Two dead in

A Cameron couple apparently died as the results of murder and suicide some time last week, according to the Cameron Parish Sheriff's

On Friday, Nov. 26 at about 6 p.m., the Sheriff's Dept. received a call that Roy and Inga Leatherwood were not answering their phone or door at their home at 6409 W. Creole Highway.

Deputy Vinson Johnson entered the house by force and found Roy Leatherwood, 45, and Inga Leatherwood, 45, dead from apparent gunshot wounds.

The couple was last seen alive on Tuesday, Nov. 13, according to Sheriff Theos

Deputies said the case appears to be a homicide/suicide and it is under investigation. Evidence was collected and sent to the lab for analy-

Other officers on the scene were Deputies Mike Groves, D. A. Dupuie, Investigators Jake McCain, Randy Hunt, Chris Savoie, Kim Nunez, Randy Hunt and Joey Babineaux Sr.

The next of kin of the couple were notified.

Mrs. Leatherwood had been a registered nurse for 13 years. She had no children. She was preceded in death by her parents, Lucy and Stanley Abrahamsen Sr.

Five fire departments get grants

The hospital, which opened in 1963, was destroyed by Hurricane Rita in September, 2005. A completely new hospital has now been built and reopened.

Road Home deadline is Dec. 1st.

Applicants to The Road Home program have less than two weeks to schedule their initial appointments with a housing advisor. Applicants must schedule their initial appointments by Dec. 1, and complete the appointment by Dec. 15.

The Road Home program requires applicants to complete an appointment with a program housing advisor. Homeowners who do not schedule this appointment by Dec. 1 and complete it by Dec. 15 will be considered ineligible to receive assistance from the program.

Appointments are available at eleven Housing Assistance Centers across Louisiana and in Houston. Applicants who live out of state may conduct a telephone appointment and complete an application packet through the mail. However program managers strongly encourage homeowners to conduct appointments in-person if at all possible. This will help expedite the processing of the homeowner's application. These applicants must still call to schedule this telephone appointment no later than Dec. 1. and all materials must be returned by Dec. 15.

Applicants who have yet to schedule their first appointments must do so by calling 1-888-762-3252.

Cyclists with the Tour des Trees rode 250 miles, from Calcasieu Parish to Houma to plant the seedlings, replacing the many trees destroyed by Hurricane Rita. The tour started Saturday and ended on Tuesday.

The trees were to be planted in Lake Charles, at Cameron Prairie Refuge, Creole playground, South Cameron High School, and sites in Abbeville, New Iberia, and Houma.



McNeese tells fee referral

Students attending McNeese State University this spring can take advantage of a fee deferral plan offered for tuition and fees by the McNeese Administrative Accounting Office.

Students are required to pay one-half of the total amount of their fees, plus a \$30 processing fee, by 4 p.m. Jan. 17. The remaining fee payment is due March 3.

Part-time or full-time registered students are eligible for the plan if they have not defaulted on a previous fee deferral plan loan or a bookstore account and if their fees are either not covered, or only partially covered, by student financial aid.

All registration fees, including tuition, special assessments, class-related fees and meal plan charges, are eligible for the fee deferral plan. No type of delinquent fines and/or fees can be

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

Dear Savvy Senior,

Can you alert your readers to the national digital television transition that's coming in early 2009? I work with the Communications Commission (FCC) and we need journalists like you to write articles to inform the public (especially seniors) about what they may need to do to keep their television sets working. Senior Alert

Dear Alert,

There's no doubt that most Americans are still in the dark when it comes to the looming digital television switch-over, and lower income seniors may be particularly vulnerable. Here's what viewers need to know about the national digital TV conversion, who it will affect and what they can do.

TV Changes

If you still use an antenna to watch your favorite news and television programs, in just 15 months (at midnight on Feb. 17, 2009), your picture will disappear forever unless you make a change.

Why? The government is requiring all broadcasters to convert their signals from oldstyle analog (which have been used for 60 years) to newstyle digital. The key reason for the conversion is to make better use of the public airwaves. Digital broadcast signals are superior to the analog system and take up less spectrum, so once broadcasters make the transition it will free up a big chunk of the airwaves and allow the government to auction it off and dedicate some of it to public safety. In other words, it's technology moving forward.

