lots of times we had regular migratory ducks light in the pasture as these English Callers would lure them in.

My grandmother would dare my uncle to use these English Callers for hunting. One day my uncle asked me to go hunting with him, but for me to catch 4 or 5 of these ducks, put them in a sack and be ready for the next morning. Yes, I sneaked in and got 5 English Callers and yes we tied a string to one leg and also to a stake in the pond with the rest of the decoys.

It did work, so not having a gun for myself, my uncle decided to let me shoot the next time ducks would come

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and so I did, but I shot the wrong mallards and killed two of grandma's English Callers, but we just put them in the limits and I eased the other three back to the chick-


en yard. Well it didn't take long before grandma was raising cane about the raccoons or something eating her ducks and you bet your bottom dollar, I didn't say a word.

LAKE DISAPPEARS

Scot Lake in Florida has disappeared, when last June one or more sinkholes literally drained the water from the lake as if someone had pulled a plug, like when you pulled the plug from the bathtub.

massive whirlpool resulting from the sinkholes apparently sent everything from fish, turtles, and alligators into the ground in less than 10 hours. The sinkholes swallowed three-quarters of the 285 acre lake's aquatic life, about 65,000 pounds of fish.

Florida Wildlife Commissioners said, following the flow led them into the ground. Although alligators are strong swimmers, they had no place to go except

Department of Wildlife and Fisheries Law Enforcement Division (LDWF/LED) was recently granted approval by the Louisiana Police Officers Standards and Training (POST) Council to offer the Maritime Search and Rescue Course (MSARC) to qualified POST certified peace officers.

In the months after the devastating landfalls of Hurricanes Katrina and Rita, several law enforcement agencies across the state of Louisiana realized a vital need to train officers in all aspects of search and rescue (SAR), especially maritime search and rescue.

The LDWF/LED is the primary agency for search and rescue in the state and the Office Governor's Homeland Security and Preparedness Emergency (GOHSEP) designated lead SARoperations. LDWF/LED agents have several decades of experience in boating safety enforcement, maritime patrol enforcement and maritime search and rescue, and the division has received several requests from law enforcement agencies to provide maritime SAR

training to their officers. As a result, LDWF/LED designed and implemented the 40 hour MSARC to train other law enforcement officers in such areas as marine search and rescue, Louisiana **Emergency Operation Plans** (ESF-9 SAR), navigation rules, vessel handling, waterborne arrest techniques and

The first offerings of the course have been scheduled for Oct. 29-Nov. 2, and Nov. 12-Nov. 16.

Officers must be Louisiana POST certified peace officers and have successfully completed a National Association of State Boating Law Administrators or U.S. Coast Guard approved boating education course before being eligible to attend the course. Law enforcement agencies interested in having their officers attend the course or for more information on the course itself can contact LDWF/LED at 225-765-2980.

What to do when a friend has cancer

(NAPSA)-The birth of a child is sweet. The Food and Drug Administration says a great tool to help manage calorie intake is the Nutrition Facts Label on food packages. The label has a lot of useful information, especially the number of calories and serving sizes in your food.

When you select or compare foods, see what the label says about the serving size and calories. Ask yourself these important questions:

What is the serving size? How many servings are in the container?

How many calories are in a single serving?

Many packages hold more than one serving. When you consume multiple servings, it is easy to eat or drink much more than you realize. This can affect your calorie intake (and over time, your weight). If you eat and drink more calories than you burn, you will gain weight. To achieve or maintain a healthy weight, be mindful of calories when comparing like products.

How many calories are high or low for a serving? This depends on your calorie goal for the day and how you balance your food choices during the day. In general, though, follow this guide to size up calories in a single serving.

Following the rules is the key to charcoal Tailgating victory

(NAPSA)-Serious gaters are just as passionate about their parking lot buffets as they are about the game. And for a majority of tailgaters, only a charcoal grill will do when it comes to cooking the feast. In fact, according to the recent Weber Tailgating Study, 61 percent of tailgaters who bring grills with them opt for a charcoal grill when prepping for the

"big game.' "Cooking a pregame spread over charcoal is a 'Cooking major matter of pride for a lot of us," says Chef Jamie Purviance, a renowned grilling expert and author of the new "Weber's Charcoal Grilling" cookbook. "The fickleness of a live fire requires more skills than a gas grill does, but once you've learned to control it, the rewards are huge, both in terms of taste and a sense of accomplish-

Rookie grillers sometimes let their excitement get ahead of them, jumping in like a young quarterback off the bench for the first time-and fumbling. One surefire way to avoid similar problems is to read the playbook on the top five grilling mistakes that always draw a penalty flag:

Flag: False Start

Thrown when: Lighter fluid is used to start the fire.

