Mrs. Rogers died Nov. 15 at age 90

Roberta Eagleson Rogers, 90, died Wednesday, Nov. 15, 2006 in a Lake Charles hospital. She was preceded in death by her husband, Charles A. Rogers.

Mrs. Rogers was a native of Grand Chenier and a 70year resident of Cameron, before moving to Moss Bluff after Hurricane Rita.

She was a charter member of the Home Demonstration Club in 1936, a founding member of the Louisiana Fur and Wildlife Festival, and a founding member of the Cameron Parish Historical

She volunteered for the Salvation Army and Red Cross after Hurricane Audrey, as well as volunteering her time with the Grey Ladies at South Cameron Memorial Hospital.

She had 50 years of membership in Order of the Eastern Star, Thelma Hackett Chapter 225, and in the Robert E. Lee Chapter 305 of the U.D.C.

She was a founding owner and officer of Cameron Construction Co. in 1951. She received the Doxey-Vincent VFW Citizenship Award in 1966 and the Cameron Parish Citizenship Award in 1968.

She was a member of Wakefield Memorial Church Methodist Cameron, where she served as historian and treasurer for more than 40 years. She was involved in Vacation Bible School, played the piano, sang in the choir, and was a soloist.

In lieu of flowers, contributions may be made to the Roberta Rogers Memorial Fund, c/o Wakefield Memorial Methodist Church, 324 Lake St., Lake Charles, LA 70607.

Survivors include her daughter, Norma Jean Blake and husband Joseph Braxton Blake, Jr. of Moss Bluff; two granddaughters, Charla Jo Blake of Dallas and Roberta Blake Pinch and husband, W. J. "Billy" Pinch of Welsh; and great-granddaughter, Whitnie Victoria Pinch of Welsh.

Her funeral was held Saturday, Nov. 18 in Hixson Funeral Home of Lake Charles, with the Rev. Wayne Taylor officiating. Burial was in Wakefield Memorial Methodist Church Cemetery in Cameron.

2 million OK'ed for Cameron auditorium

Representative Charles W. Boustany, Jr. announced that the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has awarded \$2,060,111 to the Cameron Parish School Board. The funding has been provided to replace the audi-Cameron torium Elementary School.

"Today's announcement is welcome news for the students, parents, teachers, and administrators in Cameron Parish," said Boustany. "The loss of the auditorium at Cameron Elementary was devastating, but this funding provides the resources for an even better facility that the citizens of Cameron Parish deserve."

Hurricane Rita's heavy rains, high winds, and storm surge destroyed the auditorium at Cameron Elementary School. The funding announced provides for replacement of the auditorium to pre-disaster design and capacity and includes costs necessary to elevate the structure to the Advisory Base Flood Elevation.

Library board tells rebuilding plans

Cameron Parish Library Board has taken steps to move forward with recovery and rebuilding. At the monthly Board meeting held Nov. 14, the board voted to enter into the Cheniere pilot tax pre-payment plan and to use the bond issue funds to provide for meeting rooms and equipment at all parish branches.

Before Hurricane Rita, the board had been planning to add the meeting rooms, but the damage and destruction caused by the storm set those back. Members plans expressed hope that the bond issue will give them the funds to complete their plans within the time frame set earlier.

Randy Goodlow, representing the Shaw Group, offered to help the library board with planning how to maximize the impact of FEMA, LRA bond issue funding to complete the rebuilding projects within the allowed time frame. Bond issue projects must be completed within 36 months of issue of the funds, which may take place in

April. The board decided to ask for public input into the type of rebuilding to take place in Cameron lower Parish. Members were undecided

about the location of the Johnson Bayou branch and the operations to be located in the Cameron main branch. They agreed to move the Grand Chenier branch across the road to the former Bonsall home site, which was to have genealogy center/museum until it was swept away. Since plans had already been approved for that branch, which was nearly complete before the storm, the board proposed to use the

same design. Since the Johnson Bayou branch library will be located in a bookmobile for the next few years, the board voted to seek bids on a portable restroom facility for staff and patrons. A canopy is planned to connect the bookmobile and the restrooms. Once the permanent branch is built, the board hopes to establish other bookmobile sites and possibly use the restrooms

there. Several board members and parish representatives are planning to attend a summit meeting in Baton Rouge next week to share ideas with other library systems that were damaged by the storms.

