





Spanish shines in pairs













Two Programs Working together for success













Having Guidry as the new sponsor changed many things. "Everything was much more organized. We received calendars telling us about























Colophon

The 2009 "Hornet" yearbook was produced by students of Grand Lake High School's yearbook staff under the advisement of Miss Lindsay Smythe.

The staff began planning the yearbook theme during the month of August, and the theme "Marooned" was finalized during the first nine weeks of the school year. The theme editor for this year was Evan Guidry, and all theme photographs were taken by Melonie Brister of Frames in Focus Photography. Megan Poole served as Sports Editor and Katherine Kingham served as Advertisement Editor. Kaylyn Shaw served as the yearbook sales manager and senior photographer. All yearbook stories were written by staff members, and photographs for the yearbook were taken by either staff members, volunteer student photographers, or Miss Smythe. Some photographs were submitted by outside individuals, such as parents or community members.

The cover is a four-color matte Lithocote using a color scheme developed by our staff. So to reiterate the theme of "Marooned," the color photograph is black and white with spot color revealed. The cover colors are light gray (X9127), medium gray (X9128), black gray (X9129), and turquoise (X9145). These same colors can be found in the alternative copy modules throughout the yearbook. The theme colors in the yearbook were determined by the spot color of the divider pages: Sepia Brown #41 at 60 % (student life divider), All American Red #31 at 90 % (people divider), Yellow Ochre #49 at 80 % (sports divider), and Process Blue #9 at 100 % (ads divider). Type used in the headlines was Bern 36 point, and subheadlines were Transpose 30 point. Body copy was Bern 8 point, and captions were Bern 7 point. Inside pages have a trim size of 7 3/4 by 10 1/2 inches with a Smyth binding type printed on 100# enamel.

The book was managed through Sum It 3.0 software, and students purchased the yearbook via order forms. Book sales were \$35 for pre-purchase or \$40 after the deadline. Name stamps and icons could be purchased for \$5 each.

The book had a press run of 165 copies and was printed at Taylor Publishing Company in Dallas. Texas. The staff's yearbook sales representatives were Charlie Phillips, Clint Sanford, and Chris Sanford. The account executives were Toni Wood and Angela Holt.

Grade-level, faculty, and group photographs were taken by Gerry Gibson's Lifetouch Photography. Photos were submitted digitally and taken with a Nikon D50, a Nikon D60, and two Nikon CoolPix.

Pages were produced on 1 Gateway desktop, 2 Dell desktops, and 8 Dell laptops using StudioWorks yearbook software and Photoshop Elements 4.0.