Who's Affected

If your television set is hooked up to a cable or satel-

lite service, or if you have a new TV with a built-in digital tuner (check your manual), don't sweat it. You don't have to do anything. But if you have an older television that works with the help of a rooftop antenna or "rabbit ears," you'll have to make a change if you want to keep watching TV after Feb. 17, 2009. Your options are either

· Buy a DTV converter box for your existing television. They are expected to cost between \$50 and \$70. To help offset the costs, the government is offering all house-holds (regardless of income) up to two coupons, worth \$40 each, to be used toward the purchase of up to two couponeligible converter boxes. Coupons cannot be combined to purchase a single converter. The coupon program is available on a first-come, first-served basis starting Jan. 1, 2008, through March 31, 2009. Seniors living in nursing homes or assisted living facilities won't be able to redeem coupons because they do not live in their own households. with enhanced features, such as one with a DVD recorder (see dtvfacts.com). They start at around \$150, but are not eligible for the \$40 coupon program.

· Subscribe to your cable or a satellite provider.

· Buy a new television set with a digital tuner. Most TV's sold in stores today have built-in digital tuners, but it's wise to double-check with the retailer just to be sure.

Make sure that there is always about 1 inch of water in the pan. (Change the water if it becomes cloudy.) In about a week, green leaves will begin to grow out of the vegetable tops. Little white threads might also emerge from the veggie tops. These are rootlets. Leave them

The green leaves get nutrition from the vegetable tops. In about a month, when this food supply is used up, fewer leaves appear. The existing leaves will wilt and dry up. When that happens, throw out the tops and start another batch. You can try growing other vegetables too,

LOCAL COUNT GOOD The coastal zone Nov. 5-7 duck count was great for the Southwest portion of the state. The grand total for Southwest Louisiana was 1,378,000 ducks and 170,000

The estimates of 1,633,000 ducks on this survey is 30% lower than last November when there was an estimate of 2.3 million and is also 25% lower than the 30 year average of 2.1 million. It's similar to the last five year average of 1.7 million, but higher than estimates of 2002-03-05. There were no counts on canvasbacks but I did see some this past week in the south marsh in Grand Chenier. There were some scaup offshore, south of Marsh Island, 12 to 15,000, and a few smaller flocks in the open water of

Vermilion Bay.

There really hasn't been much cold weather yet this year, no rain to amount to much, however as I write this it's raining and we need the rain, but too much could move our ducks out.

Lack of cold weather is the reason we're still seeing so many blue-winged teal in our area. All in all the southwest part of Louisiana has been blessed as we have lots of ducks in our marshes and

we're enjoying good hunting.

HUNTING

I enjoyed a great hunt with two friends, Carl Broussard "D" Mr. Boudreaux of Grand Chenier. The best thing of the hunt was we each got a drake pintail.

FISHING

Fishing conditions have been perfect, as Big Lake is really hot both on spotted trout and redfish, and a few flounders are showing up. For those fishing Sam Rayburn and Toledo Bend, if this rain doesn't put water into those two lakes, boaters will really have to be careful for the stumps. Rayburn is 5 feet lower and Toledo is about 4-1/2 feet lower than normal. Both are still producing nice bass, but fishing is slow.

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Feral hog problem studied by new control committee

The newly formed Feral Swine Control Committee (FSCC) has prepared a feral hog surveillance plan that will focus on collecting blood samples for the detection of diseases and researching ways to control the population of feral hogs in Louisiana.

"The Feral Hog Disease Surveillance and Population Control Plan's" overall goals are to: 1) identify diseases carried by feral swine and their prevalence; 2) minimize the effects of the diseases on wildlife; and 3) control the population of feral hogs in Louisiana. This plan reflects a cooperative relationship $_{
m the}$ Louisiana between Department of Wildlife and (LDWF), the Fisheries Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry (LDAF), and the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) Wildlife Services.

House Concurrent Resolution No. 192 requested the Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries (LDWF) to study all possible methods to reduce the number of feral hogs on private lands adjacent to wildlife management areas. response to this request, an organizational meeting was arranged with the Feral Swine Control Committee (FSCC) on Nov. 6, 2007 in the Office of the State Veterinarian to discuss measures to aid in the control of feral hog populations. The following people were present:

Dwight LeBlanc USDA/APHIS Services (Wildlife Services; Scott Woodruff -USDA/APHIS Wildlife Wildlife Services; Nan Huff - LDWF; Emile LeBlanc - LDWF; Dr. Martha Littlefield - LDAF; and Dr. Henry Moreau

Blood samples for the detection of diseases will be taken from feral hogs on Jackson-Bienville and Sandy Hollow Wildlife Management Areas (WMA). The different geographical locations of the WMAs will provide a relatively unbiased estimate about the presence (or absence) of swine brucellosis, classical swine fever, and pseudorabies in the feral hog population in Louisiana. Jackson Bienville WMA is comprised of 32,185 acres in North Central Louisiana. Sandy Hollow WMA is comprised of 3,514 acres in Southeast Louisiana.