1211 apply here for **Road funds**

In an effort to keep the community apprised of application activity under the Road Home Program, the Cameron Parish Office of Planning & Development has compiled the following information on the Road Home Program.

As of Nov. 20, there has been a total of 76,956 applications received statewide. From this total, 5.344 awards have been granted totaling \$321 million.

For Cameron Parish, there appears to have been 1,211 applications made by local residences. Out of these applications, there has been a total of 33 awards averaging \$72,000 per award. These awards have a total amount of \$1.6 million. This compares to \$7.9 million for Calcasieu Parish and \$4.2 million for Vermilion Parish. Calcasieu Parish registered 3,531 applications with 241 awards, with Vermillion Parish had 1,130 applications and 117 awards issued.

Planning and Development Executive Director, Ernie Broussard said "We will continue to monitor this program, so that our citizens can make informed decisions concerning their award package.

Churches host dinner at H'berry



Former President George H. W. Bush will visit Cameron Parish next month to present \$2 million to South Cameron Memorial Hospital, which is rebuilding from Hurricane

Bush will visit Dec. 20 for a groundbreaking ceremony, said Jennifer Jones, an assistant district attorney and the hospital's legal counsel.

The money is coming from the Bush-Clinton Katrina

"That fund was only for Katrina, so we contacted them" about a Rita-related

donation, Jones said Tuesday. The fund has already helped with Rita-related rebuilding project -- McNeese

State University among them. Jones said the original donor, the government of Kuwait, allowed \$2 million to be redirected to cameron Memorial.

The money will be used for operating expenses, Jones

"Cameron is a community that I came to know during my early days working on oil rigs," Bush said in a statement Tuesday to the American Press. "I visited it again for the first time last fall and was struck by their devastation suffered at the hands of Hurricane Rita. I am so pleased that President Clinton and I are able to designate some of the funds from the Bush-Clinton Katrina fund for the rebuilding of the South Cameron Hospital, a vital link in the rebuilding of the entire region.'

Bush worked for an oil company with offices in three south Louisiana parishes including Cameron, before he entered politics.

Don Powell, the White House coordinator for Gulf Coast recovery, has said in several area speeches that the elder Bush has spoken fondly of Cameron Parish and its residents.

South Cameron memorial was built in 1964, after Hurricane Audrey.

It offered acute care, 24hour emergency care, radiology and laboratory services and a skilled nursing facility until it was wrecked last year by Hurricane Rita.







The Red Snapper Saga

The Gulf of Mexico and South Atlantic red snapper management chronicle continues to twist and turn, becoming ever more complicated by regulatory changes and lawsuits filed to force government to impose management policies.

According to the Gulf Council, the Gulf of Mexico red snapper stock is overfished. The stock status is influenced not only by direct fishing, but also by red snapper bycatch mortality from shrimping. All making rebuilding red snapper a chalmaking lenge for fishery managers as competing interests and goals must be balanced.

Additionally, the red snap-per rebuilding plan estab-lished in 1990 has been revised and lengthened several times in response to new assessments that provided a better understanding of stock biomass and other factors, including shrimp trawl bycatch mortality data. The most recent red snapper stock assessment indicates catch and bycatch levels are likely to jeopardize the success of the latest rebuilding plan, implemented in 2005. The goal is to rebuild the fishery to allow for harvest at maximum sustainable yields by

One proposed change being considered by the Gulf Council is reducing the total allowable catch (TAC) from 9.12 to 6.5 million pounds.

LARGE STOCK

The commercial (51 percent) and recreational (49 percent) quotas of the TAC would remain the same. The proposal would not change the 16 inch recreational size limit or alter the April 21-Oct. 31 season, but might reduce the bag limit to two fish and set the charter captain and crew bag limit at zero. In an effort to reduce waste, the commercial size limit might be reduced to 13 inches.

Also, with the publishing of the final rule for Reef Fish Amendment 18A, all vessels with a valid reef fish permit will be required to have a vessel monitoring system (VMS)

Another proposal being considered is establishing a target reduction of red snapper bycatch in shrimp trawls at 50 percent. One serious problem with reducing snapper bycatch in trawls is the natural behavior of red snapper. Underwater video has shown red snappers in trawls swimming along inside the net, hugging tightly to the webbing, even as escape openings are clearly avail-The fish's natural instinct is to seek the protection of structure, in this case inside the trawl. They swim with the trawl until exhausted and then end up with the

Other alternatives such as seasonal closures, marine protected areas or area closures also may become a real-

Hunter education class necessary for license

Hunter education certification cards can be obtained three different ways from the Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries (LDWF) Hunter Education Program. The free hunter education course is mandatory for anyone born on or after Sept. 1, 1969, who plans on purchasing a hunting license.

