



Flu shots for eligible persons to be given at Health Units

The Department of Health and Hospitals, Office of Public Health, will begin offering a limited number of flu vaccines next week at parish health units throughout the southwest Louisiana region including Cameron. The vaccines will be given only to citizens who fall into one of the DHH/OPH high-risk groups. No pediatric vaccine is available for healthy children at this time.

People who are classified as priority groups for the flu vaccine at parish health units are:

- *adults aged 65 years and older.

- *people aged 2-64 years with qualifying chronic medical conditions such as heart

disease, diabetes, kidney disease, asthma, cancer or HIV/AIDS.

- *pregnant women.

- *children 6 months - 18 years of age on chronic aspirin therapy.

People who fall into one of these groups are advised to bring documentation of their condition with them to the health unit. In all cases, public health workers will vaccinate as many clients as supply allows.

With documentation, flu shots are free to people who qualify for Medicare and Medicaid coverage. There is a \$10 co-pay for all other clients.

New Grand Lake elementary wing groundbreaking is held

A groundbreaking ceremony for the new elementary school addition to Grand Lake High School was held Thursday afternoon.

Grand Lake School District voters in July, 2003 passed a \$5 million bond issue to provide more facilities at the school where enrollment has substantially increased in recent years.

The new facilities, which will be located in a new wing on the west side of the present building, will consist of:

- Six new classrooms, a new library, a new cafeteria and kitchen facility and a computer lab.

The new wing will house grades pre-kindergarten through sixth grade and will separate the younger students from the junior high and senior high students.

The present cafeteria will seat about 110 persons; the new one will seat 275. All of the school's students will share the new lunchroom.

Mrs. Audrey Nunez LeDoux and Mrs. Leana Nunez Hector were recognized for making available to school board the 20-acre site which had belonged to their parents. The sisters said the family was happy to have their property put to such a good use for the children.

Police Juror Charles Precht said he was proud that the voters stood behind the school system.

"Thirty years ago our parents built a school for us. We're glad to be able to do it for others."

Gayle Zembower, architect, said the new facilities will have 41,000 square feet of space, a burgundy metal roof and a building designed to withstand strong winds. It will have a modern fire suppression sprinkler system.

Others on hand for the groundbreaking included Dr. Doug Chance, superintendent; school board members Pat Howerton, Loston McEvers and Rachel Abadie; Sheriff Theos Duhon, District

Parish voters back Bush

Cameron Parish voters were in tune with the rest of Southwest Louisiana in favoring George W. Bush for president, David Vitter for the U. S. Senate and Willie Mount for U. S. Representative in Tuesday's election.

In the presidential race the parish vote was 3,190 for Bush/Cheney and 1,540 for Kerry/Edwards or 66.8% to 31.4%.

The Constitutional Party got 39 votes and The Better Life Party got 23 votes.

David Vitter was elected U. S. Senator statewide, succeeding John Breaux who is retiring. However, the race in Cameron Parish was close with Vitter getting 1,967 votes and Chris John getting

1,904 votes. John Kennedy got 350 votes.

In the race for the 7th Congressional District seat, Charles Boustany and Willie Mount are in a runoff to be held Saturday, Dec. 4.

In Cameron Parish Mount came out on top with 2,130 votes to Boustany's 1,281.

David Thibodaux got 466 votes; Don Cravins, 363; Malcolm Carriere, 139.

Cameron Parish voters approved all of the four constitutional amendments which were passed statewide.

The Cameron Parish vote turnout was 64 percent or 4,773 of 7,506 eligible voters.

Members of the Japanese Hokkaido Scenic Byway pro-

ject were present at a conference in Albuquerque, N.M., where the marketing plan for the Creole Nature Trail received a "Best Practices" award. The company is developing its scenic byway and gleaned insight for marketing the byway through touring the Creole Nature Trail and meeting with members from the Southwest Louisiana Convention & Visitors Bureau and Creole Nature Trail All-American Road District.

"We came to Southwest Louisiana because the Creole Nature Trail has a successful marketing program, and we wanted to learn about the marketing methods that were used to sustain the trail over

the years. We were moved by the trail and the warm hospitality in the region," said Naomi Yamada, research engineer at Hokkaido Development Engineering Center.

The group began the day meeting with Mayor Randy Roach of Lake Charles and Mayor Ron LeLeux of Sulphur and headed to Brown's Grocery for a tasty "boudin breakfast." 

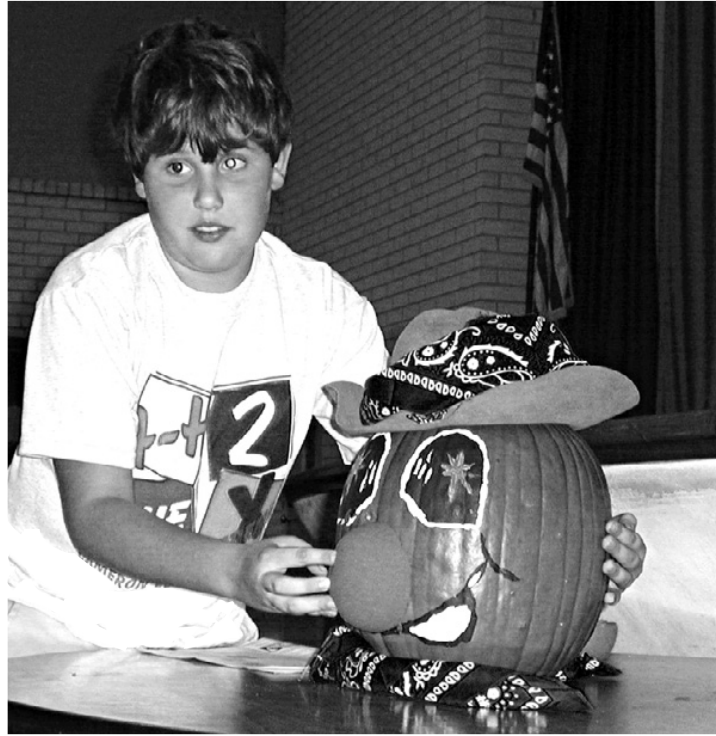

Cameron Elementary 4-Hers have a very busy October

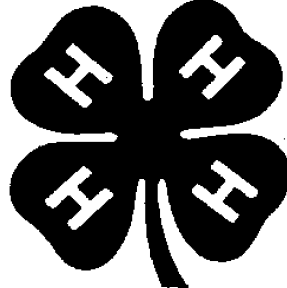