The Right Call: Chemical starters are dangerous and leave behind a nasty taste, so don't look their way for your start-up. Instead, place crumpled newspaper or paraffin cubes on the grate, cover with a pyramid of charcoal briquettes, and ignite. When your charcoal is coated with light grey ash (usually about 20 minutes after it's lit), you're ready to cook. A chimney starter makes this process easy.

Flag: Unnecessary Roughness

Thrown when: A spatula is used to press the burger against the cooking grate.

The Right Call: Squeezing only pushes out flavor. Let your meat cook until it separates cleanly from the grate (a light coating of oil will help it brown evenly and prevent sticking). Then flip-once. That's all most foods need.

Flag: Illegal Procedure Thrown when: The grill lid

is open while you cook.

The Right Call: Keep the lid down to cook your food faster and more evenly. This also reduces the chances of a flare-up.

Flag: Delay Of Game

Thrown when: You don't have the right equipment.

The Right Call: Missing gear can make you miss kickoff, so be prepared with this list: aluminum pans, paper plates and cups, tongs, spatulas, mitts, cutting boards, ice, condiments, seasonings, trash bags-and, of course, charcoal, a chimney starter and a grill.

Flag: Holding

Thrown when: Hot coals and ashes are not safely disposed of after grilling.

The Right Call: Always wait until coals have completely cooled before disposing in a fireproof trash bin or ash can. If you empty ashes every time you grill, you'll get better air flow when starting your next fire. Plus, ashes absorb moisture, which may cause your grill to rust.


before grilling. Stack 6 tortillas on top of each other and wrap them in aluminum foil. Repeat with the remaining 6 tortillas.

5. Brush the cooking grate clean. Grill the steaks over direct high heat, with the lid closed as much as possible, until lightly charred on the surface and cooked to your desired doneness, 5 to 7 minutes for medium rare, turning once or twice and swapping their positions as needed for even cooking. At the same time, warm the 2 packets of tortillas over indirect high heat for 4 to 6 minutes, turning once. Remove the steaks and tortillas from the grill and let the steaks rest for 2 to 3 minutes (keep the tortillas warm in the foil). Cut the meat across the grain into thin slices. Pile the meat inside warm tortillas and top with the salsa, draining the juices back into the bowl so the tortillas don't get too wet. Serve immediately.



Now is the time to plant your fall vegetable garden

mornings October make it a joy to get out and work in the home

vegetable garden. A number of delicious and nutritious vegetables will thrive in the coming cool season. Indeed, some of our favorite vegetables can only be grown in Louisiana October through Before planting, do a through job of removing any weeds that may have grown in the bed. Turn the soil and add at least a 3-inch layer of compost, rotted manure, leaf mold (partially decayed leaves) or other organic matter. Sprinkle a light application of an all-purpose fertilizer appropriate for your area

and lime (if your soil is acid and low in calcium) over the organic matter, and dig everything into the bed. You could also use your favorite organic fertilizer.

Never scrimp on bed preparation, as it has a direct effect on how well your plants will produce. And, once your plants are growing don't forget to use mulches to control

Broccoli is an easy-to-grow and productive fall vegetable. Plant transplants you will find at area nurseries now through mid-October. Space plants 12 to 18 inches apart in rows or beds. The closer spacing will produce smaller heads, but total production is greater since you have more plants per row or bed.

Broccoli heads are harvested when the largest flower buds in the head are about the size of the head of a kitchen match. It is common for gardeners growing broccoli for the first time to leave the heads on the plant too

Never allow the flower buds to begin to open into yellow flowers, or quality of the head is reduced. After the main head is harvested, side florets will be produced, and harvesting can continue for several weeks.

Cauliflower is a bit more challenging than broccoli but is still a good choice for your fall garden. Cauliflower should be spaced 18 to 24 inches apart; closer spacing will greatly reduce the size of the head.

Cauliflower produces only one head, so after harvesting remove the entire plant from your garden to make way for planting something else. For white heads, blanch the cauliflower by pulling the leaves up over the head when it is about the size of a silver dollar. Fasten the leaves with a clothes pin and check the head frequently. Harvest before the curds of the head start to separate.