The traditional standard hunter education course is taught in a classroom setting by an LDWF hunter education instructor. The standard course usually takes place over a two or three-day window and includes an actual hands-on skeet shoot. In 2003, 18,651 students participated in the standard course with 17,577 in 2004 and 13,611 last year.

Developed in 2003 by the Southeast Hunter Education Coordinators, the home study hunter education program has certified over 1,500 hunters. The home study program can be taken over the Internet at LDWF's Web site or by requesting a CD-Rom from LDWF. Both home study programs use the exact same

Yet another upcoming change to red snapper is the implementation of individual fishing quotas (IFQ) to begin in January 2007. Each fisherman with a valid red snapper endorsed reef fish permit would be allocated a portion of the commercial quota, based on historical landings. Holland to plead in LC court

A Lake Charles man was expected to plead guilty Wednesday to molesting a 16year-old boy.

Paul Scott Holland, 39, formerly of Grand Lake is charged with six counts of sexual battery. He was arrested last year.

He is accused of fondling the boy in Calcasieu Parish between Oct. 1, 2004, and Jan. 31, 2005.


Holland was to appear in 14th Judicial District Court before Judge Mike Canaday. He was expected to be sentenced at the hearing.

The hearing comes 10 days after Holland was sentenced by 38th District Judge H. Ward Fontenot in Cameron Parish on three counts of sexual battery.
Holland was sentenced to

seven years in prison each on two counts and eight years on the third. The sentences are to run consecutively.

Cameron Sheriff's Office received complaints from the victims and their families in Grand Lake, where Holland was living at the time.

The Calcasieu Sheriff's Office got involved after it, received complaints about Holland.



Care urged Accidents are reported; Sheriff bookings told for FEMA trailers Traffic accidents are on the

cold With weather approaching, federal officials urge residents living in Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) travel trailers to observe fire safety precautions.

FEMA urges anyone in a travel trailer to use only the built-in heater. Occupants should not use kerosene heaters, kitchen stoves or ovens, or electric space heaters.

"These trailers equipped with heaters that are safe when used by occupants as instructed when we turn the trailer over to them," said Jim Stark, director of the Louisiana Transitional Recovery Office. "Using unapproved devices for heat could lead to serious accident or injury.'

"Residents need to practice safety at all times," Stark added. "Even those who've used these heaters before should review the built-in heater operating and safety instructions."

Most of the travel trailers are equipped with propane heaters, which automatically vent to the outdoors. However, using the oven or stove for heat may deplete oxygen in the trailer, resulting in carbon monoxide poisoning.

Carbon monoxide is an odorless, invisible gas that causes dizziness, headaches and possibly death. Residents should make sure the carbon monoxide detector is working correctly and that heater vents on the outside of the trailer are not blocked or covered. All FEMA travel trailers that have propane heaters also have carbon monoxide detectors.

Fire Program Specialist Kathy Gerstner of the U.S. Fire Administration, a sister agency of FEMA within the Department of Homeland Security, offers several fire prevention tips for residents of travel trailers:

- If it doesn't seem safe, don't do it;
- Shut off all appliances before leaving home;
- Know where the propane shutoff valve is located and how to shut it off;
- Keep flammable materials away from the stove top;
- Know where the fire extinguisher is in the unit and learn how to use it; • Learn how to use the
- emergency window opening devices in the trailer; • Do not store gasoline or
- other flammable liquids in or under the trailer; Do not store gasoline-
- powered vehicles or equipment in the trailer; Never smoke in bed.

Firefighters at every level stress the importance of having a working smoke detector. Batteries should be replaced twice a year, and officials sug-



BBB warns: know store refund policies

With the holiday shopping season upon us, Carmen Million, President of the Better Business Bureau, urges consumers to know their return rights before making any pur-

Million warns consumers that it is their responsibility to find out what the store's policy is on returns, refunds or exchanges. In the state of Louisiana, there is no law requiring a retailer to post their refund policy. However, once a policy has been posted, the company must comply with it.