Wild hogs cause extensive damage to natural wildlife habitat, privately managed food plots for deer and turkey, farm ponds and watering holes for livestock. In Louisiana, the frequency of wild pigs around agricultural areas has caused damage to sugarcane, rice and cornfields. The wild omnivores also compete with native wildlife for food resources, prey on young domestic animals and wildlife, and carry diseases that can affect pets, livestock, wildlife and people.

Recent research suggests that the increasing hog population of western Louisiana is not only causing detriment to terrestrial flora and fauna, but is negatively impacting native freshwater mussels and insects by contributing E. coli to water systems.

The estimated feral hog population in the United States is over 4 million and growing. "We do not anticipate complete eradication of the state's wild hog population, or for the problems to be solved immediately," said Nan Huff, LDWF's wildlife disease coordinator. "The damage by feral hogs did not happen suddenly and the damage will not be resolved quickly. For that reason, this cooperative effort is the most logical and advantageous approach to this challenging

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

Gratitude: a good thing to show during holidays

Thanksgiving offers families an opportunity to reflect on their many blessings. Youth, however, often take their blessings for granted. How can parents and educators teach young people an attitude of gratitude?

Gratitude is a perception -

a way of looking at things, according to LSU AgCenter volunteer expert Dr. Janet Fox. Adults can teach youth gratitude by exposing them to a wide range of situations that shake up their way of thinking. Acquaintance with

children to be grateful for their daily meals and a roof over their heads. Meeting a bed-ridden person can teach youth to be grateful for their mobility and ability to get

Parents can teach their children to search for a silver lining in any unpleasant situation and to appreciate the windows of opportunity in their lives. If you notice your child turning a bad situation into a blessing, praise him or her for it.

Those little - or maybe big obstacles, which seem to block the way, can be golden gateways," Fox says, adding, 'Our busy lives are not conducive to appreciating obstacles. We notice what is broken, what still needs to be done, what we want but don't yet have."

To teach gratitude, the youth development expert recommends pausing occasionally from the hectic lifestyle. Pausing is an opportunity to learn.

One learning opportunity is game playing. Games can release hidden blessings that help family members bond and build values.

Another opportunity is role playing. By acting out a scenario, such as someone going out of their way for someone else, youth can feel what it means to be grateful. Even a negative example can help children feel what it's like to have their kindness ignored.

Family traditions can be important ways to express gratitude. Whether it's a speech at suppertime or having a thank-you section on the rigerator, family tradition create an opportunity to reinforce an attitude of gratitude.

"Family rituals provide an important opportunity for children to learn to express thanks," Fox says.

Children quickly learn a sense of gratitude by putting themselves in others' shoes. A family could do without something for a couple of days, such as eating less or fasting, to find out what it's like to be hungry. A family could go without television, the telephone, the Internet or video games to understand what others do without these resources. Such an experience could help everyone be a little more humble and grateful when these conveniences are restored.

Keeping a record of what to be thankful for is another way to learn gratitude. Some children may collect items or draw objects that represent the things they are grateful for. Others may keep a list of items they feel fortunate to

have. Still others may keep journals in which they explore challenging situations from several points of view. Family members can keep track of their daily blessings and share them with one another.

Reading is another effective way to learn gratitude. Families can read books together that contain a mesof thanksgiving. sage Afterward, family members can reflect on the message


and share perspectives. Families also can volunteer to help those in need. By supporting individuals who are experiencing a low point in their lives, whether financial or health-related, youth can appreciate the blessings they take for granted.

Teaching gratitude takes little extra effort and thought but can go a long way in teaching children the importance of being thankful and of expressing thanks in a sincere and meaningful way, Fox says.

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

Led by KCS' Southern Belle, the sixcar train includes a smiling tank car "Rudy"; a flat car carrying Santa's sleigh, reindeer and a miniature village, a gingerbread box car, the elves workshop, the reindeer's stable, and a little red caboose.