Kohlrabi is not nearly as well known or commonly grown as it deserves. It is grown for its round, edible stem, which tastes like a

mild, sweet version of a turnip. Seeds or transplants may be planted now through February. From transplants, this fast-growing vegetable is ready to harvest in just 7 to 8 weeks. Harvest the stems when they range from a golf ball to a tennis ball in size. They are excellent peeled and sliced for vegetable trays or salads, stir fried, steamed or boiled.

Other related vegetables that are recommended for fall gardens include cabbage, kale and collards. All of these can be planted from seed or transplants now through February.

Garlic may be planted now through November by pressing individual cloves – big end down – into the prepared soil so that the tip of the garlic is about 1/4 inch below the soil surface. Space the cloves 4 to 6 inches apart in rows spaced about 15 inches apart.

Garlic growth is slow, and the 15-inch space between rows can be used for intercropping. Intercropping is a term used when two or more different vegetables are grown in the same bed at the same time.

The garlic plants will not use the 15 inches between the rows for several months, and a quick-growing vegetable can be grown in that area and harvested before the garlic needs it. Good choices would include radishes, leaf lettuce, beets, kohlrabi and spinach.

These vegetables are not large growers and will be harvested long before the garlic is ready next May.

Intercropping may also be done with other vegetables such as cabbage and cauliflower that are initially spaced far apart.

A complete listing of vegetables that can be planted this month includes beet, broccoli, cabbage, carrot, cauliflower, celery, Chinese cab bage, collard, endive, garlic, kale, kohlrabi, leek, lettuce, mustard, onion, peas (English, snow and edible podded), radish, rape, rutabaga, shallot, Swiss chard, turnip and many herbs such as thyme, sage, rosemary, oregano, French tarragon, lavender, chives, cilantro, dill, mints and parsley.

your exercise routine

(NAPSA)-Exercise may keep you healthy and strong, but most people don't know that it can also cause heartburn. The good news is that exercise-induced heartburn can be controlled for heartburn sufferers to help them continue an active lifestyle.

Researchers believe that exercises mav increase abdominal pressure and push stomach acid into the esophagus, contributing to heartburn symptoms. Below are some tips from the National Heartburn Alliance to avoid heartburn during exercise:

 Avoid vigorous exercises. A bouncing type of exercise, such as jogging, can increase your chances of suffering from acid reflux.

 Pass up protein and fatty snacks. Food that is consumed less than two hours before exercising makes a huge impact on the occurof heartburn. Preworkout meals should be high in carbohydrates and low in fat and protein.

• Limit types of foods. Certain foods and beverages are more likely to cause heartburn than others. Moderate your intake of citrus fruits and juices, chocolate, onions, peppermint, spearmint, fatty or spicy foods and caffeinated or carbonated beverages.

• Time your meals. Exercising on a full stomach is not advisable, largely because it increases intraabdominal pressure, which may contribute to heartburn. Wait at least two hours after a meal before exercising.

• Control quantity.

Decrease portion sizes when eating prior to exercise. Reflux is more likely to occur when there is a lot of food in the stomach.

 Drink plenty of water before and during exercise. Water aids in digestion and also prevents dehydration.

• Talk to your health care professional. Confirm what types of exercises cause the least amount of discomfort for you and what you can do to ease the heartburn if it reoccurs. Your doctor can advise you and help you understand differences between available treatment options.

• Use the appropriate medication to help avoid future heartburn. In addition to speaking to your doctor, choosing the correct heartburn medication is an important step in preventing exercise-induced heartburn. Treatment options are available, including antacids (e.g., Tums®), H2 blockers (e.g., Zantac®) and proton pump inhibitors (e.g., Prilosec OTC®). Speak to your doctor

about which is best for you. "With the proper treatment, active individuals can continue their regular exercise regimen without worrying about the return of heartburn," says Dr. Janet Engle, a Clinical Professor at the College of Pharmacy at the University of Illinois at Chicago. "If heartburn induced by exercise continues to be a problem, you should talk to your doctor about the treatment option that is best for you.'

For the more than 60 million people who suffer from heartburn each month in the U.S., understanding and finding treatment options can be difficult. The key to treating exercise-induced heartburn is to understand what type you

• Episodic or occasional heartburn is characterized by infrequent bouts of heartburn that are usually manageable or predictable in the short





Requesting the Legislature to appropriate funds to DOTD to four-lane the entire loop of LA Hwy. 27. Requesting LA DOTD to conduct an in-house study of a bridge or tunnel across the Calcasieu Ship Channel.

Requesting Legislature to fund construction of a bridge to Monkey Island.