Keep in mind that, in many areas, health regulations forbid returns on such items as hats, bathing suits and other intimate apparel. Also, some stores may charge a restocking fee for returns.

The BBB suggests that consumer ask the following questions before making a purchase: What is the store's return policy? Is it posted on the


buy something different? Will the store give my money

Is this a final sale item?

If the purchase is made under a written contract, how are the normal return privileges affected?

If the product has a separate written warranty, does the warranty affect the means by which I return the item?

Million states it is important to keep your receipt in a safe place. It is also a good idea to keep the original packaging until you are sure you will not be returning the item.

Important Health Screenings for Seniors

Dear Savvy Senior,

Can you give me the recommended health screenings for seniors and which ones Medicare (Part A or B) pays

Healthy at 64

Outside of eating a healthy diet, regular exercise and not smoking, health screenings (tests or examinations that help find health problems early on, when they're easier to treat) are the best way to stay healthy as you age.

Here are the key screenings you should be aware of and how they work with Medicare (also www.ahrq.gov/ppip/50plus).

Health Screenings

When you sign up for Medicare (Part B), be sure to take advantage of their onetime "Welcome to Medicare" physical, where all new enrollees can get a thorough physical examination within the first six months. Other important screenings tests include:

* Blood pressure checks: More than 65 million American adults (1 in 3) have high blood pressure, a leading cause of stroke and heart attack. Get it checked once a year. More frequent if your covered by Medicare.)

pressure is above 130/85.

* Cholesterol checks: Too much cholesterol can clog your arteries and is a major cause of heart disease. Get checked at least every five years, more frequently if you smoke, have diabetes or a family history. (Medicare a cardiovascular screenings once every five years that checks cholesterol, lipid and triglyceride levels).

* Colorectal cancer tests: Colorectal cancer kills 58,000 Americans each year, half of whom could be saved with routine screenings. Begin regular screening starting at age 50. Your doctor can help you decide which test is right for you. (Medicare covers four screening tests.)

* Diabetes test: Millions of people have diabetes and don't even know it. Every three years, have your blood glucose checked. If you're obese, have high blood pressure, high cholesterol or have a family history of diabetes, check it yearly. (Medicare covers diabetes screening for those at risk for the disease.)

* Mammograms: The risk of getting breast cancer increases with age. After age 40, annual mammograms are recommended for all women. (Annual mammograms are

* Pap smear and pelvic exam: Pap smears are recommended every three years to cervical detect cancer. However, women who've had a total hysterectomy, or who are age 65 or older and have had three negative pap smears in a row, usually don't need to be tested. Pelvic exams are recommended annually. (Medicare covers both tests every 24 months, or once a year for high-risk women.)

* Prostate cancer screening: Tests such as a PSA (prostate-specific antigen) blood test or a digital rectal exam can help detect prostate cancer and should be part of an annual checkup starting at age 50. (Medicare covers these tests annually.)

* Osteoporosis test: All women at age 65 should get a bone density test to screen for osteoporosis. You may need screening earlier if you're at increased risk. (Medicare covers the bone density test once every two years)

* Vaccinations: People over 65 should get a pneumococcal vaccine to protect against pneumonia. Anyone over 50 should get a yearly flu shot, and a tetanus booster is recommended every 10 years. (Medicare covers flu, pneumococcal and Hepatitis B shots.)

Vision: Eye diseases, such as glaucoma, macular degeneration and cataracts, are common with age. Get your eyes checked every year or two after the age of 65. (Medicare pays for annual glaucoma screenings for highrisk beneficiaries. They also cover cataract surgery and one pair of eyeglasses after surgery, and some macular degeneration treatments.)

Other screenings: It's also important to have your hearing tested by an audiologist every two or three years; have routine dental checkups at least once a year; and have annual skin examinations done by a dermatologist to check for skin cancers. (None of these are covered by Medicare.)

Savvy Note: As always, talk to your doctor about which tests are right for you, when you should have them, and how often. Medicare Coverage Out-of-pocket costs for Medicare's preventive services will vary. Some are completely free, while others will cost you 20 percent of the Medicare-approved amount.





- Children 6 months to 18 years of age on chronic aspirin therapy
- All women who will be pregnant during influenza It is very important that
