
Some can't get rid of their fear even when they're asleep. Heather Girlinghouse, sophomore, said, "Sometimes I have


nightmares about crazy stuff. Like one time, I dreamt about a giant spider attacking the world. It was crazy."






competition, and even though they did not all place, they all gave it all they had." I remember how nervous we all were waiting on my turn to compete it was nerve racking," said junior Megan Poole.







MISS GRADDLAKE




So is consuming energy drinks a bad thing to do? Most students don't think it is. Kingham said, "They are not really bad for you, one or two now and then won't hurt you."

Colophon

The 2008 "The Hornet" yearbook was produced by students of Grand Lake High School yearbook staff under the advisement of Miss Lindsay Smythe.

The staff met for the first time on the first day of school in August to plan out the theme. The book's theme "In Our Own Words" was finalized during the first nine weeks of the school year. Divider pages and theme copy were done by Taylor Beard and theme photographs were taken by varied staff members. Evan Guidry, Megan Poole, and Katherine Kingham served as section editors. Kaylyn Shaw entered all yearbook orders into the yearbook managing software. All other stories were written by staff members, and photographs for the yearbook were taken by either staff members or Miss Smythe. Some photographs, however, were submitted by outside individuals such as parents or professional photographers.

The cover is four-color glossy Lithocote using a color scheme developed by our staff. Cover colors were chosen using 2008 trend colors: maroon (Taylor Color X9193), gold (Taylor Color X9022) and blue (X9148). Inside pages have a trim size of 7 3/4 by 10 1/2 inches with a Smyth binding type printed on 100# enamel. Types used throughout the book were Ashley, Christina, Eric, and Eric Condensed. Headlines were Ashley 30 point and subheadings were Christina 16 point. Body copy was Eric Condensed 10 point and captions were Eric 8 point.

The book was managed through Sum It 3.0 software and was purchased via order forms. Book sales were \$30 for pre-purchase or \$40 for delivery day.

The book had a press run of 185 copies and was printed at Taylor Publishing Company in Dallas, Texas. The staff's sales representative was Charlie Phillips and the account executive was Christy Bustillos.

Grade-level, faculty, club and sports pictures were taken by Gerry Gibson's Lifetouch Photography. Photos were submitted digitally and taken with a Nikon D40 and a Nikon CoolPix.

Pages were produced on 3 Gateway desktops, 2 Dell desktops, and 5 Dell laptops using EliteVision 5.2 and Photoshop Elements 4.0.




